Thank you for your request for information which the GLA received on 12 December 2019. Your request has been dealt with under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

You asked for;

Any emails after May 2019 discussing the Home Office's Rough Sleeping Support Service, including the contents of any attachments

Our response to your request is as follows:

Please find attached the information within scope of your request. Please note that there was more information within scope of your request than anticipated. Therefore, please note that I have not included emails that were:

- Duplicated elsewhere (e.g. sent on to another recipient for information only)
- Administrative in nature (i.e. booking meeting rooms, arranging meeting times internally and with external stakeholders) where the focus is not on the topic of rough sleeping itself.
- Drafts attachments (but I have included the email with comments of the drafting process and the final draft)
- Information on different subject matters and out of scope of your request has been redacted.

At the time your request was received some of the requested information was exempt from disclosure under section 22 (Future Publication), of the FOIA. Section 22 provides an exemption for information that is intended to be published in the future. Information is exempt if, at the time when the public authority receives a request for it:

- the public authority holds the requested information;
- the public authority intends the information to be published at some future date, whether that date is determined or not; and

• in all the circumstances it is reasonable to withhold the information until its planned publication.

The information subject to this exemption relates to drafting of the job description for the Senior Policy and Project Officer (Rough Sleeping and Migration) post. Section 22 acknowledges that public authorities must have freedom to be able to determine their own publication timetables. This allows them to deal with the necessary preparation, administration and context of publication. It is however necessary to consider whether the public interest in maintaining the exemption (and withholding the information until the publication date), is greater than the public interest in releasing the information before this date.

In this instance, the job description has since been published therefore, we are now able to release this information. Subject to further discussion we will not be relying on the exemption at section 43(2) to withhold information within scope of your request.

This is about the Government's suspension of derogation for EEA nationals who need homelessness assistance, this means that the current statutory restrictions on EEA nationals accessing statutory support when they are not exercising treaty rights have been suspended temporarily. This is to enable EEA nationals who are sleeping rough to access homelessness services for a limited time, especially since the Govt has recently provided funding to specific local authorities to respond to rough sleeping among EEA nationals.

We mentioned it in a letter to the MHCLG and Home Office Ministers which Debbie signed, though she probably won't remember the specific terminology! See attached for the letter.

Dear Mr. Jenrick,

In June, the Mayor of London joined council leaders and homeless charities in writing to the outgoing Prime Minister about the unprecedented recorded levels of rough sleeping in the capital that continue to rise at an alarming rate. The letter urged the Prime Minister specifically to provide urgent help for non-UK nationals who are sleeping on the streets by:

- reversing changes made in 2014 that restricted benefit entitlements for EEA nationals;
- prioritising the resolution of complex immigration cases, alongside fully funding adequate legal advice and support; and
- increasing funding for specialist employment services to enable non-UK nationals who can work to find secure paid employment.

We urgently need to be able to help non-UK nationals, so we welcome the Cold Weather Fund 2019-20 and suspension of derogation in relation to EEA nationals. We recognise that the temporary suspension of statutory restrictions will enable EEA nationals who are sleeping rough to access homelessness services for a limited time. However, we are still concerned that this is not a long-term strategy to address rough sleeping among non-UK nationals, and that the timescale to implement this change is also not sufficient to have a meaningful impact.

We are particularly concerned that the Home Office's approach to the development of the Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS) has eroded trust with organisations supporting the most vulnerable migrant groups. Enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and GLA-commissioned services will have no part in it. Policies that meet the needs of non-UK national rough sleepers must be co-designed with sector partners from the outset and be built on mutual trust and understanding.

Building this trust will require you to address the specific concerns of partners, including that:

- the immigration advice sector does not have the capacity to meet the extraordinary demand for their services;
- early drafts of the RSSS policy suggested charities and local authorities could re-collect information under 'public task' to refer clients into the RSSS. This would fundamentally undermine hard-earned trust built between organisations and their service users - the latter would be wary that services are working on behalf of the Home Office and, therefore, as an extension of the hostile environment;
- Home Office policies are contributing to non-UK national rough sleepers being stuck in immigration limbo. High application fees, slow and poor decision making, and routes to

- settlement that require multiple costly applications for limited leave to remain risk people overstaying their leave to remain in the UK; and
- a heavy-handed approach to enforcement and the lack of public trust in the Home Office will prevent disadvantaged Londoners from accessing the EU Settlement Scheme as they are entitled to, putting them at greater risk of destitution and homelessness.

We would welcome a conversation to discuss how to better meet the needs of non-UK national rough sleepers, as you suggested in your letter dated 11 July.



Dear Chief Executive,

We write to express our renewed concerns for the rights of migrant and refugee rough sleepers in the context of Brexit and the government's ongoing 'hostile environment' for migrants. We are writing this open letter to local authorities in relation to the Home Office's Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS).

# **Background**

The number of people sleeping rough in Greater London has increased year-on-year over the past decade. People from a migrant or refugee background make up around half of all rough sleepers in London.<sup>1</sup>

Many migrants and refugees are effectively forced to sleep rough. This is due to restrictions to their entitlement to housing assistance and welfare benefits and the difficulty of obtaining independent advice that could help them resolve their immigration status and access support services. There remains a severe lack of statutory and voluntary-sector housing provision for migrant and refugee rough sleepers in London.<sup>2</sup>

Crucially, statutory and other agencies have often failed to take a rights-based, personcentred approach to working with migrant and refugee rough sleepers, with enforcement and removal taking priority over advice and support. A culture of gatekeeping and 'presumed non-entitlement' has led to many migrant and refugee rough sleepers being refused support to which they are entitled.

As the Home Office's 'hostile environment' policies have led to an increase in street homelessness, information sharing between local authorities, commissioned outreach services

and immigration enforcement teams has damaged trust between homeless people and support services.

# The Rough Sleeping Support Service

The Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS) was set up late 2018 by the Home Office and the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government as part of the latter's Rough Sleeping Strategy. The Home Office claims the RSSS exists to 'help non-UK nationals sleeping rough resolve their immigration cases and access the support that they need'.

It is our view that the RSSS makes no sense from a support perspective. It includes no additional resources to respond to subject access requests or expedite applications and no funding to help migrant and refugee rough sleepers access independent immigration advice or accommodation

Moreover, information obtained through Freedom of Information requests suggest that the RSSS is being used to co-opt councils and charities into the delivery of immigration controls.

The Home Office wants information about rough sleepers to be shared on the basis of 'public task'<sup>3</sup> rather than on the basis of informed consent.<sup>4</sup> An initial proposal for data to be shared on the basis of informed consent was rejected by the Home Office because of concerns that rough sleepers might withdraw their consent.

The Home Office appears to want to delegate the gathering of information about rough sleepers under 'public task' to local authorities and some charities. This may be in breach of data protection laws. We are extremely concerned that the RSSS represents an attempt to circumvent consent-based data sharing and disempower homeless people with respect to their data and privacy rights.

The available information suggests the RSSS is yet another measure that makes migrant and refugee rough sleepers the targets rather than the beneficiaries of social policy.

Despite repeated requests, the Home Office has provided no detailed information about how the scheme works in practice or how data belonging to vulnerable rough sleepers is being protected.

We welcome the stance of a number of local authorities who have said they will not share information about rough sleepers with the Home Office until their concerns about data protection have been addressed.<sup>5</sup> We further welcome the letter recently written by London Deputy Mayor James Murray to the Secretary of State for Housing Communities and Local

Government expressing concern about the RSSS and its connection to immigration enforcement activities.<sup>6</sup>

We are now calling on all Greater London local authorities to make a clear statement of their opposition to a 'hostile environment' for migrant and refugee rough sleepers by not participating in the Rough Sleeping Support Service until concerns have been addressed and grounding policy at a local level in support—above all, housing—rather than coercion.

Specifically, we are asking local authorities:

- 1) To pledge not to participate in the Rough Sleeping Support Service until (a) the Home Office provides detailed and transparent guidance about how the service operates; and (b) this guidance is made publicly available.
- 2) Not to participate in any scheme that involves council employees or commissioned services including charity workers passing on personal information about rough sleepers to the Home Office without their fully informed consent at every stage.
- 3) To cancel service-provision contracts with voluntary-sector organisations that have a track record of passing on personal information about rough sleepers to the Home Office without their fully informed consent.
- 4) To make a detailed commitment to funding <u>independent</u>, <u>specialized</u> accommodation, advice and support services for migrant and refugee rough sleepers in their area.





Thank you for your letter of 4 October to the Secretary of State about non-UK national rough sleepers. I am replying as this matter falls within my ministerial responsibilities.

