Extinction Rebellion protestors

West End businesses and their employees are deeply concerned by the continued disruption being caused in central London by climate change protestors. While we fully support the right to peaceful protest, we do not believe that it is acceptable to block, for such a long period of time, some of London's busiest streets.

West End businesses are already suffering from poor high street trading conditions, excessive rate rises, Brexit uncertainty and the late opening of the Elizabeth line. At a time of store closures and redundancies, this additional pressure is deeply damaging to London's economy. The cost to West End businesses is likely to run into tens of millions of pounds. It also has a negative impact on London's image abroad, already suffering because of Brexit delays, and it is undermining your own message that London is open.

Stores are reporting significant declines in footfall and spending, some by up to 25%, difficulties in receiving deliveries and journeys being disrupted due to bus cancellations, which causes major problems in staffing stores. We are also concerned that the West End is currently extremely vulnerable, since emergency vehicles are unable to access the city centre should there be an incident.

We have seen that the failure of police in Paris to take early action against the protests, has resulted in weeks of unrest in that city centre, driving away international and domestic visitors, and hitting shops, restaurants and hotels hard.

We ask, as a matter of urgency, that you take control of the situation, provide means for people to protest peacefully and supervised in the many open spaces in London and allow companies and employees go about their lawful business without threat.

Moreover, with these unauthorised protests happening more frequently, and Oxford Circus being targeted as a high-profile location, we would like to hear from you what long term measures are being put in place, to protect this vital area from regular disruption and damage in the future.

The jobs and livelihoods of thousands of Londoners are at risk.

Dear Mr Khan,

In the light of the deliberately provocative behaviour by 'Extinction Rebellion' in central London this week, do you not think it is long past time the law was changed to ban protest gatherings from public streets and public transport networks?

Every time this sort of thing happens (and if you live in central London as I do, it happens with depressing regularity) we hear the same, limp official reaction, acknowledging the right to "free speech" whilst regretting the disruption caused to London residents, businesses and visitors. Well-intentioned but equivocal statements like this achieve precisely nothing and are quite beside the point.

Blocking roads and bringing public transport services to a halt have nothing to do with "free speech". They are a form of political blackmail, pure and simple.

These are not "peaceful protests". They are calculated attempts to inflict worry, inconvenience and financial damage on other people and can legitimately be regarded as a form of violence, albeit not physical violence. Other people's rights and lives are most certainly being violated and in extreme cases, for example if incident response by emergency services is disrupted, lives could be put at risk.

The fact that actions of this kind incur extensive public costs, which those who are working and earning (as opposed to those on 'holiday' demonstrating) have to pay for, adds insult to injury. There are real and pressing problems in London which demand Police attention, as you know full well. You have complained repeatedly about cuts to Police numbers and the burdens on our law enforcement system. Yet once again we have to tolerate vast Police resources being diverted, simply to manage the self-righteous posturing of a strident and aggressive minority.

I am in favour of "freedom of speech" and "the right to peaceful protest" as much as the next man. Neither requires our capital City to be brought to a standstill. People can speak and demonstrate peacefully without barricading streets or gluing themselves to trains or buses. There are open spaces in London where demonstrations can potentially be managed in ways which avoid misery, inconvenience and potential harm to tens or hundreds of thousands of people.

It is time to stand up for London residents and businesses and for London's reputation in the world. Major traffic arteries and public transport networks should henceforth be declared strictly out of bounds to any and all protest marches. This should have been done years ago.

Over the last four days I have been contacted by a significant number of local residents and business who are, quite rightly, fed up with the ongoing disruption to their daily lives caused by the climate change protests taking place across our city.

I, of course, appreciate and respect the right to peaceful protest as a key part of our democratic tradition, and, as a Foreign Office Minister whose portfolio covers climate change, know better than most the pressing need to address this most serious of issues. Nevertheless, I am sure you will agree that what we have seen over the past few days goes well beyond a good-natured exercise in free speech and that the detrimental effect these protests are having on ordinary citizens and local business is much too great for the protesters, however well intention, to be allowed to carry on in such an flagrant way.

As I am sure you already know, West End-based businesses estimate to have so far lost tens of millions of pounds as a result of these protests. Given the already difficult trading conditions for many retailers on our high streets, this avoidable loss comes as a cruel blow in the run up to what, under normal circumstances, should be a busy Easter weekend for business. What's more, 55 bus routes have had to be suspended, inconveniencing around 500,000 passengers, while a planned disruption of the Tube network was mercifully called off at the eleventh hour. I am sure it will not be lost on you that the international reputation of our great capital is at serious risk, should we be unable to find a way to wrest back control of this lamentable situation as soon as possible.

A New British Invention



To date on a shelf because no-one with assets to waste or a comfy job wants change, but people have had enough so Extinction Rebellion is in London, and across the planet, stopping traffic – Heathrow tomorrow and it will go on, and on, until change is made.

One demand XR is making is for the 'truth to be told' - it makes urgency plain.

