How the Adult Education Budget is supporting London's Recovery Missions

London's nine Recovery Missions are as follows:

- **A Green New Deal** Tackle the climate and ecological emergencies and improve air quality by doubling the size of London's green economy by 2030 to accelerate job creation for all.
- **A Robust Safety Net** By 2025, every Londoner can access the support **they** need to prevent financial hardship.
- **High Streets for All** Deliver enhanced public spaces and exciting new **uses** for underused high street buildings in every Borough by 2025, working with London's diverse communities.
- **A New Deal for Young People** By 2024 all young people in need are entitled to a personal mentor and all young Londoners have access to quality local youth activities.
- **Good Work for All** Support Londoners into good jobs with a focus on sectors key to London's recovery.
- **Mental Health and Wellbeing** By 2025 London will have a quarter of a million wellbeing ambassadors, supporting Londoners where they live, work and play
- **Digital Access for All** Every Londoner to have access to good **connectivity**, basic digital skills and the device or support they need to be online by 2025.
- **Healthy Food, Healthy Weight** By 2025 every Londoner lives in a healthy food neighbourhood.
- **Enabling Resilient Communities** London's recovery must be underpinned by strong and thriving communities. There is an opportunity to build on the strength of community response with coordinated collaboration and support, targeting the areas and groups that need it the most.

The AEB in London is already supporting these missions in a number of ways, including:

- Funding skills provision that will support people into occupations within London's Green Economy e.g. construction, retrofitting, engineering, green/blue space management, and horticulture.
- Funding provision at level 3 (A-level) for 19-24-year olds to support young people's transition into further learning or employment.
- Making approximately £15m available to support more sector-based work academies, high-value courses, the Work and Health Programme and Jobcentre Plus customers with skills needs.
- Extending full funding of AEB courses to Londoners earning below the London Living Wage.
- Funding community learning that supports positive outcomes for mental health and wellbeing.
- Funding the essential digital skills entitlement to give Londoners access to basic digital skills training at entry level and level 1.
- Supporting access to digital equipment for those learners who need it.

- Funding courses in parenting, nutrition, and horticulture.
- Supporting AEB-funded providers hosting urban food growing programmes in locations that are accessible to communities and help provide healthy food environments.
- Funding the majority of ESOL provision in London and supporting the improved coordination of English Language learning in London.