I am absolutely committed to supporting rough sleepers off the streets. We must be able to offer rough sleepers the support they need to turn their lives around. Whilst there have been some welcome signs of progress in the 2018 Rough Sleeping Statistics, your own annual CHAIN data set out starkly the challenges in the capital, particularly with non-UK national rough sleepers. Of the 8,855 people seen rough sleeping in 2018/19, only 49% were UK nationals.

That is why we have taken the unprecedented action of temporarily suspending the derogation (normally applied) to Article 24(2) of the Freedom of Movement Directive in London, where issues are most acute.

This gives local authorities the powers they need, and have asked for, to accommodate and support eligible EEA nationals over the winter period who have recently arrived on the streets, and are jobseekers. By providing accommodation it will support eligible EEA nationals to find employment and regularise their stay in the UK.

We want local authorities to be able to support as many individuals as possible under this scheme so that is why we have launched the £10 million Cold Weather Fund, alongside the suspension of the derogation, to bolster accommodation and services to support all eligible rough sleepers. I understand that my officials are in contact with yours about a pan-London bid and I hope that we can continue to work together to ensure that we support as many people off the streets as possible.

On the separate matter of the Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS), the previous Housing Secretary outlined, in his letter of 11 July, that the Home Office has worked with partners across the sector in London to consider a process, the RSSS, to allow local authorities to resolve the immigration status of non-UK nationals sleeping rough, which may help to unlock access to support.

The RSSS is reliant on data sharing or it cannot operate. The Home Office held discussions with partners in the sector to ensure that the process of referral into the service is transparent, open and General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) compliant so that everybody is aware of the basis for information sharing, and can be confident that they are acting within the confines of the law.

The service is not a new enforcement approach and has support at its heart. There are many possible outcomes as a result of a referral, including being deemed to be in this country lawfully. But we must be realistic; there may be people who have no right to remain in the UK and for whom support to leave voluntarily is the best option.

The work of the GLA is imperative in ensuring that we are doing everything we can to reduce the number of people sleeping on the streets in London and I need your commitment to our work with non-UK nationals. Without your support, including for the RSSS and to consider options to provide further support, rough sleeping is likely to continue to rise in London.

I would be happy to discuss this in more detail and my office will be in contact to arrange a meeting with both of you so that we can discuss how we can continue to work together on this important issue.

It wasn't captured in the minutes and I will leave it up to you to decide whether to include it or not. I made a point about access to quality legal advice and scarcity of legal aid for work on cases where someone's asylum claim was fully refused. I said that unless we tackle the root of the problem, which is good decision making and access to quality legal advice, we will never fully resolve homelessness. Thank you for attending the meeting on the Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS) at City Hall in July, convened through the Migrant and Refugee Advisory Panel (MRAP). It was extremely valuable to have your expertise and experience round the table so that the sector's concerns about the RSSS and the risks it poses could be heard by Home Office officials.

Concerns were raised in this meeting about the data shared with the Home Office on rough sleepers and whether this would be used for enforcement action, the use of Public Task for data rather than informed consent and the lack of access to independent immigration advice that would provide meaningful support for those from a migrant background that are rough sleeping. Please find attached a draft note of the meeting which we hope summarises the discussion accurately – if you have any questions or corrections to make then please get in touch.

The GLA has reiterated the Mayor's position that enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and our services will have no part in it. The GLA will continue to be clear that it cannot support any approach that victimises people sleeping rough.

As a result of this meeting, James Murray (Deputy Mayor for Housing and Residential Development) and Debbie Weekes-Bernard (Deputy Mayor for Social Integration, Social Mobility and Community Engagement) have written to Robert Jenrick, the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, as well as Brandon Lewis, the Minister of State for the Home Office, to outline concerns about the RSSS and its connection to immigration enforcement activities.

The Deputy Mayors have offered to meet with the Ministers to discuss concerns about the pressures faced by organisations supporting non-UK rough sleepers, as well as the recommendations they have made to reverse changes to welfare entitlements for EEA nationals, prioritise timely and high-quality decision

making for immigration cases and increase funding for employment services for non-UK nationals. You can see the letter attached to this e-mail.

We would welcome the opportunity to reconvene this group, to ensure that the concerns your raised have an impact on Home Office policies in relation to the RSSS. We also intend to follow up with the Home Office around the Memorandum of Understanding that they have been drafting around the RSSS and ensure that there is an opportunity for a collective response from the group on this. 

#### 1. Welcome

- 1.1 Jeanette Bain-Burnett welcomed everyone to the meeting and invited attendees to introduce themselves. Jeanette outlined that the purpose of the meeting is to hear from the Home Office (HO) about the Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS) and for the organisations attending to respond to this programme and raise their concerns and questions directly with Home Office officials.
- 1.2 Jeanette highlighted that she recognises the deeply held feelings in the room and reaffirmed the Mayor of London's position that enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and our services will have no part in it. The GLA has and will continue to be clear that it cannot support any approach that victimises people sleeping rough.

#### 2. Rough Sleeping Support Service – outline and background

- 2.1 Alison Samedi from the Home Office opened her presentation on the RSSS and noted it was a timely conversation to have with delegates. Alison noted the long development process working with experts and organisations in the field to understand key challenges. One key issue that came up was non-UK nationals sleeping rough.
- 2.2 Alison outlined the proposed role of the RSSS a small team based in Immigration Enforcement (due to the 24-hour National Command and Control unit being utilised to provide immigration information to referring organisations being based in that department). The purpose of the service was to provide swift immigration status information and prioritise outstanding cases and help resolve the immigration status issues of non-UK nationals sleeping rough. With access to different parts of the Home Office and contacts with external organisations it could help bring together the right people and processes to move cases forward to completion.
- 2.3 Alison emphasised there was no guarantee against the risk of enforced return for individuals referred to the RSSS. However, she emphasised that this was not the focus of the RSSS. The focus was on people who qualify for status to be able to demonstrate this and access any assistance or benefits they may qualify for, and for outstanding cases to be resolved. The intention was for people to be alive to their options and in some cases this included voluntary returns.
- **2.4** Alison went on to note that the Home Office was developing a formal process that complemented the way that local authorities and organisations work.
- Alison tabled the draft proposal for the Rough Sleeping Support Service pathway (attached). It was noted that the document was not finalised and open to comments from attendees.
- 2.5 Alison highlighted that, in terms of information sharing, the Home Office worked on the basis of public task, not informed consent. This meant that when a local authority or organisation passed on information about a rough sleeper to the RSSS or any other part of the Home Office this person's information was entering their systems and its processing could lead to other outcomes. For example, if the individual was wanted by the police an appropriate referral would be made. Alison re-iterated that rough sleepers needed to be fully aware of all possible outcomes before agreeing to have information passed to the RSSS.
- **2.6** Alison added that these individuals would need to engage with the Home Office at some point, as it was the only organisation which can resolve immigration issues and confer lawful status on individuals.

- advisory panel and taskforce group. As part of the work to halve rough sleeping by 2022 and end it completely by 2027 the strategy covered other aspects such as training frontline staff as well as the issue of resolving immigration cases the inclusion of these was prompted by key stakeholders. The announcement of the Rough Sleeping Support Service, and the way it had been designed, were in response to the Rough Sleeping Strategy and the views of external organisations.
- 2.8 Alison noted the importance of raising awareness of the EU Settlement Scheme (EUSS) among EU national rough sleepers this should form part of any advice these rough sleepers were given. She added that any additional ideas of information to share with frontline workers were welcome.
- **2.9** Attendees raised the following questions and the Home Office & MHCLG responded:
- Q: Concerned about the lack of independent legal advice, especially with the risk of enforcement action. Can you expand on this?
- A: The Home Office have heard these concerns before and would continue to reflect on them but at that moment in time there were no new structures or additional funds so the service would function based on currently available advice.
- Q; What risks does this service carry and what about detention?
- A: The HO hoped detention would not be used and did not plan to make enforced returns. However, if an individual had been given advice but did not qualify for status and did not want to take the voluntary returns route, detention and enforced return was a potential outcome.
- Q: What does public task mean?
- A: Usually, an individual would give informed consent to their information being shared and had the right to withdraw this consent. However, public organisations fulfilling public tasks worked differently. They would tell people what they were doing (usually via issuing them with a privacy information notice or PIN), such as passing information to other organisations (e.g. law enforcement) if there was a legitimate reason to do so (e.g. criminal behaviour). Once an individual decided to take part in the RSSS, they needed to be aware that the Home Office processed data under public task. This was not something new or unique to the Rough Sleeping Support Service and was how the Home Office usually operated.
- Q: When developing the Rough Sleeping Strategy, it was promised that representation from the migrant sector would be included. Was this ever actioned? And are there equality impact assessments that can be shared?
- A: MHCLG undertook a public sector equality duty for the Rough Sleeping Strategy. MHCLG have since confirmed that this was not published. The 61 commitments in the Rough Sleeping Strategy are owned by a range of departments and it is the responsibility of policy owners to conduct the equality impact assessments.
- Q: When was it decided to use the public task approach Was this discussed with other organisations / partners (e.g. GLA, local authorities, charities)?
- A: The remit and responsibilities of the Home Office meant the department worked using the basis of public task. There had been internal discussion and external workshops with representation from

organisations including the GLA, local authorities and the wider sector. Alternative options were considered as part of this; however, the Home Office made the decision (after seeking legal advice) that they were not viable because Home Office staff could not switch between public task and informed