The truth (all data is in the public domain Public Office Sites - IPCC, NASA, NOAA, etc).

The IPCC told us in Paris in December 2015 that global warming would continue at 0.01°C pa. If we cut carbon we could stay below 1.5°C. They were wrong.

In October last year we were told that, actually, it wasn't 2°C that was dangerous to life but 1.5°C and we had 12 years to cut carbon enough to stay below 1.5°C above the pre-industrial temperature. That remains official, UK CCC and Met Office, conventional wisdom - but is wrong. We are now well above 1.5°C – we have no 12 years.

We, along with 88% of global population, live around the Latitude 44 - 64 North, temperate segment of our planet. The NASA data at

Gistemp dTs (land) tables for the Northern Hemisphere give the March 2019 Anomaly as 1.84°C. Warming is now in acceleration. Last

year, for the first time, carbon in the atmosphere rose by more than 4ppm - year on year.

We are now in deep trouble and have known it since 2011 when Google, having spent \$850m on its RE>C save the planet project,

abandoned it as 'unachievable'. Google's conclusions were in IEEE Spectrum "What it would really take to reverse climate change". No

current technology can avoid our species extinction. We need "truly disruptive technology" to survive.

Since then we have ignored titans like Professor Wally Broecker, the Father of the climate science "No amount of carbon reduction can void disaster". We are long past Stephen Hawking's 'tipping point', indeed it maybe that Dr Mayer Hillman is right - maybe we are already 'doomed' (Guardian).

What Google did not foresee is that the technology would be invented but not deployed because it would, indeed, be 'truly disruptive" and who wants change.

It will, indeed, mean huge change in replacing coal, oil and gas and also EV and wind turbines, and all post Kyoto cude-sac' alternatives; all fine until their carbon footprints told us they go, or we do.

Extinction Rebellion is disrupting ordinary lives because just as the establishment and the Elite are denying the people Brexit so these same people find it inconceivable that we should embrace change if it means wasting assets or avoiding the status quo – as GBS put it "Progress depends upon the unreasonable man".

One can only hope that Extinction Rebellion makes enough 'business as usual' impossible soon enough for 'action' to be effcetive. We are out of time. Even a global deployment tomorrow of my technology cannot reverse climate change in decade.

We need to 'panic' in its sense of coming to fear a future so grim that we have no choice: we must avoid it no less than strenuously than we resisted Hitler – with all we've got.

That means using this or better technology if it comes to hand, to convert cars to run clean, take homes and factories, et al 'off grid', make

ships and trains et al run clean, and recover carbon from the atmosphere. All out of free sunlight and nitrogen, which makes up 78% of our

air. No one invents anything – we merely find what's already there.

Consumerism was never about money, save to the none so blind, it was always about carbon and the price now has to be paid; or few, if any of us, will live to see 2050 dawn.

We are, now – this day - in real grim trouble, which Michael Gove no more begins to 'get' than does Clair Perry or Greg Clark – they are happy Fracking – Oh My!

Tonight Sir David Attenborough will tell us there is hope. With respect that is sweetening the pill. There is none as matters stand. Greta Thunberg was ignored at Davos when she told the 'elite' ~ "I don't want you to be hopeful, I want you to panic. I want you to feel the fear I feel every day and I want you to act."

I trust XR will not stop without a commitment from every party in the House to deploy the technology I am happy to give away if that is the best way to reverse climate change.

Although the disruption caused in London by Extinction Rebellion is regrettable and you and Claire Perry, Minister of State at the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy has said it isn't necessary to cause such disruption. All I have to say that it is a real shame it has come to this. HOWEVER. Until Greta Thunberg caused such a stir, none was listening, or if they were they did it with their hand over their ears. Or if they heard they either ignored it or thought it didn't apply to them. The time to act was 30 years ago when the science was becoming clear. I heard about it for the first time

In your message to the Extinction Rebellion protesters, you make two points which need remarking on.

- 1) You state that these protests are stretching police resources which are already over-stretched and under resourced. This may well be true, but this has nothing to do with the Extinction Rebellion. Instead of berating the protestors, you might wish to reflect that what you're seeing is a pretty mild harbinger of much more serious social unrest as our economy and ecology crumble, in comparison to which these generally well behaved young people will seem a trivial problem.

 I would be very happy and proud to join these protesters; the problem is that there hasn't been enough protests so far. An urgent chat with the PM along with Police Commissioner to insist on the necessary funding of the police and increasing police numbers by a few tens of thousands would make rather better sense and might avoid a serious breakdown of law and order. In addition of course you might wish to inform yourself and the PM on the Extinction Rebellion movement, and take action to deal with their message, instead of shooting the messenger.
- 2) "My message to all protesters today is clear: you must now let London return to business as usual" I had great difficulty believing you said something so profoundly unhelpful, and basically ludicrous in this situation. Can you not, for a second, understand that this is exactly what these protesters are protesting about? You couldn't have chosen a phrase more calculated to be provocative.. You have basically thrown back in their faces the very reason they're bothering you and other Londoners, and if they've any sense and moral backbone, they'll pay absolutely no attention to your injunction, as it's so blindingly obvious you really just don't "get it".
- 3) Because, Mr Khan, this "business as usual" a 4 deg C rise in global temperatures by the end of this century, a few hundred million climate refuges, and the likelihood you'll need a boat rather than a car to escape them.





