SURFACE TRANSPORT

Bus services for disabled people

Answer published on 11 February 2013

Bob Stewart: To ask the Secretary of State for Transport what recent assessment he has made of capacity for disabled people travelling aboard public buses. [142667]

Norman Baker: The Public Service Vehicles (Accessibility) Regulations 2000 (PSVAR) have provisions to make vehicles accessible for disabled people including low floor capability and priority seats. The deadlines for when all buses on local and scheduled services designed to carry more than 22 passengers must meet these requirements range from 2015 to 2020 depending on the type of vehicle. Until then, availability of accessible vehicles on any given service will vary depending on the make-up of the fleet and is principally a matter for bus operators.

The most recent figures show that 71% of vehicles in England are PSVAR compliant (94% in London), 88% of buses in England are low floor (99% in London). I will continue to monitor these figures as the deadlines approach.

I recently published the Department for Transport's Accessibility Action Plan setting out the Department's priorities for improving access to transport, particularly for disabled people. This can be viewed on the .gov website:

Parking and Traffic Appeals Service Adjuicators

Answer published on 12 February 2013

Baroness Walmsley: To ask Her Majesty's Government under what legislation the discharge of the functions of the Parking and Traffic Appeals Service adjudicators is regulated by the Mayor of London or Transport for London. [HL5313]

Earl Attlee: The Parking and Traffic Appeals Service adjudicators provide an independent appeals service for individuals who have been issued with a penalty charge; for example, for a parking, bus lane or moving traffic offence, issued by a London local authority. The Parking and Traffic Appeals Service adjudicators are not regulated by the Mayor of London or Transport for London.

Re-opening of roads after Vauxhall helicopter crash

Answer published on 13 February 2013

Lord Trefgarne: To ask Her Majesty's Government whether the Air Accident Investigation Branch continues to require closure of the roads around the site of the recent helicopter crash in Vauxhall; when they expect the roads to be re-opened; and why they were not opened as expected on 4 February. [HL5287]

Earl Attlee: The Air Accidents Investigation Branch is no longer on site and do not require any road closures at Vauxhall as all the helicopter debris has now been recovered.

With the exception of trunk roads, under devolution roads in London are the responsibility of the local highway authority, either Transport for London (TfL) or the relevant London Borough.

However, TfL has advised that repairing a crane of this size and nature is a slow and intricate process and that severe weather can have a significant effect on progress. Due to recent high winds, some of which have reached in excess of 35 kilometres per hour, and heavy fog around the Vauxhall area, Brookfield Multiplex's work to repair the 190-metre crane on St Georges Tower took longer than originally planned but was completed on 10 February 2013.

Roads speed Limits

Answer published on 13 February 2013

Lord Taylor of Warwick: To ask Her Majesty's Government what assessment they have made of the impact of 20 miles per hour speed limits on the safety of children, and what advice they give to local authorities on that subject. [HL5340]

Earl Attlee: In 1996 the Transport Research Laboratory (TRL) published a report for the Department for Transport on 20 mph zones. The report showed that accidents fell by 60% and accidents to children fell by 67% where these zones had been introduced. (Review of Traffic Calming Schemes in 20mph Zones, TRL report 215) The department has also researched the effects of the introduction of widespread 20 mph limits in Portsmouth and has published some preliminary findings. The interim report (Atkins, published 2009) found a 22% reduction in casualties (at all ages) where the national trend was a fall of 14%.

On 18 January 2012 the department published Setting Local Speed Limits (DfT Circular 01/2013), which revises guidance to local councils, which will help them implement more consistent speed limits on local roads. It incorporates recent changes that create more flexibility for authorities to implement 20 mph limits and zones. It says that traffic authorities can, over time, introduce 20 mph speed limits or zones on major streets where there are-or could be-significant numbers of journeys on foot, and/or where pedal cycle movements are an important consideration, and this outweighs the disadvantage of longer journey times for motorised traffic. This is in addition to encouraging 20 mph zones in residential streets in cities, towns and villages, particularly where the streets are being used by people on foot and on bicycles, there is community support and the characteristics of the street are suitable.

RAIL

High Speed Two

Answers published on 11 February 2013

Andrew Bridgen: To ask the Secretary of State for Transport whether he has commissioned an environmental impact assessment to cover the noise footprint of the proposed High Speed 2 railway line; and when any such assessment will be published. [141854]

Simon Burns: At this early stage in the development of the Phase Two scheme, the noise appraisal has sought only to identify areas at relatively greater risk of experiencing noise impact. This will help determine the potential need for, and approximate location of, noise mitigation. With this mitigation included in the design, the noise model will be re-run for the preferred scheme to obtain a clearer early view on where noise impacts are likely to be. An environmental impact assessment for the scheme taking account of a wide range of environmental information is proposed to commence in 2015 and will be published in due course. Further details can be found in the Command Paper and Sustainability Summary documents published on 28 January and placed in the House Libraries.

Meeting the cost of High Speed Two

Answer published on 11 February 2013

Lilian Greenwood: To ask the Secretary of State for Transport what discussions (a) Ministers and (b) officials in his Department have had with (i) local authorities along the route and (ii) the Local Government Association about proposed contributions by these bodies towards meeting the cost of High Speed 2. [142248]

Simon Burns: Department for Transport officials and Ministers have discussed, in broad terms, the potential for local and private sector contributions to HS2, in the context of wider discussions with local authorities serving areas that may benefit from new HS2 stations. There have been no specific discussions on this subject with the Local Government Association. Discussions about specific proposals for

contributions are largely for the future. We do not intend to prejudice the outcome of discussions and negotiations that are yet to take place.

Possible acceleration of High Speed Rail

Answer published on 12 February 2013

Lord Birt: To ask Her Majesty's Government whether they will investigate whether the construction of all current High Speed Rail plans could be accelerated and completed within 10 years. [HL5173]

Earl Attlee: The Government are keen to make progress with the project to deliver high speed rail in the UK and are looking to speed up the timetable wherever possible. Delivering in two phases is intended to ensure rapid and early progress. By the end of this year we plan to submit the hybrid Bill for phase one and to commence consultation for phase two, earlier than previously planned. The parliamentary processes for securing powers for the construction are likely to be complex and lengthy and seeking powers at a later stage for phase two is likely to help reduce the scale of the task and speed up the commencement of construction. The Government will continue to look for opportunities to speed up the process.

CROSSRAIL

Extending Crossrail 2 to Stansted airport

Answer published on 11 February 2013

Priti Patel: To ask the Secretary of State for Transport what discussions his Department has had with Network Rail and Transport for London on extending the proposed route for Crossrail 2 to Stansted airport; and what options his Department is considering to (a) increase rail capacity and (b) decrease rail journey times for commuters using Stansted airport. [142697]

Stephen Hammond: The Department is working with Network Rail and the rail industry on its long-term planning process which is considering future rail services to Stansted and other major airports.

We have had no discussions with Network Rail or Transport for London about extending the proposed route of Crossrail 2 to Stansted airport.

Cost of Crossrail 2

Answer published on 12 February 2013

Jonathan Edwards: To ask the Secretary of State for Transport what recent estimate he has made of the likely cost of Crossrail 2. [142454]

Stephen Hammond: A recent report by London First estimated the cost of Crossrail 2 at between £10 billion and £15 billion. The Department has made no independent estimate of the cost of the scheme.
