Title: National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC) – Home Office Grant Funding – Beyond Visual Line of Sight (BVLOS) Drones

Executive Summary:

This paper seek approval to accept Home Office grant funding in 2022/23 for a programme to develop national capability for safe and effective operation of Beyond Visual Line of Sight (BVLOS) Drones. In addition the paper seeks approval to bid for and accept Home Office funding of £656,450 for this programme of work in 2023/24 and up to a ceiling value of £5m p.a. in future years.

Recommendation:

The Deputy Mayor for Policing and Crime is recommended to:

- 1. Approve the acceptance of £656,450 grant funding from the Home Office for the NPCC BVLOS Drone programme for the period 01/04/2022 to 31/03/2023.
- 2. Approve to bid for and accept Home Office grant funding up to a ceiling value of £5,000,000 per annum to support the programme in 2023/24 and future years.

PART I - NON-CONFIDENTIAL FACTS AND ADVICE TO THE DMPC

1. Introduction and background

1.1. MOPAC hosts the National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC). The Home Office has made an offer of grant funding to the NPCC, and under the Collaboration Agreement MOPAC must consider requests to approve the acceptance of grant funding.

2. Issues for consideration

- 2.1. The NPCC is seeking to develop a BVLOS capability for police drone operations. This programme will aim to achieve a safe and effective BVLOS capability for drones in policing across all police forces in England and Wales. It will achieve this through robust governance, standardisation of procurement, training and operational guidance and the sharing of resource and expertise across a wide and varied, but centrally coordinated, network of experts and practitioners.
- 2.2. Currently all drone operations are limited both by technological capability and a restrictive safety framework that insists on a drone operator maintaining a visual line of sight (VLOS) with the drone at all times. A BVLOS capability would enable drones to be deployed for longer, with less operational burden in terms of vehicles and officers' support at a scene, at a dramatically reduced cost.
- 2.3. The work undertaken by the programme will provide a pathway for all police forces in England & Wales to follow to achieve an enhanced air support capability to police their communities.

3. Financial Comments

- 3.1. The grant award for 2022/23 is £656,450, and the NPCC has assured that has been/will be spent within the financial year.
- 3.2. The NPCC also seek approval to bid for and accept Home Office grant funding in respect of this programme for 2023/24 and future years up to a ceiling value of £5m p.a.
- 3.3. NPCC assure that spend will be contained within the HO grant, NPCC budget and reserves, and that there is no financial liability to MOPAC.

4. Legal Comments

- 4.1. The legal powers applicable to MOPAC acceptance of the Grant will be under Schedule 3, Paragraph 7 of the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011 which provides that,
 - 7(1) The Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime may do anything which is calculated to facilitate, or is conducive or incidental to, the exercise of the functions of the Office.

- (a) entering into contracts and other agreements (whether legally binding or not);
- 4.2. Paragraph 4.8 of the MOPAC Scheme of Delegation and Consent provides that the Deputy Mayor for Policing and Crime (DMPC) has delegated authority to approve all bids for grant funding.

NPCC Drone Beyond Visual Line of Sight (BVLOS)Programme

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The National Police Chiefs' Council, hosted by Metropolitan Police Service, has been offered a grant from the Home Office to support their BVLOS Drone programme.

This programme will aim to achieve a safe and effective BVLOS capability for drones in policing across all police forces in England and Wales. It will achieve this through robust governance, standardisation of procurement, training and operational guidelines and the sharing of resource and expertise across a wide and varied, but centrally co-ordinated, network of experts and practitioners. The grant from the Home Office will enable this work to progress at pace to develop this enhanced capability.

Recommendations

The Deputy Mayor for Policing and Crime is asked to:

- 1. Approve the acceptance of £656,450 grant funding from the Home Office for the NPCC BVLOS Drone programme for the period 01/04/2022 to 31/03/2023.
- 2. Approval to bid for and accept Home Office grant funding up to a ceiling value of £5,000,000 per annum to support the programme in 2023/24 and future years.

Time sensitivity

A decision is required from the Deputy Mayor by February 2023. The NPCC Drone portfolio has been provided a grant from the Home Office for use within 2022/23 financial year. This grant will allow critical work to be undertaken within the remainder of the fiscal year to support the NPCC Drone programme.

Non-confidential facts and advice to the Deputy Mayor for Policing and Crime Introduction and background

- The NPCC Drone portfolio have been successful in securing £656,450 of funding for fiscal year 2022/23 in order to initiate their 'Beyond Visual Line of Sight' (BVLOS) drone programme.
- 2. This programme will aim to achieve a safe and effective BVLOS capability for drones in policing across all police forces in England and Wales. It will achieve this through robust governance, standardisation of procurement, training and operational guidance and the sharing of resource and expertise across a wide and varied, but centrally co-ordinated,

network of experts and practitioners.

- 3. The work undertaken by the programme will provide a pathway for all police forces in England & Wales to follow to achieve an enhanced air support capability to police their communities.
- 4. The programme is currently securing a grant from the Home Office for fiscal year 2023/24.