For a third day, climate change activists are aiming to shut down London. Today they have claimed they will target the Tube network. So far 300 people have been arrested. Extinction Rebellion protestors have been occupying Oxford Circus, Marble Arch and Waterloo Bridge. Earlier, two demonstrators climbed on top of a DLR train at Canary Wharf, but so far there have not been reports of disruption on the underground.

Luke Hanrahan reported from Marble Arch – he spoke to an XR activist who said there was a meeting earlier today where there was a powerful consensus that there should not be any action on the underground for a large variety of reasons. He said there was also support for an escalation of disruption and activity because the government is not listening. He hoped there would be no disruption on the underground but they would actively target Heathrow Express which services the airline industry and doesn't stop in between.

The Mayor has given his reaction that protestors had jumped on a train at Canary Wharf. He says he didn't think it was the right way to protest.

Clip of SK: The issue on which the protestors are protesting about is one that is really important. We do face a climate emergency and the government has been too slow to act. What I would say to the protestors is, you have got to make sure you are safe and you have got to make sure you are not causing danger to others. You don't want to inadvertently cause problems with our public transport which is what we are going to be encouraging people to use when we face a climate emergency. I am worried about protestors targeting public transport because I am trying to encourage more and more Londoners to use public transport because it is good for the environment."

Today marks the 20th anniversary of the Brixton market nail bombing. It was the first of three attacks over two weeks in London targeting the capital's black, gay and Bangladeshi communities. Three people were killed and 140 injured.

Some travellers affected by the disruption caused to public transport by climate protesters in London have condemned the demonstrations as "seriously flawed".

And London Mayor Sadiq Khan suggested the Extinction Rebellion protests are "inadvertently" driving people away from using public transport to use taxis instead.

"The best way to address the issue of climate change is to encourage people to use public transport or to walk and cycle so inadvertently the protesters are driving people away from public transport to use minicabs and other things," Mr Khan told Sky News.

Music student Anouska Stahlmann said the protests have forced her mother and elderly grandparents to walk across London to find alternative transport.

The 20-year-old's mother has lupus, while her grandparents, who are in their 70s, were travelling from their home in Buckinghamshire to see Ms Stahlmann's sister perform in a play in south-east London.

"Considering my grandma has sciatica and my grandad has asthma, disruption on the Tubes is not an option," she told the Press Association. "They really risk being stuck in a tunnel."

Ms Stahlmann said the trio are now walking across the city to catch a London Overground service.

"I have no issue with wanting to better the environment and we're fairly conscious of it as a family," she said. "Their methods, however, are seriously flawed and are not inclusive of people who want to support the cause.

"I find it awful they're disintegrating into a rent-a-mob mentality really. I'd expect better."

Asked whether she felt Extinction Rebellion's methods are counter-productive, Ms Stahlmann said: "I mean, we're all being told to use public transport as it's healthier for the environment but, now, everyone is going to get in their cars instead today because it's going to be more reliable."

The protests have included two Extinction Rebellion demonstrators clambering on board the carriage of a Docklands Light Railway (DLR) train at Canary Wharf station in east London, with two climbing on to the roof and another gluing his hand to its window.

Sefan White, 24, who works for a company that produces bar snacks in sustainable packaging, was prevented from getting to work by the protesters.

"I'm devastated," he said. "I'm trying to get to a job now. We've got to go round Camden on a 30-pub journey and we're going to be late now.

"We're probably going to lose money today.

"They've had their picture, fair enough, that's all you need now. Why is he spending 15 minutes on top of the Tube? Explain that."

The protests have also faced criticism from a representative for businesses based in London's West End, who warned disruption caused to the shopping district could cost companies hundreds of millions of pounds.

Jace Tyrell, chief executive of the New West End Company, told Sky News the protest had brought a feeling of "intimidation" and on average caused a 25% drop in spending in the area, adding GBP12 million less was spent on Tuesday.

A bright pink boat has been parked on Oxford Street in recent days as part of the protests and Mr Tyrell warned the cost to businesses could rise if Oxford Circus and Marble Arch stations are not opened "pretty quickly".

"What we would like to see is the mayor and the Met to find a more appropriate location in Central London for the protesters to continue their peaceful protest but not hold the West End to ransom," Mr Tyrell said.

"West End businesses fully support the right to protest but actually this is causing significant damage to our area."

SHOPS and businesses in the West End have lost more than £12 million due to climate change protests paralysing parts of central London.

The sum was revealed by the <u>New West End Company</u> as activists threatened to escalate the demonstration with action to disrupt commuters on the Tube and trains.