Homelessness organisations would likely continue to work with clients under informed consent and after a decision was taken to engage with the Home Office and information was shared then the Home Office would process it under public task (as was standard for all Home Office referrals). Organisations which had collected information on rough sleepers as part of their 'normal' work would need to 'recollect' that information after discussing with the client about engaging with the Home Office – information would not be shared 'secretly.'

# Q: Would homeless people who are not technically rough sleeping be eligible for this service?

A: Yes. In line with the strategy, once someone was sleeping rough it was almost too late. If you were working with someone in a precarious housing situation and getting status would support them to access the help they needed the Home Office would accept referrals of this kind.

# Q: Would the Home Office consider a referral process with other organisations to better support individuals with complex needs?

A: The Home Office were interested in working with voluntary organisations. Everyone had a role to play in getting people off the streets. This was about working together toward a common goal. The Home Office were having initial conversations with different organisations and had existing relationships with embassies and could potentially help people get legal documents.

# Q: Can you say more about the status of this programme and give an idea of timelines?

A: There was no concrete timeline but the Home office aimed for as soon as possible. Officials were working on key documents.

# Q: What kind of support will you offer rough sleepers who return to their own country? Are there any restrictions on their return to the UK in the future?

A: There was financial support available from the Home Office to support individuals who returned voluntarily. The support options were listed online and included a maximum amount of £2,000 per person. If someone stated that they wanted to return the RSSS team would ensure they were connected with the Voluntary Returns Service. There were other practical ways that the Home Office could help facilitate a successful voluntary return.

The Home Office took a common-sense approach to remove simple barriers to an individual returning. Regarding returns, there was a range of re-entry bans that could apply to individuals and this was not exclusive to rough sleepers. The re-entry bans tended to be shorter for voluntary returns compared to enforced returns.

# Q: Will there be community level legal advice for individuals with complex cases? How does this affect EEA nationals with non-EEA family members who are from commonwealth countries?

A: Home Office recognised the points raised about there not being enough advisers and would talk to colleagues in the Ministry of Justice, however, there were no concrete plans to change this.

Non-EEA family members were eligible to apply for the EUSS and the Home Office would encourage EEA nationals who were sponsoring family members to also apply for Settled Status.

- Q: In terms of voluntary return, can individuals choose to return to their country of birth, or do they have to return to the country of nationality?
- A: The individual had a choice as long as they had not renounced their citizenship from their country of origin. However, in the case of failed asylum seekers HO would want to ensure it was safe to return to their country of origin.
- Q: Which partner agencies from the voluntary sector are signed up to the RSSS?
- A: The HO had engaged with a lot of organisations both formally and informally; no organisations were formally signed up to it and the HO was still working on key documents.
- Q: For those with complex support needs is there any consideration around voluntary return as there is a risk of them returning to rough sleeping in their home country? Is it possible to widen access to temporary and emergency housing support?
- A: The Home Office did not monitor people after they returned to their country of origin.
- Q: What are the incentives for charities to refer people to the RSSS if it might be putting them at risk?
- A: The Home Office did not think this would put people at risk because a person with an unresolved immigration status was prohibited from working or accessing mainstream support. They would need to apply for status and if granted they would be able to access these services. There was a framework of immigration rules; some people did not qualify for status and this would continue to be the case. Not addressing their immigration status would leave people in limbo and could put them at risk of exploitation or death.
- Q: Would you support individuals in finding legal representation and putting a claim through?
- A: (Refugee Council): it would be difficult for the Home Office to give advice on someone's prospects as they are not independent. For this scheme to survive independent advice needs to be a bedrock of the programme.
- Q: Are there any financial incentives to make referrals into the RSSS?
- A: No.

#### Actions

MHCLG would share publicly available equality impact assessments under the Public Sector Equality
Duty for the commitments made in the Rough Sleeping Strategy with attendees. MHCLG have since
confirmed that whilst a Public Sector Equality Duty was undertaken for the Rough Sleeping Strategy,
it was not published.

# 3. Referral pathways and legal advice

- a programme that they work with St Mungo's on giving immigration advice to rough sleepers.

  noted that rough sleepers' cases are a different level of complexity to most and often require in depth advice and case work to untangle.
- noted that Praxis work in the best interest of the client and under the principle of informed consent. Their goal is to identify potential status and support the application process. They're able to give some indication around the probability of success or failure. However, under the RSSS they would not have the knowledge of the probability of outcomes. In noted the difficulty of explaining to a client that it is unclear what the chances of a negative outcome are.
- emphasised the importance of recognising the adversarial dynamic between clients/supporting organisations and the Home Office. This presents a huge reputational risk for these organisations as client trust could be jeopardised if organisations are seen to be engaging with the Home Office.
- suggested that rough sleeping cases could be flagged using a similar approach to how Section 17 cases are flagged.
- raised the point of Subject Access Requests being challenging and suggests that if improvements were made to this process it would make a huge difference and expedite the whole process for cases like rough sleepers.
- questioned whether it is possible for Home Office officials to use their discretion to offer indefinite leave to remain instead of limited leave to remain for rough sleepers with complex cases e.g. mental health issues, to prevent people falling out of the system during consecutive applications.
- asked for clarity on how the RSSS would help with specific complex cases. She noted from her experience working with non-UK nationals that the usefulness of embassy involvement was limited.
- ended her presentation by emphasising the Home Office's position as part of the political establishment meaning that any change in political will could alter their approach to this work.
- 3.9 Alison responded to points emphasising that rough sleeping was likely to remain a priority for central government. However, she accepted that political change could potentially take the Home Office and MHCLG in a different direction, but they were not in a position to comment.
- 3.10 Alison noted that there was a slight misunderstanding around the differences between the RSSS and current processes. The RSSS was not a separate service and was administrative by acting as a central point of contact for different parts of the Home Office. Its approach to processing data was not different to other parts of the Home Office. The Home Office had many priorities working with vulnerable people the RSSS was focusing specifically on rough sleepers as part of the Rough Sleeping Strategy.
- **3.11** Alison outlined she understood the points raised about Subject Access Requests and the RSSS was designed partly in response to this, providing real-time immigration status information.
- **3.12** Attendees raised the following questions and the Home Office & MHCLG responded:
- Q: Should the RSSS work like the Safeguarding Hubs?

A: Unlike the Safeguarding Hubs, the RSSS was a dedicated unit for rough sleepers and it formed part of the wider Rough Sleeping Strategy. The RSSS was linked to many parts of the Home Office and was essentially designed as a flagging system. The HO acknowledged that many approaches could be used to flag these cases and remained open to ideas. The goal was primarily to get rough sleepers off the street.

# Q: In terms of appeal rights, can an individual withdraw from the RSSS at the point of appeal?

A: The RSSS was not a different pathway and did not own specific cases. All cases would go through their normal process but would be prioritised by the RSSS. The HO processed data it received under public task to fulfil its statutory functions.

# Q: Could expediting cases lead to incorrect decisions?

A: The HO were not promising to accelerate processes but the RSSS would prioritise cases. The Home Office did not want to get decisions wrong.

# Q: Is the RSSS just duplicating the work of the Safeguarding hubs?

A: The RSSS could be viewed as a specific resource for rough sleepers. A political decision was made that rough sleeping was a priority and therefore a dedicated team would be established. The RSSS had relationships with other parts of the Home Office, and would work with other agencies on relevant cases, but focused on rough sleepers.

