We are unable to provide a breakdown of who made the payments by each individual authority*, but we can provide the totals:

External Usage (London Boroughs, housing associations, & other public sector organisations)	
Total	£30,750,855.45
GLA Group Usage (GLA, TfL, LLDC, OPDC)	
Total	£10,335,404.78
Combined Usage Total	£41,086,260.23

*This information is withheld under section 43 (2) (Commercial interests) of the FOIA. This provides that information can be withheld from release if its disclosure would, or would be likely to, prejudice the commercial interests of any person, including those of the GLA.

A commercial interest relates to a person's ability to participate competitively in a commercial activity. Information on individual borough usage is commercially sensitive because several projects are at very early stages of development and the public have not yet been consulted on the proposals and/ or in the public domain.

Section 43(2) constitutes a qualified exemption from our duty to disclose information under the FOIA and consideration has to be given as to whether the public interest favouring disclosure of the information covered by this exemption outweighs the public interest considerations favouring maintaining the exemption and withholding the information. In this instance we regard it not to be in the public interest to release information that would be likely to affect the way in which third parties are able to negotiate matters on projects at the early stages of development.