Disruption continued for a third day running with groups camped in Parliament Square, Waterloo Bridge, Oxford Circus and Marble Arch. The road blocks including a pink boat parked in the centre of Oxford Circus have led to road closures and traffic gridlock, with 66 bus routes closed and more than 500,000 people affected.

British Transport Police have deployed an extra 150 officers on patrols on Tube and rail stations to head off disruption with officers prepared for action, including protesters getting on tracks.

Wi-fi was switched off across the Tube network this morning in an effort to prevent protesters from co-ordinating activities and sharing videos on social media.

Superintendent Matt Allingham, of BTP, said: "We will not tolerate any activity which disrupts the millions of passengers who rely on using the rail network in London."

The action has caused mounting anger among commuters and businesses and has reportedly led to a shortage of police cells following almost 300 arrests.

Joao Verga, who works at a printing company, says the protesters at Oxford Circus have caused him disruption this morning. The 58-year-old, who starts work at 5am, said: "We're trying to make a living and we can't. Why do they pick this time? We move very quick in this country, this is only going to slow down everything."

Mayor <u>Sadiq Khan</u> said he recognised the urgent need to tackle climate change but condemned the disruption. The Extinction Rebellion group, which is calling for the Government to eliminate carbon emissions by 2025, has vowed to continue the action for "as long as it takes", raising fears of travel misery for thousands during the Easter getaway.

The protests have also placed huge strain on police forces already stretched by the battle against knife crime. Met Police Federation chairman Ken Marsh told the Standard: "There are tents on Oxford Circus allowing that to happen gives the impression of creating a lawless society. The public are aware of the huge demand police officers are under, what with soaring levels of knife crime and counterterrorism. If there were to be more knife crime over the next few days then we're stretched to the point where it's difficult for us to deal with what is put in front of us."

He added that many officers were being called back from their Easter breaks to handle the protests.

Lawyer Farhana Yamin, who was arrested on Monday after glueing herself to the pavement outside the Shell building, said today's planned action would be a "small test" of tactics.

She said she "totally wanted to apologise to people who had been using public transport" during the protests, but added: "At the same time we need to take actions which are disruptive to make sure everyone understands what dangers we are facing right now."

Climate activists have chained themselves outside Jeremy Corbyn's house in the latest escalation of the civil disobedience protests that have been blocking road junctions and iconic landmarks in the capital since Monday.

At about 2pm four protesters – including one local Labour councillor – arrived at the Labour leader's north London street and chained and glued themselves to the fence outside his home. Corbyn did not appear to be at home.

One of the protesters, David Lambert, 60, who walked from Stroud to join the Extinction Rebellion protests, said they were all supporters of the Labour leader.

"We are here because we are supporters of Jeremy Corbyn and he is the best hope this country has got to get us out of this. But we need system change and a transformation of our consumer economy and we know he is a person who has the authority and power to deliver that."

The group said they had been heartened by Labour's declaration of a climate emergency and its plans for a transformative "green industrial revolution" but added they were here as "critical friends" to urge the party to go further.

Local councillor Skeena Rathor, also from Stroud, said: "Jeremy Corbyn is the only leader that can deliver these things for us and we are here to support that."

Earlier in the day, Extinction Rebellion activists glued themselves to the top of a train carriage at Canary Wharf station on the Docklands Light Railway, bringing services to a halt in the financial hub.

The man and woman unfurled a banner reading "Climate Emergency – Act Now" and glued themselves to the top of the train. Other activists glued themselves to the train. Within minutes of the action, <u>Transport</u> for London's website reported "delays between Bank and Lewisham due to a customer incident at Canary Wharf".

One man who was glued to the train, who gave his name as Mark, was removed by officers at 11.45am. Two protesters remained glued to the roof of the train. One, Cathy Eatburn, 51, said she was taking part for her teenage daughters' futures.

"I don't want to be here today and I'm really sorry for the disruption but I feel I have been forced to do this," she said. "I have two daughters and I can't sit by while their future is threatened ... The government is doing nothing — we have to force them to act."

The two protesters who had glued themselves to the roof of the train were finally removed by police at 12.40pm.

Gail Bradbrook, an Extinction Rebellion co-founder who was at the scene, explained why Canary Wharf had been chosen for the protest.

"This is the heart of the system that is bringing us to our knees causing huge disruption and chaos around the world ... so we want people to pause and reflect," she said.

Bradbrook described the protest as relatively small and said the group would reflect on its success before decide whether to escalate the transport demonstrations in the coming days.

Climate protesters climb on top of train at Canary Wharf - video

Peter, who works in financial services in Canary Wharf and did not want to give his surname, was watching from the platform as police tried to remove the protesters.

"I think it's a great thing," said the 30-year-old. "It's raising awareness and it's made me think about this issue and made me come out here away from my desk and engage with what is obviously a very serious issue."