# Q: How will you support individuals already engaged with other aspects of the Home Office? E.g. victims of crime?

- A: The Home Office were keen to not confuse processes or get in the way of other issues. The RSSS would let the other services know that they were aware of a rough sleeping issue for such cases. It would be a case of assessing individual circumstances.
- Q: There is often over eagerness for different services to communicate with each other. How can we ensure that those various threads and services are joint together and that these individuals are treated as victims of crime before being seen as 'overstayers'?
- A: The Home Office would think about how this was reflected in any documentation. The priority was to get people off the streets.
- **3.13** from Public Interest Law Centre (PILC) stated that he was in attendance to express PILC's principled opposition to the RSSS.
- emphasised that PILC see the RSSS as an extension of the 'hostile environment' and this policy depends on local authorities and the civil society sector to work. This affects trust between rough sleepers and these support services.
- stated that it was PILC's view that the RSSS is pointless from a support perspective as there is no provision of independent legal advice nor does it offer to accelerate Subject Access Requests. As an unsupportive service, these immigration status checks assist immigration enforcement rather than the rough sleepers themselves.
- anoted that the RSSS serves as more of a data sharing process and there were issues around consent which make the service malign over supportive.

- acknowledged that there would be different opinions in the room but that the conversation would not be productive unless there was transparency on approaches. Public task has not been mentioned in previous conversations between PILC and the Home Office and until this point PILC understood that the RSSS would operate under informed consent. In noted that the definition of public task given in this meeting was unclear.
- noted the GLA's public response that enforcement is not the solution to rough sleeping however highlighted that the GLA has a history of facilitating co-operation between local authorities, immigration enforcement and civil society. PILC found examples of this in 2016 and 2017 respectively and the recent FOI in the Observer suggests that Home Office and the GLA are working together there is no evidence of GLA officials pushing back against this work and PILC would welcome minutes, emails etc. that detail this. emphasised that the GLA needs to develop a clear line on the RSSS.
- attended by the GLA and St Mungo's suggest that public task was the basis of the RSSS and there were no recorded objections from either organisation to this.
- **3.20** offered two observations:
  - To help rough sleepers the government needs to reinstate legal aid and end the hostile environment policy that has pushed individuals into their vulnerable positions in the first place
  - If the GLA, local authorities, and charities want the trust of rough sleeping migrants, they need to commit to a data firewall to ensure no sharing and they need to inform the Home Office that collaborative working is off the table.
- Alison (HO) noted points and explained she hoped her explanation of public task had been clear. Alison clarified that under public task, service providers as usual had a duty to explain to individuals that there were many possible outcomes. If an outreach service explained these potential outcomes, the individual could make a decision about using the RSSS having been advised and knowing that once their information was passed to the Home Office, it would be processed under public task.
- **3.22** Alison highlighted that the RSSS was working within the existing framework of immigration law and Government policy and there were no plans to change who could and could not access support (such as No Recourse to Public Funds). Alison appreciated there was opposition to this but could not comment on this further.
- **3.23** Alison noted that the Home Office wanted to do what was best for individuals and was disappointed that some organisations believed otherwise.
- **3.24** Alison recognised there were trust issues with the Home Office and expressed commitment to rebuilding this trust over time. Alison noted that it was an individual organisation's decision to engage with the Home Office and that she respected PILC's position on this issue.
- **3.25** Alison asked for clarification about the use of the term 'border guards'. responded that asking local government and voluntary organisations to become border guards was the hostile environment in practice.

- 3.26 Jeanette reiterated the Mayor's position that enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and reinforced that the GLA was providing a platform for the experts convened here to raise their concerns directly with the Home Office. The GLA have pushed for transparency with the migrant sector throughout engagement with the Home Office this meeting is the outcome of that. The GLA has raised concerns about the need for informed consent and independent legal advice to be at the centre of any solution.
- **3.27** Members raised the following points:
  - There is not enough independent immigration advice not even second tier advice for charities. There is a lack of competence in assessing immigration situations and there is no resource to effectively support rough sleepers because service providers don't have access to support themselves. There are concerns that the RSSS programme will fail if this support is not in place as organisations will not be willing to support case workers to approach individuals and open the data gate by using the RSSS. Alison noted she will take this point away and will come back with an update it, however cannot make quarantees at this moment.
  - There is interest in whether lessons have been learnt from previous prioritisation mechanisms that
    have been used. Alison noted this was a good point but highlighted that the Safeguarding Hubs
    are still a relatively new construct.
  - There is an opportunity to work with the safeguarding hubs in terms of how to help people and see them as humans instead of cases.
- 3.28 from Thames Reach set out that the reality is there are people dying on the streets and Thames Reach had therefore been engaging with the Home Office and MHCLG about solutions that meet client needs however, Thames Reach do have concerns around the RSSS and public task which they raised in meetings. echoed the views in the room that independent legal advice is needed before anyone is referred to the service and therefore as Thames Reach is not qualified to provide this advice, it will not be referring people into the scheme. He asked for help from the migrant sector to work with homelessness partners and the Home Office to provide solutions for this group.


## Actions

• Home Office would take away points on the need for independent legal advice but could not make any guarantees for a positive outcome.

## 4. Data sharing and informed consent

- **4.1** from Liberty stated that they are in principle against the RSSS and are particularly against the programme due to the public task element.
- raised concerns around trust, as the programme appears to be an extension of the hostile environment policy by asking service providers to become border guards. There is a great risk if people who are sleeping rough perceive these service providers as border guards, as they are then less likely to engage with these services and get the support they need.

- 4.3 Alison emphasised that she recognised the trust issues and the Home Office needed to work hard to rebuild this trust, however, she was unclear on what was meant by frontline staff becoming 'border guards'. The RSSS would function on the basis of service providers considering an individual case and assessing if they thought this person's immigration status was a key barrier to them accessing services. Alison highlighted that it was not the intention of the organisations the Home Office works with to remove people.
- Alison highlighted that service providers could not share data without the person's consent, but it was important people only gave their consent if they knew the full set of risks. She also reiterated that the RSSS was a voluntary programme and it was up to local authorities and other organisations if they wanted to use this service. argued that while he appreciated the service was voluntary, the existence of the RSSS would impact trust and information could still be shared.
- **4.5** Attendees discussed the definitions and limitations of public task and the role of charities and other organisations in sharing information with the Home Office.
- from PILC referred to Section 5 of the Home Office's RSSS Information Sharing Proposal, which specifically refers to public task among charity workers. Alison emphasised that the details of this proposal were continuously evolving and that the document referred to was a draft from April. She noted that there was a danger of information being taken out of context.
- 4.7 Alison addressed concerns on outreach workers' role in public task, highlighting that collecting information was part of their normal work; if the outreach worker identified that an individual had an immigration issue, they could advise the individual to talk to an independent adviser about their options. A lawyer could then make an application for them or the outreach worker could ask the individual for permission to contact the Home Office to prioritise their case. If the individual did not agree to this, then their information would not be shared.
- **4.8** asked for clarification on whether this proposal had changed completely since April. Alison reiterated that the proposal might have been articulated differently, had been refined since then and would continue to be refined following this meeting. Jeanette suggested that a fully up to date proposal clarifying the differences with the April draft would be helpful.
- **4.9** raised concerns that the GLA and St Mungo's had agreed to the proposal set out in April which included references to public task among charity workers.
- 4.10 from Barking and Dagenham Council for Voluntary Service stated that she does not see the RSSS as a workable programme and highlighted the long history of mistrust between the migrant sector, the Home Office and the GLA, which she had raised in the past. also raised concerns around the homelessness sector not engaging with migrant organisations on this issue.
- questioned whether organisations who are receiving funding through the Controlling Migration Fund will be pressured into engaging with the RSSS. from MHCLG highlighted that this is not her policy area but there was no expectation of organisations to engage with RSSS.
- **4.12** asked if the Home Office are prepared to rewrite their entire proposal. Alison responded that the Home Office were open to hearing other ideas.
- 4.13 highlighted that advice agencies see many clients who they do not actively refer to the Home Office and emphasised that engaging with the Home Office is not the only option and may even push



- 4.14 from Crisis stated that they do not believe anyone's status should be a barrier to accessing housing support. The crux for their service is informed consent and they do not believe their frontline workers are in a position to set out all the risks of the RSSS. Furthermore, individuals cannot access the independent immigration advice needed that would enable the RSSS to work.
- **4.15** also emphasised the need for a wider package of support when working with rough sleepers, particularly around voluntary reconnections. Sending individuals back to their country of origin where the same issues may arise is not a solution.
- 4.16 from Streets Kitchen questioned the usefulness of this discussion as it remains unclear what the Home Office's position is. He noted that Streets Kitchen stand in line with PILC, and emphasised that without trust in the Home Office, people will continue to die on the streets. In noted that during the process of developing the RSSS, the Home Office appeared to be working underhand and that this programme was only brought to his attention through the article in the Observer.
- **4.17** Alison responded that it was not the intention of the Home Office to keep information underhand and emphasised that the RSSS was part of the Government's Rough Sleeping strategy published in August 2018. This had been publicly accessible online since then.
- **4.18** Jeanette ended the meeting by stating that the GLA wanted to encourage earlier engagement with the sector and frontline workers. When creating policies, it is helpful to start these conversations as early as possible. It is important to go the extra mile, particularly in terms of building trust.
- responded by asking if the civil society organisations in attendance were able to keep the meeting room to continue these discussions privately, which the GLA agreed to.
- **4.20** from Refugee Council asked if in future, more information is sent in advance and that if information is changing, please give organisations notice as it is difficult to have useful discussions if information is inaccurate and out of date.







