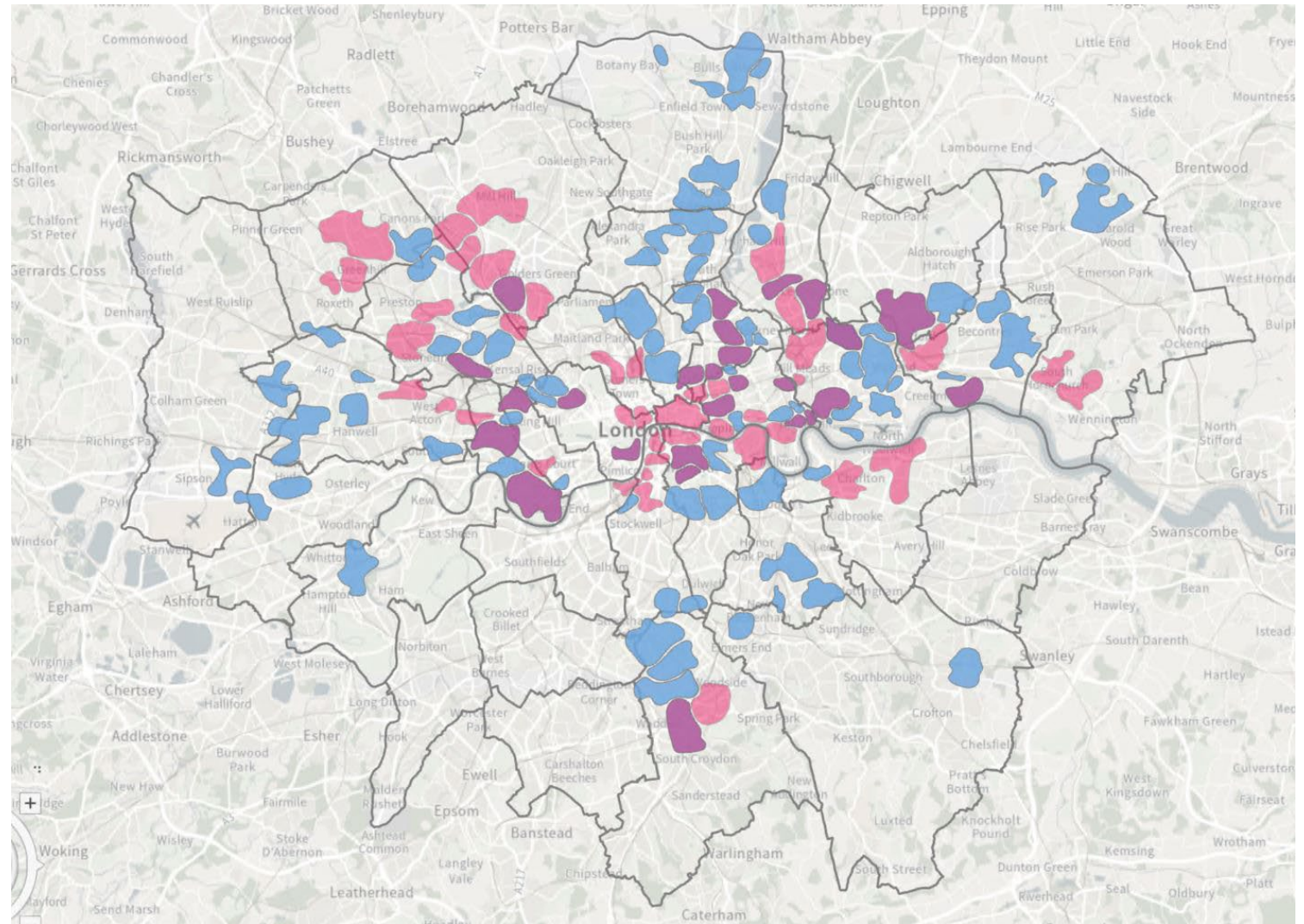

Appendix 2 - Strategy development and case making: key outputs

The following key outputs should be included in the strategy and the business case:

- Demonstrate how selected areas suffer from high levels of deprivation and climate vulnerability, and how a low civic strength index affects them; and identify the challenges of large-scale development and housing growth.
- Demonstrate how residents, businesses and local organisations will be involved in the co-design of interventions, including Londoners from under-represented groups (typically, lower-income Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic groups; and younger and older Londoners).
- Demonstrate ambition: support will be given to the most ambitious exemplar proposals that drive innovation and deliver cross-sector activity in the area. The strategy and business case should also demonstrate how the capital projects can catalyse positive change in the wider area, by either integrating existing schemes or instigating new approaches to place-based regeneration, with a clear plan for scaling up. This should include quantified outputs and outcomes as set out at paragraph 2.9, above.
- Demonstrate replicability – how the locally rooted approach will be integrated into borough strategies, and could then be rolled out across the borough and shared with other boroughs and partners in the CPP programme.
- Demonstrate deliverability – investment-readiness and how the local partnership will govern, resource and manage engagement, design and delivery of the costed project from 2023-24 to 2026-27.
- Seek to leverage at least 50 per cent match funding from the borough, local partners or other sources. Projects should seek private-sector funding and activity to deliver projects in the neighbourhood and help achieve their objective; and access/use government funding streams wherever possible.
- Demonstrate that existing GLA programmes will be used to maximise delivery potential.