Thousands of people have taken part in the protests, blockading four landmarks in London in an attempt to force the government to take action on the climate crisis.

On Wednesday afternoon, the four sites — Marble Arch, Waterloo Bridge, Parliament Square and Oxford Circus — remained under the control of protesters, causing delays and diversions in the surrounding areas.

Almost 300 arrests were made in the first two days of the protest. Further arrests were made on Wednesday at the Oxford Circus and Waterloo Bridge sites.

Police arrested about nine people at Waterloo Bridge just after rush hour on Wednesday morning, according to an Extinction Rebellion activist at the scene.

"We are all noticing that they [the police] are not well staffed," said Sarah Pethybridge, 65, from Cornwall, who had been there since 8.30am. "The police haven't got the kind of numbers that we would expect. I don't know, but [I think] the fact that we are spread out spreads their work, and we just get the feeling that they have to work very tactically because they don't have enough people to come down hard."

By midday the atmosphere on the bridge was relaxed, with some people watching a string ensemble playing at a stage, while others danced to pop music blaring from a small sound system.

As the Guardian watched, a call went out from the stage for activists to make their way to Oxford Circus, where police were making more arrests.

After arresting about a dozen people before 1pm, police returned in force at about 2pm and started making more arrests. The Guardian witnessed at least half a dozen protesters carried away by squads of officers, who first attempted to persuade their targets to leave of their own accord, then to walk away with them on foot, before picking them up or, in some cases, half dragging them to waiting vans.

Extinction Rebellion protesters, activists and legal observers said that some arrestees are being taken to police stations outside of London, lending credence to persistent rumours that the Metropolitan police's holding cells are being filled to capacity by the numbers of arrests during the protests. Several people said they had heard that people were being taken to Luton, while others mentioned Brighton and Essex as locations arrested protesters were being taken.

The Metropolitan police would not confirm or deny the claim. A spokesperson said: "Those who have been arrested are being taken to MPS custody suites throughout London. Contingency plans are in place should custody suites become full. We will not discuss [the matter] further for operational reasons."

The events in London are part of an international "climate rebellion" organised by <u>Extinction Rebellion</u>. Organisers said protests had taken place or were planned in 80 cities across 33 countries – from India to Australia, and around Europe and the US. In The Hague on Tuesday, activists occupied the international criminal court building.

Twenty-nine arrests were made in <u>Edinburgh</u> on Tuesday night after police cleared remaining activists who were sitting down across the city's North Bridge. By 6am on Wednesday, all had been released and charged with breach of the peace, to appear in court at a later date. There are no further actions planned in Scotland this week but a number of protesters say they will travel to London to support activists there.

Extinction Rebellion was formed in the UK last year and held its first civil disobedience protests in London in November. It is calling on the UK government to reduce carbon emissions to zero by 2025 and establish a citizens' assembly to devise an emergency plan of action to tackle climate breakdown and biodiversity loss.

On Tuesday, Supt Colin Wingrove, of the Metropolitan police, confirmed a section 14 order was in place and called on the protesters to leave Waterloo Bridge, Oxford Circus and Parliament Square but they could continue their demonstration at Marble Arch.

"In order to impose this condition, the Met required evidence that serious disruption was being caused to communities in London. We so far have 55 bus routes closed and 500,000 people affected as a result ... we are satisfied that this threshold has been met and this course of action is necessary."



At 17:32 on Wednesday, 17 April, a 24hr condition was imposed at Parliament Square and the roads leading to it.

The condition at Oxford Circus has also been renewed for a further three days. It will expire at 16:45hrs on Saturday 20 April. The same condition apply.

The condition at Waterloo Bridge remains in place. It will expire at 2110hrs on Friday, 19 April.

All three condition stipulate that protestors should continue any demonstrations at Marble Arch only.

In order to impose this condition, the Met required evidence that serious disruption was being caused to communities in London.

Based on the information and intelligence available at the time, we are satisfied that this threshold has been met and this course of action is necessary in order to prevent ongoing serious disruption to communities.

The 58-year-old, who starts work at 5am, said: "We're trying to make a living and we can't. Why do they pick this time?

"We move very quick in this country, this is only going to slow down everything."

One officer at the scene who has been on night shift added: "We don't know exactly what they're planning. We just want to go home."

Protester and climate lawyer Farhana Yamin, who was arrested on Tuesday, told BBC Radio 4's Today programme: "I totally want to apologise to people using public transport.

"But at the same time we need to take actions that are disruptive so everyone understands the dangers we're facing right now.

"I'm not someone who goes out on to the streets and disrupts and gets arrested for no reason at all - but I feel people should understand that we are at a critical moment in our humanity's history."

"I have no issue with wanting to better the environment and we're fairly conscious of it as a family," she said. "Their methods, however, are seriously flawed and are not inclusive of people who want to support the cause.

"I find it awful they're disintegrating into a rent-a-mob mentality really. I'd expect better."