Thank you for attending the meeting on the Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS) at City Hall in June, convened through the Migrant and Refugee Advisory Panel (MRAP). It was extremely valuable to have your expertise and experience round the table so that the sector's concerns about the RSSS and the risks it poses could be heard by Home Office officials.

Concerns were raised in this meeting about the data shared with the Home Office on rough sleepers and whether this would be used for enforcement action, the use of Public Task for data rather than informed consent and the lack of access to independent immigration advice that would provide meaningful support for those from a migrant background that are rough sleeping. Please find attached a draft note of the meeting which we hope summarises the discussion accurately – if you have any questions or corrections to make then please get in touch.

The GLA has reiterated the Mayor's position that enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and our services will have no part in it. The GLA will continue to be clear that it cannot support any approach that victimises people sleeping rough.

As a result of this meeting, James Murray (Deputy Mayor for Housing and Residential Development) and Debbie Weekes-Bernard (Deputy Mayor for Social Integration, Social Mobility and Community Engagement) have written to Robert Jenrick, the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, as well as Brandon Lewis, the Minister of State for the Home Office, to outline concerns about the RSSS and its connection to immigration enforcement activities.

The Deputy Mayors have offered to meet with the Ministers to discuss concerns about the pressures faced by organisations supporting non-UK rough sleepers, as well as the recommendations they have made to reverse changes to welfare entitlements for EEA nationals, prioritise timely and high-quality decision making for immigration cases and increase funding for employment services for non-UK nationals. You can see the letter attached to this e-mail.

We have recently been informed that the Government has taken the decision to temporarily suspend statutory restrictions to enable rough-sleeping EEA nationals in London to access homelessness services for a limited time (please see the attached letter for further information). We have asked for commitments from Government that there will be no involvement from Home Office enforcement as part of this work and we are keen to ensure that the migrant sector are fully engaged with this work.

We would welcome the opportunity to reconvene this group, firstly to ensure that the concerns your raised have an impact on Home Office policies in relation to the Rough Sleeping Support Service, and secondly to ensure you can have a voice in relation to the temporary suspension of statutory restrictions. We also intend to follow up with the Home Office around the Memorandum of Understanding that they have been drafting around the RSSS and ensure that there is an opportunity for a collective response from the group on this.

In June, the Mayor of London joined council leaders and homeless charities in writing to the outgoing Prime Minister about the unprecedented recorded levels of rough sleeping in the capital that continue to rise at an alarming rate. The letter urged the Prime Minister specifically to provide urgent help for non-UK nationals who are sleeping on the streets by:

- reversing changes made in 2014 that restricted benefit entitlements for EEA nationals;
- prioritising the resolution of complex immigration cases, alongside fully funding adequate legal advice and support; and
- increasing funding for specialist employment services to enable non-UK nationals who can work to find secure paid employment.

We urgently need to be able to help non-UK nationals, so we welcome the Cold Weather Fund 2019-20 and suspension of derogation in relation to EEA nationals. We recognise that the temporary suspension of statutory restrictions will enable EEA nationals who are sleeping rough to access homelessness services for a limited time. However, we are still concerned that this is not a long-term strategy to address rough sleeping among non-UK nationals, and that the timescale to implement this change is also not sufficient to have a meaningful impact.

We are particularly concerned that the Home Office's approach to the development of the Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS) has eroded trust with organisations supporting the most vulnerable migrant groups. Enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and GLA-commissioned services will have no part in it. Policies that meet the needs of non-UK national rough sleepers must be co-designed with sector partners from the outset and be built on mutual trust and understanding.

Building this trust will require you to address the specific concerns of partners, including that:

- the immigration advice sector does not have the capacity to meet the extraordinary demand for their services;
- early drafts of the RSSS policy suggested charities and local authorities could re-collect information under 'public task' to refer clients into the RSSS. This would fundamentally undermine hard-earned trust built between organisations and their service users - the latter would be wary that services are working on behalf of the Home Office and, therefore, as an extension of the hostile environment;
- Home Office policies are contributing to non-UK national rough sleepers being stuck in immigration limbo. High application fees, slow and poor decision making, and routes to

- settlement that require multiple costly applications for limited leave to remain risk people overstaying their leave to remain in the UK; and
- a heavy-handed approach to enforcement and the lack of public trust in the Home Office will prevent disadvantaged Londoners from accessing the EU Settlement Scheme as they are entitled to, putting them at greater risk of destitution and homelessness.

We would welcome a conversation to discuss how to better meet the needs of non-UK national rough sleepers, as you suggested in your letter dated 11 July.



Dear Debbie and James,

As you're aware, yesterday the GLA hosted an engagement meeting with civil society organisations about the Home Office's Rough Sleeping Support Service. The purpose of the session was for the Home Office to provide information about the service and provide civil society organisations with the opportunity to raise risks and concerns directly with Home Office officials.

There were a number of concerns raised with the Home Office about the service, and a reiteration from some in the sector that the GLA should be stronger in its opposition to the Home Office's approach. Some of the comments made highlighted the risk that some of the civil society organisations consider the GLA to be in agreement with the current direction of travel – despite out attempts to make it clear that we have significant reservations and have consistently raised our concerns with the Home Office, this has not yet landed. It is therefore important for the Mayor and the GLA to redouble efforts to make this position clear.

Most people in the room were grateful of the opportunity to have a collective conversation, and made some specific recommendations to the Home Office on how they could improve their work to better meet the needs of non-UK national rough sleepers that we'd like to pursue.

As such, both and I would recommend that we take the following steps:

- Prioritise sharing a note of the meeting that holds the Home Office to account on its actions, including greater clarity on safeguarding hubs, the use of public task, and a draft of the MOU that would underpin this work.
- Write a joint-letter from yourselves to Local Authority Leaders that outlines the Controlling Migration Fund programme of work, announce the Mayor's increased investment in

independent immigration advice and a reiteration of the Mayor's position on enforcement not being a solution to rough sleeping, with a call for local authorities to join-us in this approach.

- Write a joint-letter from yourselves to the Minister, that sets out the Mayor's position that enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and:
  - Reiterates the concerns raised by the migrant, advice and rough sleeping sectors in the meeting, including lack of independent immigration advice, concerns about data sharing without informed consent, concerns about the implications of 'public task' being used, concerns about the impact of client-trust in outreach services
  - Announces £250k investment in legal advice for rough sleepers (n.b. the decision on this is not yet drafted so we will have be measured on the wording and agree with executive directors), calling on the Government to use the £5m funding from their rough sleeping strategy to provide long-term and holistic funding commitments to the immigration advice sector.
  - Reiterate a call for a meeting to discuss this as a matter of urgency highlighting the context of Brexit
- Put out a public statement from the Mayor referring to the above, e.g.: (1) "I'm committing £250k in independent immigration advice for non-UK national rough sleepers, and I'm calling on the Government to invest the £5m earmarked in their Rough Sleeping Strategy to help Non-UK nationals to be focused on independent advice, and to end their hostile enforcement-led approach that victimises people sleeping rough. (2) Enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and GLA commissioned-services will have no part in it I expect the same of boroughs and service providers working with Londoners sleeping rough. Informed consent and independent advice must be at the heart of our approach to end rough sleeping.

Further to this, the housing team now have funding confirmed through the Controlling Migration Fund (CMF) programme. We recommend that:

- We jointly agree rebranding the programme (which we've been clear from the outset will have no part in any enforcement activity) to remove the language of 'controlling migration', and put this under the rough sleeping services brand of 'Life off the Streets'.
- The post recruited to lead this work should sit jointly between the housing and social integration teams and will be the nominated lead on all communications with the Home Office related to non-UK national rough sleepers to ensure joint-oversight. Our teams will jointly draft the job spec, and jointly lead recruitment. This post-holder should have extensive experience from working within the migrant/advice sector.



