Title: Expansion of Drug Testing on Arrest 2024/25

Executive Summary:

The Metropolitan Police Service deliver drug testing in Police custody and procure drug testing equipment and laboratory services for contested orders, funded by MOPAC. This funding enables the identification and referral to treatment of drug using offenders, which plays an important role in reducing reoffending and improving health outcomes.

The Home Office have offered additional funding for this financial year, 2024/25, to continue the delivery of and expand drug testing on arrest. The Metropolitan Police Service proposes to continue their current programme of testing and continue to expand the use of Inspector's Authority. This decision requests the acceptance of £25,000 in grant funding, for delivery from 1st April 2024 to 31st March 2025.

Recommendation:

The Deputy Mayor for Policing and Crime is recommended to:

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- 1. Approve the acceptance of £25,000 from the Home Office to continue and expand drug testing on arrest from 1st April 2024 to 31st March 2025, subject to the signing of a Home Office Grant Agreement.
- 2. Approve the updating of budgets to reflect additional grant income and expenditure.

PART I - NON-CONFIDENTIAL FACTS AND ADVICE TO THE DMPC

1. Introduction and background

- 1.1. MOPAC is funding the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS) to deliver drug testing on arrest in police custody, at a total allocation of £470,000 in 2024/25.
- 1.2. This funding supports two job roles within the MPS: a Drug Testing Co-ordinator and an Offender Management Co-ordinator. These roles manage drug testing in police custody, and the procurement of drug testing equipment and laboratory services for contested orders.
- 1.3. The Home office have offered additional funding for this financial year 2024/25 to continue the delivery of and expand drug testing on arrest. The MPS propose to accept £25,000 from the Home Office for delivery from 1st April 2024 to 31st March 2025.

2. Issues for consideration

- 2.1. Drug testing in police custody underpins the pathway to drug treatment for those arrested, engaging drug using offenders in treatment at an early stage.
- 2.2. The Police and Crime Plan 2022-25 commits that MOPAC will continue to work closely with health and local partners to improve pathways to health treatment for those in contact with the criminal justice system, with a focus on drug use which drives crime, helping to reduce reoffending and the wider harms caused by drugs.
- 2.3. The Government announced as part of its initial response to Dame Carol Black's Review of Drugs, the plan to increase the use of drug testing on arrest by police forces across England and Wales. This was underlined within the Government's Drug Strategy, From Harm to Hope.
- 2.4. The Home Office has offered up to £25,000 to the MPS to continue to deliver and expand their drug testing on arrest programme in 2024/25.
- 2.5. The MPS proposes to continue their current programme of testing and continue to expand the use of Inspector's Authority.

3. Financial Comments

- 3.1. MOPAC requests approval to accept funding totalling £25,000 from the Home Office, through quarterly grant agreements. The funding will be added to the 2024/25 drugs testing on arrest budget of £533,000.
- 3.2. This will make the total budget for drug testing on arrest £558,000 in 2024/25.
- 3.3. Any payment to the MPS for drug testing will be quarterly in arrears upon evidencing delivery of service.

4. Legal Comments

- 4.1. MOPAC's general powers are set out in the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011 (the 2011 Act). Section 3(6) of the 2011 Act provides that MOPAC must "secure the maintenance of the metropolitan police service and secure that the metropolitan police service is efficient and effective." Under Schedule 3, paragraph 7 (1) MOPAC has wide incidental powers to "do anything which is calculated to facilitate, or is conducive or incidental to, the exercise of the functions of the Office." Paragraph 7(2) (a) provides that this includes entering into contracts and other agreements.
- 4.2. There are further relevant powers set out in the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 at sections 17(1) (a) to (c) which place MOPAC under a duty to exercise its functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all it can to prevent, crime and disorder (including anti-social and other behaviour adversely affecting the local environment), reoffending in its area, and the misuse of drugs, alcohol and other substances in its area. The proposed arrangements are consistent with MOPAC's duties in the Crime and Disorder Act 1998.
- 4.3. Further to section 143 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 MOPAC can also provide services that secure, or contribute to securing, crime and disorder reduction in the body's area.
- 4.4. Paragraph 4.8 of the MOPAC Scheme of Delegation and Consent provides that the Deputy Mayor for Policing and Crime (DMPC) has delegated authority to approve all bids for grant funding, including approval to accept a Grant Agreement.
- 4.5. The delegation of responsibility for the finalisation of planning and contractual/grant arrangements, including relevant terms and the signing of agreements, to the Chief Operating Officer is in accordance with the general power of delegation in paragraph 1.7.
- 4.6. Officers must ensure the Financial Regulations and Contract Regulations are complied with.
- 4.7. Officers should ensure that the funding agreements are put in place before any commitment to fund is made.
- 4.8. Officers confirm that sufficient assurance has been carried out to this decision to determine that the Chief Executive has legal authority to agree the recommendations.

5. Commercial Issues

- 5.1. Funding will be provided to MOPAC by the Home Office quarterly, under a Grant Agreement. This will be reviewed following MOPAC's Contracts and Grants Process before acceptance of the terms.
- 5.2. A new Service Level Agreement with the MPS will be required to uplift the existing funding. This will be reviewed following MOPAC's Contracts and Grants Process before issuing.

5.3. Data will continue to be provided to MOPAC monthly, and this will be extended to the Home Office for the duration of the extended delivery period via the process as outlined within the Data Protection Schedule of our Agreement with the Home Office and SLA with the MPS.

6. **Public Health Approach**

6.1. Drug testing in police custody provides a pathway for those with substance misuse needs to be referred into treatment. Engagement in treatment has been shown to reduce both health harms and reoffending.

7. GDPR and Data Privacy

- 7.1. MOPAC will adhere to the Data Protection Act (DPA) 2018 and ensure that any organisations who are commissioned to do work with or on behalf of MOPAC are fully compliant with the policy and understand their GDPR responsibilities.
- 7.2. The expansion of drug testing on arrest will not alter the data protection measures in place. All data provided to MOPAC and the Home Office will be aggregated and managed as per the Data Protection Schedules outlined within the Grant Agreement with the Home Office and the SLA with MPS.

8. Equality Comments

- 8.1. MOPAC is required to comply with the public sector equality duty set out in section 149(1) of the Equality Act 2010. This requires MOPAC to have due regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations by reference to people with protected characteristics. The protected characteristics are: age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex and sexual orientation.
- 8.2. Substance misuse impacts people across all demographics, but there is particular crossover with mental ill health, where people may self-medicate with illegal substances. Drug testing on arrest is not undertaken for children under 18 years old. Testing will be undertaken for those who have committed a trigger offence regardless of any other protected characteristics, so the throughput is determined by arrests made. Where Inspector's Authority is used, there is clear guidance to mitigate against the introduction of disproportionality. The Equalities Impact Assessment (EIA) will be updated by the MPS as part of this expansion in testing.