Asked whether she felt the Extinction Rebellion's methods are counter-productive, Ms Stahlmann said: "I mean, we're all being told to use public transport as it's healthier for the environment but, now, everyone is going to get in their cars instead today because it's going to be more reliable."

How Sadiq Khan attempted to ingratiate himself with climate change protesters... only for them to grind his City to a halt

As statements go, it did little to dissuade climate change protesters hellbent on wreaking havoc across the streets of London.

Reiterating his "passion" for peaceful protest as "the cornerstone of our democracy", Sadiq Khan could barely disguise his glee at the idea of Extinct Rebellion taking aim at the Government's supposed inaction on climate change - while diverting attention from criticism of his response to London's knife crime epidemic.

Keen to use the opportunity to brandish his well-honed eco-warrior credentials, the London mayor told Sky News the 'climate change emergency' was a 'top priority' for City Hall.

Naturally, the former Labour MP for Tooting could not resist using the three-day upheaval in the capital, which has affected more than 500,000 people, to make a party political point too: "The Government has been too slow on climate change," he railed.

The onslaught continued as Mr Khan delighted in celebrating how well behaved the protesters had been - despite the Met making more than 300 arrests.

According to Extinct Rebellion's legal advice, some of the protesters will soon be citing Mr Khan's 'climate change emergency' rhetoric in their defence. No wonder the Police Federation thinks he may have made things worse.

As demonstrators glued to a DLR train at Canary Wharf were being forcibly removed by police and West End businesses were complaining of a £12 million loss in sales, Mr Khan was professing his "full respect" for the anarchists to the LBC's left-wing, pro-remain host James O'Brien.

Extinct Rebellion has said it wants to "shut down London" until April 29 but Mr Khan did not seem to have an answer to the question of when the protesters might be minded to put down their loud hailers.

"Well I've got to say this," he insisted. "Some of those organising over the past two or three days have been extremely cooperative with the authorities and I want to thank them for doing so."

Although it was not lost on the former transport minister that blocking public transport would simply push people into polluting cars - his critics suggested his championing of peaceful protest appeared to outweigh his concern for the average London commuter.

As his mayoral rival, Tory candidate Shaun Bailey put it: "The Mayor is telling law-abiding Londoners their interests come second to those who shout loudest and disrupt the most."

Mr Khan's solidarity with the demonstrators appeared to have been born out of the fact he attended last month's march for a second referendum.

"I was at a protest myself a few weeks ago, protesting, campaigning and lobbying on whether the public should have a final say on staying in the union and given the option of what parliament's voted for," he declared, likening the climate protesters to suffragettes.

He even generously conceded that he would support a protest he didn't believe in, adding: "You don't have to be a left of centre to be able to protest on London, you can be a right of centre person or somebody who holds views that I would find deeply objectionable."

Yet one wonders how the London mayor would treat a protest against his beloved Ultra Low Emission Zone, which is going to make travelling in central London doubly expensive for the diesel drivers Labour incentivised in the first place?

Accusing Mr Khan of "grandstanding", Tory MP Bob Neill, chairman of the All Party Parliamentary Group on London, suggested the London mayor's approach had spectacularly backfired.

"Khan's got a history of passing the buck onto others - and blaming the Government for failing to tackle climate change is just another example of this. Sadig is all talk and not enough delivery."

At 17:32hrs on Wednesday, 17 April, a 24-hour condition was imposed at Parliament Square and the roads leading to it. This has been renewed for a further three days and will expire at 17:29hrs on Sunday, 21 April.

The condition at Oxford Circus also remains in place. It will expire at 16:45hrs on Saturday, 20 April.

The condition at Waterloo Bridge remains in place. It will expire at 21:10hrs on Friday, 19 April.

All three conditions stipulate that protesters should continue any demonstrations at Marble Arch only.

In order to impose this condition, the Met required evidence that serious disruption was being caused to communities in London.

Based on the information and intelligence available at the time, we are satisfied that this threshold has been met and this course of

action is necessary in order to prevent ongoing serious disruption to communities.

As of 17:50hrs on Thursday, 18 April, more than 480 people have been arrested.

A Metropolitan Police statement said it had "strong plans" in place to deal with any planned demonstration at Heathrow Airport.

The force said: "We are aware of information that suggests the protesters will carry out a demonstration on Friday, 19 April in the vicinity of Heathrow Airport.

"We have strong plans in place that will enable us to deploy a significant number of officers to Heathrow and take firm action against any protester seeking to cause disruption at this location by committing criminal offences such as obstruction of the highway.

"We have requested mutual aid from other police forces to support our operation.

"The airport is part of our national infrastructure and we will not allow the illegal activities of protesters to cause further disruption and misery to thousands of travellers, many of them families, over Easter.

"We would urge any protester planning to attend Heathrow to strongly reconsider."

Page 2

The Met said it had cancelled officers' rest days and leave over the Easter weekend in order to deal with the disruption, as well as violent crime.

The force said: "Throughout the course of today, Thursday, 18 April, we will have had more than 1,000 officers on the streets policing the demonstrations.

