
Easy Read




This is an Easy Read version of some information. It may not include all of the information but it will tell you about the important parts.

About this booklet



Liberty is the Mayor of London's festival for artists who are D/deaf, disabled, and neurodivergent.



The **Liberty Advisory Group** gives advice about the festival.



The group helps with planning and making sure the festival is **accessible**.

Accessible means it is easy to experience and suitable for people with different needs.



This booklet is about what to expect if you become a member of the Liberty Advisory Group.

Liberty Advisory Group members



The group includes members who are experts in D/deaf, disabled and neurodivergent art.

The group also includes members from London Borough of Culture.

London Borough of Culture is a project that gives councils money to run art and culture events in London.



Members can choose to join on their own, or as part of an organisation.



Members will join the Liberty Advisory Group for 4 years, from 2024 to 2028.



There is an option to leave the group after 2 years, in August 2026.

Meetings

4 to 6 meetings

The Liberty Advisory Group will have between 4 and 6 meetings every year.

Wandsworth

Haringey

The Liberty Festival will happen in Wandsworth in 2025 and in Haringey in 2027.

6 meetings

There will be 6 meetings in the years when the festival happens.



All the meetings will be 2 hours or less.

24 hours every year

Members will need to take part in meetings for up to 24 hours every year.



Some of the meetings will be online only.




Some of the meetings will be in-person, with an option to join online.

Members can run the meetings together or choose someone to be in charge of running the meetings.




The Greater London Authority (GLA) will make and share notes about every meeting.



Members will:

 Help teams run the Liberty Festival in Wandsworth and Haringey.



This includes sharing ideas about the kinds of art, artists and events there should be at the Liberty Festival.



 Give advice on how to make the festival accessible for everyone.



Members will also:

 Share information about the festival with the public.




Say what they think about the festival.

This is a website about the history of the Liberty Festival.




 Respect and work well with other members to make decisions and give advice.




We can also ask members to leave.

Giving feedback




You can give us **feedback** at any time.

Feedback is when you share what you think about the Liberty Advisory Group.



Code of conduct



This part of the booklet will tell you about our **code of conduct**.

Remember, our **code of conduct** is a set of rules about how we expect our members to behave.



Our code of conduct says that members must:






 Not use their role as a member to get money or special treatment for themselves



 Not use their role as a member to get money or special treatment for their families or friends.





 Not behave in a way that could make people think they are not honest.



 Listen to what other people think, but still make decisions for themselves.



 Follow the law and act in a way that makes people trust them.



 Respect the Mayor, people from the GLA, and the London Assembly, and the work they do.



The **London Assembly** is a group that helps make sure the Mayor makes good decisions.

Our code of conduct also says that members must:



 Be accountable to the Mayor, the public and the London Assembly.
 This means accepting what you have done and explaining why.



Being accountable also means saying sorry if you have done something wrong.



 Show that they are following the code of conduct to help people trust the Liberty Advisory Group.
