Thank you for your request for information which the Greater London Authority (GLA) received on 29 May 2025. Your request has been considered under the Freedom of Information Act (FOI) 2000.

You requested:

This is an FOI request about the Night Time Industries Associations.

- 1. Has the GLA spent any money with the NTIA in the past five years? If so please state the amount spent and nature of the work completed.
- 2. Have members of the GLA met with the NTIA in the past 12 months? If so please state how many time and who was present.
- 3. For each meeting please provide copies of memoranda related to the meetings such as briefings and readouts.

Our response to your request is as follows:

- 1. In 2023, the GLA paid the NTIA £1,980 to deliver first aid training for LGBTQI+ venues following a homophobic attack outside the Two Brewers in Clapham.
- 2. The NTIA and representatives of the GLA have attended meetings together 25 times Some of these meetings were hosted by the GLA or NTIA whilst some were hosted by others, with GI A and NTIA in attendance:

3. We do not hold accompanying information for all meetings. Please find attached the information that we do hold within the scope of your request and links to where relevant information is published in the table above.

Please note that some of the material which is appended to the meetings is exempt from disclosure under Section 22 of the FOI Act. Section 22 of the FOIA provides an exemption for information that is intended to be published in the future. Information is exempt if, at the time when the public authority receives a request for it:

- the public authority holds the requested information;
- the public authority intends the information to be published at some future date, whether that date is determined or not; and
- in all the circumstances it is reasonable to withhold the information until its planned publication.

Section 22 acknowledges that public authorities must have freedom to be able to determine their own publication timetables. This allows them to deal with the necessary preparation, administration and context of publication. It is however necessary to consider whether the public interest in maintaining the exemption (and withholding the information until the publication date), is greater than the public interest in releasing the information before this date.

In this instance, it is felt that there is a greater public interest to keep to its original timetable of disclosure. The content is scheduled for publication within the upcoming task force report and the Government's response.

The public interest – i.e. the best interests of the public – is met by the GLA being open and transparent, but also by managing public resources effectively, and this includes the Government setting reasonable publication schedules to meet this public interest. While there is an obvious public interest in the release of content scheduled for the upcoming taskforce report, we believe this is met by the intention to publish this information in the coming months. We do not believe the public interest favours the disruption that would be caused to GLA and central Government staff by expediting this publication when its early publication would not meet any immediate or exceptional public concerns at the present time. We therefore find the balance of public interest falls in maintaining the exemption in accordance with the existing publication timetable.