As you're aware, yesterday the GLA hosted an engagement meeting with civil society organisations about the Home Office's Rough Sleeping Support Service. The purpose of the session was for the Home Office to provide information about the service and provide civil society organisations with the opportunity to raise risks and concerns directly with Home Office officials.

There were a number of concerns raised with the Home Office about the service, and a reiteration from some in the sector that the GLA should be stronger in its opposition to the Home Office's approach. Some of the comments made highlighted the risk that some of the civil society organisations consider the GLA to be in agreement with the current direction of travel – despite out attempts to make it clear that we have significant reservations and have consistently raised our concerns with the Home Office, this has not yet landed. It is therefore important for the Mayor and the GLA to redouble efforts to make this position clear.

Most people in the room were grateful of the opportunity to have a collective conversation, and made some specific recommendations to the Home Office on how they could improve their work to better meet the needs of non-UK national rough sleepers that we'd like to pursue.

As such, both and I would recommend that we take the following steps:

- Prioritise sharing a note of the meeting that holds the Home Office to account on its actions, including
  greater clarity on safeguarding hubs, the use of public task, and a draft of the MOU that would underpin this
  work.
- Write a joint-letter from yourselves to Local Authority Leaders that outlines the Controlling Migration Fund programme of work, announce the Mayor's increased investment in independent immigration advice and a reiteration of the Mayor's position on enforcement not being a solution to rough sleeping, with a call for local authorities to join-us in this approach.
- Write a joint-letter from yourselves to the Minister, that sets out the Mayor's position that enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and:
  - Reiterates the concerns raised by the migrant, advice and rough sleeping sectors in the meeting, including lack of independent immigration advice, concerns about data sharing without informed consent, concerns about the implications of 'public task' being used, concerns about the impact of client-trust in outreach services
  - O Announces £250k investment in legal advice for rough sleepers (n.b. the decision on this is not yet drafted so we will have be measured on the wording and agree with executive directors), calling on the Government to use the £5m funding from their rough sleeping strategy to provide long-term and holistic funding commitments to the immigration advice sector.
  - Reiterate a call for a meeting to discuss this as a matter of urgency highlighting the context of Brexit
- Put out a public statement from the Mayor referring to the above, e.g.: (1) "I'm committing £250k in independent immigration advice for non-UK national rough sleepers, and I'm calling on the Government to invest the £5m earmarked in their Rough Sleeping Strategy to help Non-UK nationals to be focused on independent advice, and to end their hostile enforcement-led approach that victimises people sleeping rough. (2) Enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and GLA commissioned-services will have no part in it I expect the same of boroughs and service providers working with Londoners sleeping rough. Informed consent and independent advice must be at the heart of our approach to end rough sleeping.

Further to this, the housing team now have funding confirmed through the Controlling Migration Fund (CMF) programme. We recommend that:

- We jointly agree rebranding the programme (which we've been clear from the outset will have no part in any enforcement activity) to remove the language of 'controlling migration', and put this under the rough sleeping services brand of 'Life off the Streets'.
- The post recruited to lead this work should sit jointly between the housing and social integration teams and will be the nominated lead on all communications with the Home Office related to non-UK national rough sleepers to ensure joint-oversight. Our teams will jointly draft the job spec, and jointly lead recruitment. This post-holder should have extensive experience from working within the migrant/advice sector.





Dear Debbie and James,

As you're aware, yesterday the GLA hosted an engagement meeting with civil society organisations about the Home Office's Rough Sleeping Support Service. The purpose of the session was for the Home Office to provide information about the service and provide civil society organisations with the opportunity to raise risks and concerns directly with Home Office officials.

There were a number of concerns raised with the Home Office about the service, and a reiteration from some in the sector that the GLA should be stronger in its opposition to the Home Office's approach. Some of the comments made highlighted the risk that some of the civil society organisations consider the GLA to be in agreement with the current direction of travel – despite out attempts to make it clear that we have significant reservations and have consistently raised our concerns with the Home Office, this has not yet landed. It is therefore important for the Mayor and the GLA to redouble efforts to make this position clear.

Most people in the room were grateful of the opportunity to have a collective conversation, and made some specific recommendations to the Home Office on how they could improve their work to better meet the needs of non-UK national rough sleepers that we'd like to pursue.

As such, both and I would recommend that we take the following steps:

- Prioritise sharing a note of the meeting that holds the Home Office to account on its actions, including
  greater clarity on safeguarding hubs, the use of public task, and a draft of the MOU that would underpin this
  work.
- Write a joint-letter from yourselves to Local Authority Leaders that outlines the Controlling Migration Fund
  programme of work, announce the Mayor's increased investment in independent immigration advice and a
  reiteration of the Mayor's position on enforcement not being a solution to rough sleeping, with a call for
  local authorities to join-us in this approach.
- Write a joint-letter from yourselves to the Minister, that sets out the Mayor's position that enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and:
  - Reiterates the concerns raised by the migrant, advice and rough sleeping sectors in the meeting, including lack of independent immigration advice, concerns about data sharing without informed

- consent, concerns about the implications of 'public task' being used, concerns about the impact of client-trust in outreach services
- O Announces £250k investment in legal advice for rough sleepers (n.b. the decision on this is not yet drafted so we will have be measured on the wording and agree with executive directors), calling on the Government to use the £5m funding from their rough sleeping strategy to provide long-term and holistic funding commitments to the immigration advice sector.
- Reiterate a call for a meeting to discuss this as a matter of urgency highlighting the context of Brexit
- Put out a public statement from the Mayor referring to the above, *e.g.*: (1) "I'm committing £250k in independent immigration advice for non-UK national rough sleepers, and I'm calling on the Government to invest the £5m earmarked in their Rough Sleeping Strategy to help Non-UK nationals to be focused on independent advice, and to end their hostile enforcement-led approach that victimises people sleeping rough. (2) Enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping and GLA commissioned-services will have no part in it I expect the same of boroughs and service providers working with Londoners sleeping rough. Informed consent and independent advice must be at the heart of our approach to end rough sleeping.

Further to this, the housing team now have funding confirmed through the Controlling Migration Fund (CMF) programme. We recommend that:

- We jointly agree rebranding the programme (which we've been clear from the outset will have no part in any enforcement activity) to remove the language of 'controlling migration', and put this under the rough sleeping services brand of 'Life off the Streets'.
- The post recruited to lead this work should sit jointly between the housing and social integration teams and will be the nominated lead on all communications with the Home Office related to non-UK national rough sleepers to ensure joint-oversight. Our teams will jointly draft the job spec, and jointly lead recruitment. This post-holder should have extensive experience from working within the migrant/advice sector.

I've seen the mayor's media appearances but, as you say, what is really needed is detailed information from the Home Office about the implications of this announcement for (1) EU citizens resident before 31st October who have not been granted settled or pre-settled status by this date; and (2) EU citizens arriving after this date. The Home Office fact sheet does not answer these concerns.

It seems clear, for example, that there will be instances in which it will be difficult for border authorities to establish whether an EU citizen arriving in the UK after 31 October has been resident in the UK before 31 October.

Is it your department who will be following up directly with the Home Office about this? We, and, I'm sure other MRAP participant organisations, would appreciate being kept up to date.







#### Purpose of this briefing

To brief you to chair the Rough Sleeping Service civil society engagement meeting

### 1. Purpose of Meeting

The GLA is facilitating this one-off engagement session with the Home Office's Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS). The purpose of the session is for the Home Office to inform civil society organisations about the service and provide civil society with the opportunity to raise risks and concerns directly with Home Office officials.

The meeting has been convened through the GLA's Migrant and Refugee Advisory Panel (MRAP) but invites specialists from across the migrant, advice and homelessness sectors. MRAP were consulted in May on whether the GLA should convene this meeting and this was agreed by members. The No Nights Rough Sleeping Taskforce also reiterated the importance of the Home Office engaging with the migrant sector to hear their concerns.

#### 4. Chair's notes

#### 14.30 - 14.45 Welcome and Introduction

#### **Key Lines**

- Welcome attendees to the meeting and invite brief introductions from delegates
- Set out that this meeting has been called to provide greater clarity of the Home Office's Rough Sleeping Support Service and provide the opportunity for the migrant, advice and homelessness sectors to have a collective conversation to raise risks and concerns directly with Home Office officials.
- Note that the Mayor of London, like many of you in this room, takes the strong position
  that enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping. We have and we will continue to
  be clear that we cannot support any approach that victimises people sleeping rough.
- We recognise the deeply held feelings in this room and want to really focus that into a
  constructive conversation focused specifically on the remit Rough Sleeping Support
  Service. Come with your criticisms but also come with your recommendations and asks
  that are realistic for Home Official officials to take back to Ministers.
- Thank Home Office officials for joining this meeting, to provide greater clarity and for their commitment to actively listen to the concerns raised by representatives in this meeting.