Issues for consideration

- 5. The NPCC is seeking to develop a BVLOS capability for police drone operations. Currently all drone operations are limited both by technological capability and a restrictive safety framework that insists on a drone operator maintaining a visual line of sight (VLOS) with the drone at all times. A BVLOS capability would enable drones to be deployed for longer, with less operational burden in terms of vehicles and officers' support at a scene, at a dramatically reduced cost.
- 6. A BVLOS drone could provide covert and overt coverage of policing operations for extended periods, reducing noise and pollution; improving evidential capture; and removing the need for officers on the ground to put themselves in harm's way. In doing this a BVLOS capability could free up policing resources; better protect the public; and directly contribute to improving our outcomes at court.
- 7. The grant funding from the Home Office is key enabler for the NPCC to deliver this programme for police forces.

Contributes to the MOPAC Police & Crime Plan 2022-251

- 8. The programme will support all police forces in England & Wales. Whilst this work will focus of national implementation and support, the Metropolitan Police Service will benefit from the programme outcomes.
- 9. The development of drone capability to allow BVLOS operations will enable the MPS to better support victims of crime by enhancing the police response. This in turn will lead to an increase in confidence and trust in the service that the MPS provides to the people of London. This will also reduce and prevent violent offending by improving the capture of evidence against high harm offenders who engage in such activity.

Financial, Commercial and Procurement Comments

- 10. The NPCC BVLOS programme has secured a grant from the Home Office to conduct its work. The programme will be funded entirely by the Home Office grant. The grant is split between a £105,000 capital grant to support purchase of equipment and technology for enhancing drone operations towards BVLOS capability. The remainder of the grant, £486,563 is revenue and will support consultancy and revenue costs for the programme. The Home Office grant will be spent within this financial year.
- 11. Future year bids will depend on available Home Office aviation grants. In 2023/24 fiscal year this is expected to be £1.9m but may be significantly higher depending on Home Office funding available later in the year.
- 12. The spend of the programme will be within the Home Office grant and there is no financial liability to MOPAC.

- 13. Subject to MOPAC approval, these arrangements will be formalised between MOPAC and the Home Office with a grant agreement based on standard Home Office terms and conditions. This will be overseen by MPS Commercial Services.
- 14. The programme will contribute to the London Anchor Institutions' Charter² by accelerating delivery of a cleaner, greener London. The development of enhanced drone capability will see a reduction in the use of police helicopters and therefore support this objective.

Legal Comments

- 15. MOPAC approval is sought pursuant to Paragraph 4.8 of the MOPAC Scheme of Consent and Delegation which provides the DMPC with delegated powers to approve all offers made of grant funding.
- 16. The legal powers applicable to MOPAC acceptance of the Grant will be under Schedule 3, Paragraph 7 of the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011 which provides that, 7(1) The Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime may do anything which is calculated to facilitate, or is conducive or incidental to, the exercise of the functions of the Office. (2)That includes—
 - (a) entering into contracts and other agreements (whether legally binding or not);
- 17. MOPAC has an obligation to publish a grant agreement pursuant to Schedule 1, Paragraph 3(g) of the Elected Local Policing Bodies (Specified Information) (Amendment) Order 2012

Equality Comments

18. This business case has undergone an initial equality screening. Due regard has been taken to the Equality Act's Public Sector Equality Duty. Real consideration has been taken to assess equality impact caused by the proposed business changes. As a result no positive or negative impact has been identified to any individual and/or group safeguarded by a protected characteristic and those who are not. As the intention of this document is to seek additional funding for an existing function, there is no real organisational change. Further reviews will be conducted and if as a result any new Equality Impact is identified, a full Equality Impact Assessment will be initiated.

Privacy Comments

- 19. The MPS is subject to the requirements and conditions placed on it as a 'State' body to comply with the European Convention of Human Rights and the Data Protection Act (DPA) 2018. Both legislative requirements place an obligation on the MPS to process personal data fairly and lawfully in order to safeguard the rights and freedoms of individuals.
- 20. Under Article 35 of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and Section 57 of the DPA 2018, Data Protection Impact Assessments (DPIA) become mandatory for organisations with technologies and processes that are likely to result in a high risk to the rights of the data subjects.
- 21. The Information Assurance and Information Rights units within MPS will be consulted at all stages to ensure the programme meets its compliance requirements.
- 22. The programme does not use currently personally identifiable data of members of the public, so there are no current GDPR issues to be considered. If the programme uses personally identifiable data of members of the public or staff at a later date DPIA's will be

completed as needed.

Real Estate Implications

23. The NPCC Drone portfolio will be housed within MO7 Taskforce and they will use shared office space on the MPS estate as authorised. There are no real estate implications.

Environmental Implications

24. The MPS Environment Policy has been taken into consideration and appropriate waste collections guidance for end of life drones will be provided to forces. The waste hierarchy will be taken into consideration.
