Thank you for your request for information which the Greater London Authority (GLA) received on 5 November 2018. I am sorry for the long delay in responding. Your request has been dealt with under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

You requested:

A copy of any guidance issued by the GLA's monitoring officer to the Mayor of London and his office ahead of the filming of the Mayor's #PeoplesVote video.

Any costs - such as filming and production, post production, etc - associated with the filming of the #PeoplesVote video.

A copy of any scripts or notices of what would be said in the video, shared with the GLA's monitoring officer before the filming of the video.

All correspondence received and sent by the GLA's monitoring officer, the Mayor of London, the Mayor's Chief of Staff, the Mayoral Director - Policy, the Mayoral Director - Communications, Mayoral Director - External and International Affairs, Mayoral Director - Political and Public Affairs, and the Mayor of London's Press Office related to the approval, pre-production, production and publication of the #PeoplesVote video.

Please find attached the information we hold within the scope of your request. We have made some significant redactions where we have identified information that is exempt under Section 42 (1) – legal professional privilege which provides that

(1) Information in respect of which a claim to legal professional privilege or, in Scotland, to confidentiality of communications could be maintained in legal proceedings is exempt information.

There are also a number of redactions where we have removed information that not within the scope of your request. Where whole pages are out of scope, theses have been removed rather than redacted. In each case we have marked whether the information is exempt or out of scope.

The remaining redactions are for names of some members of staff which are exempt from disclosure under s.40 (Personal information) of the Freedom of Information Act. This information could potentially identify specific employees and as such constitutes as personal data which is defined by Article 4(1) of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) to mean any information relating to an identified or identifiable living individual. It is considered that disclosure of this information would contravene the first data protection principle under Article 5(1) of GDPR which states that Personal data must be processed lawfully, fairly and in a transparent manner in relation to the data subject.

Costs

We do not hold information relating to the cost of this video. This video was filmed and produced in house by a member of GLA staff, no external fees were incurred.

Section 42 (1) – legal professional privilege

(1) Information in respect of which a claim to legal professional privilege or, in Scotland, to confidentiality of communications could be maintained in legal proceedings is exempt information.

We believe that this information is exempt from disclosure under sections 42 of the Act. Legal advice remains subject to legal professional privilege and is therefore exempt under section 42.

Legal Professional Privilege (LPP) protects confidential communication between lawyers and clients, and is a fundamental principle of English law. The principle is based upon the need to protect a client's confidence that any communication with their legal adviser will be treated in confidence and not revealed without consent.

Public interest test

We have considered the public interest and strongly believe that the public interest in protecting legal professional privilege outweighs the public interest in disclosure.

The Information Commissioner's Office quotes from the Tribunal's case of Bellamy (2005): "...there is a strong element of public interest inbuilt into the privilege itself. At least equally strong countervailing considerations would need to be adduced to override that inbuilt interest ... it is important that public authorities be allowed to conduct a free exchange of views as to their legal rights and obligations with those advising them without fear of intrusion, save in the most clear case..."

The general public interest inherent in section 42 will always be strong due to the importance of the principle behind LPP: safeguarding openness in communications between client and lawyer to ensure access to full and frank legal advice, which in turn is fundamental to the administration of justice.

London taxpayers could be about to pick up the tab for a host of political campaigning videos after City Hall's internal watchdog authorised the use of official resources for a video backing a second Brexit vote.

Earlier this week Mayor Sadiq Khan posted the video, in which he criticises the Government's negotiating stance and sets out why he's backing the 'People's Vote' campaign, on his personal Twitter account. The video was also posted on the campaign's Facebook page.



This Saturday, I'm joining people from every corner of our country to demand the British people get the final say on Brexit.

While lacking any official City Hall or Mayor of London branding, the video was filmed within City Hall and shares its framing and styling with official Greater London Authority videos posted on the Mayor's official social media channels.

Confirming that the video had been filmed "in-house" especially "for the People's Vote campaign," Mr Khan's office claimed it was done so with the full prior approval of City Hall's monitoring officer, the official tasked with ensuring elected politicians and their staff follow local government rules.

Mr Khan's spokesperson told this site: "The Mayor makes absolutely no apologies for doing everything possible to protect jobs and growth in London throughout the Brexit negotiations.

"This video message for the People's Vote campaign was recorded in-house following legal advice and consultation with the Greater London Authority's monitoring officer."

<u>As previously noted</u>, the axing of all public meetings during the build up to even non-City Hall elections in London already frees-up Mayors and London Assembly members to campaign for their parties while still being paid by the taxpayer.

And now, thanks to this week's decision, we could well see a volley of taxpayer-funded videos pushing support for other political campaigns – it'll hardly be surprising if, in the days ahead, pro-Brexit parties on the Assembly feel entitled to access the same resources to make videos for Leave Means Leave.

The Mayor's team will of course be pleased that the monitoring officer allowed him to use the full perks of his office to push a cause popular with his own section of the Labour party but in the longer term it's possible they'll come to regret giving his rival for the 2020 election free use of City Hall's resources to comment on his policies and progress.