"This is putting a strain on the Met and we have now asked officers on the boroughs to work 12-hour shifts; we have cancelled rest days and our Violent Crime Task Force (VCTF) have had their leave cancelled.

"This allows us to free up significant numbers of officers whilst responding to local policing. We would also like to reassure people that we have ring-fenced the VCTF so we retain the capacity to deal with any unrelated violent incidents.

"However, the protesters need to understand that their demonstration is meaning officers are being diverted away from their core local duties that help keep London safe and that this will have implications in the weeks and months beyond this protest as officers take back leave and the cost of overtime."

Met Assistant Commissioner Nick Ephgrave said the Extinction Rebellion protests are "increasing in intensity" and warned any protesters considering targeting Heathrow Airport to expect "a robust response".

He told the Press Association: "The fact it's gone on for the number of days it has does mean it's increasing in intensity - of course the disruption that Londoners have faced has continued over those days.

"It's a very significant thing and it has huge, life-changing effects so I would ask people if they want to protest - go to the place you can do that lawfully which is Marble Arch."

It's the fourth day of environmental protests. The number of arrests stands at more than 450. The Home Secretary has told the police to taker a firm stance and that protestors should face the full force of the law. More than 1000 officers have been deployed each day which the Met says will have a knock on effect on policing the city for months.

Karl Mercer reports that the Met was out in force today after criticism that they have not acted strongly enough. There were plenty of arrests today at Oxford Circus, Waterloo Bridge and Parliament Square.

Ken Marsh – Met Police Federation – there are plans afoot to deal with this. Unfortunately the legislation is very difficult around obstructing a highway and public order. Tomorrow and Saturday you will start seeing clearance of the roads.

The protestors say they will stay for as long as it takes. Officers in outer London have been put on 12 hr shifts, rest days have been cancelled.

Asst Commissioner Nick Ephgrave – Many officers are now not going away for Easter when they may have anticipated doing so. This will all have an impact of people's well being and resilience. We need to think about better legislation to deal with these kinds of protests.

It is taking up to 4 officers to arrest one person. Police say because the protest is peaceful, there is very little else they can do. The group say they will target Heathrow tomorrow. Heathrow say they are working with authorities to address any threat of protests. The Met say they have extra officers ready to respond. The Mayor has said he has grave concerns and is urging protestors to move the Marble Arch, where they can legally protest.

Extinction Rebellion has been holding training sessions for protestors who want to get themselves arrested.

Climate change protests are putting a strain on police in the capital and diverting officers away from their "core local duties", Scotland Yard said.

More than 1,000 officers a day have been deployed on the streets of London to deal with the Extinction Rebellion demonstrations this week.

The Metropolitan Police said officers have been asked to work 12-hour shifts, while rest days have been cancelled.

Those in the Violent Crime Task Force (VCTF) have had their leave cancelled and the unit has been ring-fenced to deal with any violence unrelated to the protests, the force said.

The Met said in a statement: "The protesters need to understand that their demonstration is meaning officers are being diverted away from their core local duties that help keep London safe and that this will have implications in the weeks and months beyond this protest as officers take back leave and the cost of overtime."

London Mayor Sadiq Khan said he will consider claiming compensation from the Government for the cost of policing the climate change protests. In a letter to the Home Secretary he said Government cuts have impacted the Met's capacity to respond to the demonstrations.

"The Met's ability to police protests without impacting on core policing priorities - such as tackling knife crime - has been made significantly harder by the huge cuts to Government police funding," he wrote.

Sajid Javid said the force had his full support to police the protests after meeting with Met Commissioner Cressida Dick.

He said: "I have spoken to the Met Commissioner today to offer her whatever support she may need and pass on my appreciation to the thousands of officers patrolling the streets of the capital over the Bank Holiday."

Scotland Yard has warned environmental protesters will face a "robust response" if they target Heathrow Airport, ruining families' Easter holiday breaks.

The force said it has "strong plans" in place involving a significant number of officers to deal with the planned Extinction Rebellion (XR) action on Good Friday.

The airport said it is "working with the authorities" to address the threat of mass disruption, while Home Secretary Sajid Javid has urged police to use the "full force of the law".

Metropolitan Police Assistant Commissioner Nick Ephgrave said the protests were "increasing in intensity" and warned demonstrators against targeting Heathrow Airport.

He told the Press Association: "Protesters can expect a robust police response. We are determined to keep the airport operating."

A Met statement added: "The airport is part of our national infrastructure and we will not allow the illegal activities of

protesters to cause further disruption and misery to thousands of travellers, many of them families, over Easter.

"We would urge any protester planning to attend Heathrow to strongly reconsider."

The Met have arrested more than 500 protesters as illegal demonstrations continue at Waterloo Bridge, Oxford Circus and Parliament Square, while demonstrations are allowed to continue only at Marble Arch.