#### 14.45 – 15.10 Rough Sleeping Support Service Outline and background

#### **Key Lines**

- Invite Alison Samedi to introduce her team and to provide a detailed description of the remit, purpose and operation of the Rough Sleeping Support Service. Ask that attendees hold onto questions until the end of the presentation.
- Invite clarification questions from attendees before we move into discussion.

#### **Further background**

- The Home Office have shared the following text in advance of the meeting:
  - "As part of the Government's Rough Sleeping Strategy, published in August 2018, the Home Office setup the Rough Sleeping Support Service to prioritise support work on cases and help resolve the immigration status of non-UK nationals sleeping rough.
  - "The team will help individuals to regularise their status where they establish a right to remain in the UK, and support them to return home where this is appropriate. It will ensure caseworkers and other relevant staff are aware of the rough sleepers' vulnerable situation and prioritise work on their cases accordingly.
  - "It provides a single, national point of contact, which operates 24/7, allowing individuals to be referred and receive information on their immigration status. This information will be provided within 24 hours.
  - "We have been working to develop an information sharing process that would enable local authorities, and service providers, to make referrals and use the service in a way that is GDPR-compliant. We have been engaging with local authorities and service providers and would now like to open up the discussion to the wider migrant and refugee sector to listen to their views as we develop the process".
- They will be bringing a more detailed map of the service but have refused to do so before the meeting.
- An article appeared in the Observer on the 6<sup>th</sup> July entitled "Secret plan to use charities to help deport rough sleepers", based on an FOI by Liberty that looked at emails between the GLA and the Home Office related to the RSSS. While highlighting some serious concerns, we've heard from a few partners that they thought some of the claims in the article were exaggerated.
- The article includes a quote from the Public Interest Law Centre claiming that the GLA, alongside local authorities and some charities, is also trying to 'resurrect' the discriminatory enforcement activity against rough sleepers that was deemed illegal in a recent High Court Judgement. This is false, there is nothing the FOI to substantiate this claim and the Mayor has made his position clear enforcement is not a solution to rough sleeping.
- Many in the sector have reiterated the importance of speedy resolution of immigration cases
  for rough sleepers whose immigration status is a barrier to them accessing services and finding
  a sustainable route of the streets. However, this programme doesn't meet their needs in a
  number of important ways that will be explored in the discussion.

#### 15.10 - 15.40 Referral pathways and legal advice

### **Key Lines**

- Note that some issues will cut across the two themes referrals are intrinsically linked with data, and legal advice with informed consent – the intention is to hone down into some of the details without limiting or restricting discussion.
- Invite from the Public Interest Law Centre to share his concerns regarding how referrals would be made into the RSSS.
- Invite from Praxis to share her concerns about referrals being made into the RSSS.
- Invite response/clarifications from the Home Office.
- Invite further discussion from attendees.

• In order to capture some of the actions/next steps for the Home office to take away, ask attendees to spend a few minutes in twos/threes to collect recommendations. These will be stuck on the wall and can be added to at the end of the meeting.

#### Further background

- Issues that might be raised include:
- The need for a fast track service or specialist team in the Home Office that can prioritise rough sleepers. RAMFEL have told us over email that in reviewing the deaths of rough sleepers, some were trying to regularise their status or waiting on decisions. The Connection at St Martin's told us over the phone that quicker access to Subject Access Requests, fee exemptions and speedy resolutions for Biometric residence card replacement should be considered.
- However, we've also heard from stakeholders that a team in the Home Office should not sit within the enforcement unit and rely on relationships to reprioritise cases but should bring additional capacity and sit within case resolution teams.
- The level and quality of immigration advice rough sleepers receive before being referred must be considered in order to safeguard people's rights. The sector is collapsing under demand since legal aid cuts, and the remaining legal aid framework is insufficient. Many charities doing outreach work with rough sleepers don't have this legal expertise.
- The Mayor announced on Windrush Day that he will be investing £370k in the immigration legal advice sector.

### 15.40 - 16.10 Data sharing and informed consent

- Invite discussion from the group on the importance of consent and data protection.
- Invite response/clarification from the Home Office.
- Invite to share her work on data ethics and its link to this conversation.
- Invite further discussion from attendees.
- In order to capture some of the actions/next steps for the Home office to take away, ask attendees to spend a few minutes in twos/threes to collect recommendations. These will be stuck on the wall and can be added to at the end of the meeting.

### Further background

Issues that might be raised include:

- The Home Office's own database is widely understood by the sector to be inaccurate and informs poor decision making.
- Informed consent requires independent immigration advice which the sector often don't have the capacity to deliver
- We have been told over email by the Public Interest Law Centre that they believe the Home
  Office were 'circumvent[ing] consent' by asking outreach services to use 'public task' to
  collective and share information about homeless people as part of the RSSS. They have
  described this as 'legally dubious'.
- Liberty publicly criticised the Home Office in the press and said 'consent and data protection should be at the heart of our interactions with public institutions'.

#### 16.10 – 16.30 Hearing the views of the migrant sector

#### **Key lines**

- Reiterate our thanks for attendees bringing their honesty and expertise to a constructive discussion
- Note that we wanted to take some time at the end of the meeting to better understand how your voices can be heard consistently in the Home Office's policy making and delivery.

- This is a chance to reflect on what went well in today's discussion, what didn't, and what would be a useful next step.
- Invite comments from the Home Office and from attendees about what next steps should be.
- Close discussion and confirm that a note of the meeting will be shared.

## **Further background**

- The Home Office are less likely to engage on this item if the discussion isn't felt to be constructive but it is important they recognise how they have fostered distrust and how this works against their aims to end rough sleeping.
- RAMFEL raised with us over email that the Home Office need to recognise the damage of their current working practices both to individuals and to any chance of working together with charities to solve the problems faced by rough sleepers.
- Despite the impetus for this meeting being led by the migrant sector through MRAP, some
  organisations have chosen not to engage. What additional risks does this create, and how do
  we ensure expert voices are heard without organisations feeling like their integrity is at stake?
  Conversely, a number of organisations who aren't sitting members of MRAP have been keen
  to join the meeting.





As discussed last Friday, there are several reasons why I think the current Rough Sleeping Support Service the Home Office has created does not work and several suggestions I can think of to make it more useful to the sector.

#### 1. Reasons why not working:

- it sits within the Enforcement team so this will mean clients, advisors and workers will find it risky to refer
- because of the level and roles of the staff, it does not offer anything concrete in terms of fee waivers, faster decision making, etc. It only offers information. However, the sector knows that the Home Office systems are not always accurate.

## 2. Potential suggestions:

- to move the team to decision making departments and/or subject access requests department or to a higher level that can influence other teams and make decisions
- to offer fast track full subject access requests so that immigration advisers can advice destitute clients faster and avoid unnecesary time of destitution and street homelessness
- -to offer fee waivers for applications where this is not available (e.g. BRP replacement, ILR applications, NTL applications, etc)
- to offer faster good quality decision making of new and pending applications
- to make requirements of evidencing residence in the UK (e.g. for long residence or NTLs) more flexible for destitute migrants as they tend to lose all their documentation as a consequence of being homeless and organisations would only keep records for 6 years

Another suggestion I mentioned to you but that might be too ambitious:

- to offer "NASS" accommodation for those who are destitute and have any kind of application pending or who have legal aid lawyer supporting them to prepare a fresh claim - expanding on Schedule 10

I hope this is helpful and that the meeting on Thursday goes well.

In a nutshell our view is;

- A fast track service or specialist team for rough sleepers team within the home office is essential, last year 10 people died sleeping rough in Redbridge out of a recorded rough sleeping population of 65, therefore making decisions quickly is vitally important. Also as so many home office decisions are overturned we have to think of the length of time as the time it takes to get rejected and then appeal - which normally would be 6-18 months. This needs to be much shorter for street homeless clients. In reviewing the deaths of rough sleepers some were trying to regularise their status or waiting on decisions.
- Asking charities who are not qualified to understand a clients immigration status to refer them to the rough sleeping team in the home office is dangerous. The Home office can take steps to detain or remove that individual and may do so even if that person has a legitimate claim that they have so far been unable to make. The Home office need to recognise the damage they do in working in this way, both to individuals and to any chance of working together with charities to solve the problems faced by rough sleepers. They should instead fund an organisation to provide impartial advice.

