Background	 The London Stadium is a successful multi-use Stadium, with diversity of summer events, and a growing winter event schedule. It makes significant contributions to the local and London economy, however it currently operates at a significant annual loss due to agreements entered into before its reopening. These losses are funded by the GLA through LLDC. 	
	 LLDC currently has strategic responsibility for London Stadium through its subsidiary E20 Stadium LLP whose members are LLDC and Stratford East London Holdings (SELH) Ltd, itself a subsidiary of LLDC with 1% share. E20 oversees London Stadium's operational management, carried out through its wholly- owned subsidiary LS185 Limited, which operates the venue on a day-to-day basis. 	
	 As part of the evolution of LLDC to deliver the next phase of legacy, it was announced on 13 August 2024 that LLDC and its leadership will no longer have the strategic responsibility for London Stadium through its subsidiary E20 Stadium LLP from April 2025. 	
	 The proposal is to transfer responsibility for funding and oversight of the London Stadium to the GLA, specifically to GLA Holdings Ltd, a wholly owned subsidiary of GLA. As part of this the London Stadium operation will be rationalised (by transferring services LLDC currently provides to the Stadium to E20 and LS185) and the leadership of the London Stadium will be consolidated. 	
	 This will put the GLA in more direct control of the Stadium and enable LLDC structures and resources to be streamlined in line with the evolution of the organisation. The intention will be to continue to reduce operating losses by improving operational efficiencies and increasing the commercial focus of the London Stadium. 	

	On 1 April 2025 it is proposed that LLDC will retire from the E20 partnership vehicle and GLA Holdings Ltd will take up its 99% membership share. GLA Holdings will also acquire SELH. The members agreement will be revised to reflect the new ownership.
	 From 1 April 2025 E20 Stadium LLP will be an arm's length subsidiary of GLA Holdings Ltd and be renamed as London Stadium LLP. Like other arm's length bodies, its interaction with GLA decision- making will be limited to specified areas, as set out in the revised members' agreement. These will be matters which are either reserved for the Mayor or for GLA consent.
	 From April 2025, the London Stadium LLP Board will be expanded to include a senior GLA and Mayoral officers, three non-executive directors and a new Chair. LLDC's Executive Director of Park Operations and Venues will attend as an observer to ensure there is coordination of activities across the Park and Stadium.
	 LLDC's Park Operations team already works closely with London Stadium colleagues on security, events and facilities management to ensure that respective roles and responsibilities are clear at all times. The systems and processes for doing this will be reviewed and enhanced as part of the transfer of strategic responsibilities.
	 The purpose of this EIA is to review the potential impact of these changes on those with protected characteristics external to LLDC and GLA Holdings (local communities, residents, businesses, visitors etc).
Scope	This EIA assesses the equality impacts on protected groups of the transfer of strategic responsibilities for the London Stadium from LLDC to GLA Holdings.

The work is overseen by a GLA-LLDC Stadium Steering Group of GLA and LLDC senior officers which meets every six weeks (between September 2024 and March 2025) and a working

	group of LLDC, GLA and LS185 officers that has been meeting monthly since September 2024 to progress various workstreams.
	LLDC's stakeholders have been informed of the proposed transfer of strategic responsibilities via an announcement in August 2024.
	The LLDC Board approved the transfer of strategic responsibilities, subject to Mayoral consent in November 2024.

- All of London Stadium's accessible toilets are unisex, and available on all levels close to wheelchair bays. London Stadium also has three adult Changing Places facilities.