I hope you are well.

In light of Sunday's press coverage, it looks like you might have an interesting MRAP meeting on 25<sup>th</sup> July.

I had agreed to write a little bit about our meeting with the Home Office in February. It seemed like the Enforcement team in charge of past unlawful actions were now in charge of a pretty ineffective team at the service of MHCLG. Or made ineffective due to past legal action and their inability to get client information from commissioned services without consent. Patrick Mahon was clear that there was no additional funds. 'Status checks' have existed for years at NSNO and they have very little use, except perhaps where people had ILR. Even then, many 'Windrush' cases

were not speeded up. Patrick was also clear there was no way of speeding up SAR (which would be useful) or casework (resolution list).

You might guess I was slightly 'surprised' when I was made aware of the documents released under Freedom of Information request last week, finding out that the Home Office was going at great length to circumvent consent and find a way for people on the ground (e.g. outreach services and daycentres) to use 'public task' to collect and share information about homeless people. The documents also reveal that non-commissioned services willing to participate may use this 'legal' (or shall I say 'legally dubious') reason to process and share sensitive data. And all this process seems to be facilitated and supported by MHCLG, the GLA and other usual suspects, e.g. St Mungo's and Westminster Council in particular. This would also explain why the Rough Sleeping 'Support' Service sits in Immigration Enforcement.

I would be interested in hearing the Social Integration team's take on this as it appears to be a blatant attack on the rights of migrant homeless people. It would seem that the Housing team continues to favour the facilitation of enforcement over support. For all of (cc-ed) past promises, it does feel like Groundhog Day.

May I request the minutes of the *No Nights Sleeping Rough Taskforce* meeting held on the 16th May 2019 and any accompanying working papers? I am of course happy to submit a formal FoI request if necessary. My understanding is that those minutes should be displayed on the GLA website anyways.







Dear Sadiq,

You will be aware of the recent Sunday Observer article entitled 'Secret plan to use charities to help deport rough sleepers'. I wanted to write to you to respond to some of the misconceptions made in the article and reiterate the importance of working together to reduce rough sleeping in London.

As you know, I am absolutely committed to supporting rough sleepers off the streets. We must be able to offer rough sleepers the support and interventions they need to turn their lives around. Whilst there has been some welcome signs of process in the recent Rough Sleeping Statistics, your own data sets out starkly the challenges in the Capital, particularly with non-UK national rough sleepers. Of the 8,855 people seen rough sleeping in London in 2018/19, nearly 50% were non-UK nationals.

In terms of the Rough Sleeping Support Service (RSSS), the Home Office has been working with your officials, providers, local authorities and charities across London and beyond to consider a process to allow local authorities to resolve the immigration status of non-EEA nationals sleeping rough which may help to unlock access to support, and for the Home Office to speed up the resolution of complex immigration cases. This continued collaboration is vital to ensure this vulnerable group are afforded support in the Capital. I want to make sure there is absolute clarity about the purpose of this service, and to emphasise my commitment to our collective endeavours to ensure that we are supporting some of the most vulnerable people in society away from a life on the streets.

I was alarmed to read that this was labelled a "secret programme". As you know, the service was launched as part of our Rough Sleeping Strategy, published in August 2018, and officials have been engaging openly with a range of local authorities and charities about how to make it work for them. Its launch was in response to growing concerns for people rough sleeping due to complex or unresolved immigration issues. The primary goal of the service remains to ensure people are able to access support to move away from rough sleeping, regardless of their immigration status. This includes resolving and proving the status of individuals so that

they might access the support to which they are entitled. It can also support people to return to their home country voluntarily where that is appropriate.

One of the key barriers for many non-EEA nationals sleeping rough is that they remain in limbo, unable to access support because they have not resolved their immigration status. The service enables local authorities to highlight these cases to the Home Office, with their clients' consent, so that the Home Office can prioritise the resolution of the cases. The service is not a new enforcement approach, and has support at its heart. There are many possible outcomes as a result of a referral, including being deemed to be in this country lawfully. But we must be realistic that there may be cases where people have no lawful right to remain in the UK and for whom, support to leave voluntarily is the best option.

The service is a vital support mechanism to ensure that non-UK nationals that are rough sleeping are able to resolve their immigration status. The service is reliant on data sharing or it cannot operate. That is why the Home Office have held these discussions to ensure that the process of referral is transparent, open and General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) compliant so that everybody is aware of the basis for information sharing and can be confident that they are acting within the confines of the law.

The work of the GLA is imperative in ensuring that we are doing everything we can to reduce the number of people sleeping on the streets in London and your commitment is needed to continue this work. Without your support, including for the RSSS and to consider options to provide further support, rough sleeping is likely to continue to rise in London, with the consequent risks to those living out on the streets.

I would suggest that we meet at the earliest opportunity to ensure that our objectives remain aligned and that we can both work together to help rough sleepers in London.



On attendees, my initial observation is that there are groups there that are not necessarily relevant for the topic of non-EEA rough sleepers, e.g. Doctors of the World, Roma Support Group (Roma tend to be EEA nationals), Poles in Need. With such a big cast list, and groups with specific agendas not necessarily relevant to the discussion, it could be diverted in different directions and lose focus. For example, there could be a lot of questions about what is being done to support EEA nationals and this service does not focus on them.





Hi Sarah

Could we get 10 mins with you today to discuss the below email from James Murray please. This is in the context of the Observer article this weekend which sets out Home Office plans to bypass GDPR to gain details about people sleeping rough to inform enforcement activity. This is perceived by the sector to be another version of a previous Home Office scheme which had been ruled illegal. One of the quotes in the article suggests the GLA is working with the Home Office to implement the Service, which is not true.

We have an MRAP meeting scheduled for 25<sup>th</sup> July for the Home Office to inform the sector about the Rough Sleeping Support Service and provide MRAP with the opportunity to raise risks and concerns about the service directly with Home Office officials. The meeting has been in the making for a number of weeks and invites went out last week (before the Observer article). The meeting has worked closely with Liberty and others to shape the agenda and it is very much a meeting that is considered useful by the sector. Colleagues in the Housing team have also been closely involved in developing the agenda. We have asked to chair.

We are really concerned that if we cancel this meeting (as requested by James and Nick) we will be sending a message that we are complicit with the Home Office on this service, when we clearly are not. This will cause unnecessary reputational damage.

It is also worth noting that we have a regular MRAP scheduled for 23<sup>rd</sup> July – if we cancel the meeting on 25<sup>th</sup> July the sector's concerns will just be raised at MRAP and we won't have the Home Office there to answer to these.

If the Mayor would like to make a greater stand on this issue (as James' email below suggests), we would suggest it would be more effective if he called for the following:

- I have committed that no second night out and I am determined that this should be a reality regardless of your immigration status. It is not acceptable that people aren't coming forward for support because they fear homelessness charities will be used as an arm of Home Office enforcement
- We must ensure Londoners are able to access appropriate legal advice and are able to access benefits
- That is why I am investing in immigration legal advice (reference Windrush announcement but there is an opportunity for additional Mayoral funding specifically for Londoners sleeping rough)
- And why I am calling on the Government to

scrap the hostile environment which puts too many Londoners at risk of discrimination and destitution end the routine use of no recourse to public funds in granting visas

conduct a one off exercise to grant indefinite leave to remain to Londoners receiving support from local authorities or homelessness charities (new line)

We would strongly recommend that these calls were made alongside facilitating the meeting, as ensuring the sector's voice is heard by the Home Office will be key to any prospect of change.



# Statement from Praxis Community Projects on the news article published by the Observer, "Secret plan to use charities to help deport rough sleepers"

7 July 2019

This statement responds to <u>The Observer article</u> detailing the Home Office's plans to gather information on non-UK rough sleepers through homelessness charities through an initiative known as the Rough Sleeper Support Service (RSSS).

In our work with St Mungo's to provide immigration advice and casework to non-UK rough sleepers, our primary concern is always the best interest of our service users. Given the Home Office culture of enforcement and removal of migrant rough sleepers, Praxis expressed scepticism about the purpose and use of the scheme when we were approached by the Home Office with regard to this initiative.

As long as projects like RSSS will lack the necessary clarity about the processes involved, and about how client data would be used by the Home Office, we will not refer our service users into any such initiative, and we will strongly encourage our partners not to do so either.

We take client confidentiality very seriously and do not share information with third parties without explicit client informed consent.