The arrests are for obstructing the highway and breaching the Section 14 order that prohibits protests apart from at Marble Arch, and 10 people have been charged with those offences.

A further three people who have been charged by British Transport Police appeared in court on Thursday morning.

A spokesman for the XR group said activists will be staging protest action at Heathrow on Friday, with around 500,000 people expected to fly out for Easter breaks over the bank holiday weekend.

Speaking after a briefing with Metropolitan Police Commissioner Cressida Dick on Thursday, the Home Secretary said she had told him that more than 1,000 officers were being deployed to the streets of the capital each day of the protests.

"Let me be clear - I totally condemn any protesters who are stepping outside the boundaries of the law," Mr Javid said.

"They have no right to cause misery for the millions of people who are trying to lead their daily lives. Unlawful behaviour will not be tolerated.

"I expect the police to take a firm stance and use the full force of the law."

Scotland Yard said officers have been asked to work 12-hour shifts, while rest days and leave has been cancelled.

The force said that although the Violent Crime Task Force (VCTF) has

been ring-fenced, the protests are diverting officers away from their local duties.

London Mayor Sadiq Khan has written a letter to the Home Secretary about the increasing cost of policing a growing number of protests in London, and he is working with the Met to consider making a special grant claim over the current demonstrations.

The fourth day of protests - which have seen activists glue themselves to public transport and block bridges and major roads across the capital - began with a challenge to Environment Secretary Michael Gove to meet with activists at Parliament Square to find a solution to the issue.

And organisers said they expected even more people to join the protests, with a statement - which was later deleted - adding: "Easter weekend is tomorrow and thousands more rebels will join.

"Police struggle to arrest 350 and there are 10 times that number prepared to be arrested.

"The hollowed-out British state is overwhelmed."

Cathy Eastburn, 51, Mark Ovland, 35, and Luke Watson, 29, were remanded in custody after they were charged over their alleged involvement in obstructing trains at Canary Wharf station on Wednesday morning.

All three indicated a not guilty plea when they appeared at Highbury Corner Magistrates' Court.

Speaking from Waterloo Bridge, Dr Gail Bradbrook, a co-founder of the XR group, said demonstrators would continue to act despite the first people being charged over the disruption.

"It (the charges) might put some people off and we escalated our strategy by focusing on the rail infrastructure," she told the Press Association.

"It's certainly an option that tactics will be escalated if our demands are not met," she said.

Three environmental activists accused of obstructing London's transport network by supergluing themselves to a train were remanded in custody yesterday.

Cathy Eastburn, 51, Mark Ovland, 35, and Luke Watson, 29, appeared before magistrates facing charges relating to an Extinction Rebellion protest at Canary Wharf station on Wednesday morning. The court was told that they had stuck themselves to a Docklands Light Railway train.

The trio are thought to be the first people to be charged over the protests, which have disrupted transport services across the country. All three indicated a not guilty plea to obstructing trains or carriages on the railway by an unlawful act. They will next appear at Blackfriars crown court on May 16.

Scotland Yard last night defended its response to the Extinction Rebellion roadblocks but admitted that some of the protesters' tactics were working.

The group is known to have trained and briefed its frontline activists to engage politely with police and not to resist arrest. In a statement police said that the protesters' tactic of lying on the ground to be carried away by four officers was draining resources.

The force, which had arrested more than 500 people by last night, said that just ten had been charged with criminal offences and conceded that officers were powerless to stop the protesters they arrested from returning.

It added that it was cancelling rest days for neighbourhood police to cover the shortfall and putting them on 12-hour shift patterns, cancelling leave days for the violent crime taskforce and asking other forces to provide extra officers.

"We are looking at other tactics such as tighter police cordons, but again that is resource intensive in terms of officer numbers and more often than not it just shifts the protesters to another location near by, and does not assist in reopening roads," the statement said.

The force said that it was better to process arrested protesters quickly and release them, rather than keeping them for 12 hours waiting for a court date.

Extinction Rebellion (XR), the group behind the action, said it will be targeting protests on Heathrow today, just as around 500,000 people are expected to fly out of Heathrow for Easter breaks over the bank holiday weekend.

Sadiq Khan, the London mayor who has been accused of "aggravating" protests with earlier tacit support of their aims, last night pleaded with them to "co-operate" with the police and not go ahead with the action.

"I'm extremely concerned by reports that climate protesters are planning to disrupt Heathrow. This is extremely dangerous, illegal and is putting an unacceptable toll on our police force and our city," he said.

"I support the democratic right to peaceful protest and agree that governments need to do more to tackle climate change but these protests are now putting Londoners' safety at risk."

Scotland Yard has deployed more than 1,000 officers and cancelled leave over the Easter weekend but has failed to remove the climate change protesters from their illegal four-day occupation of four central London locations including Parliament Square.

After meeting with the commissioner yesterday, Mr Javid said: "I expect the police to take a firm stance and use the full force of the law. They have my full backing in doing so. I have spoken to the Met Commissioner today to offer her whatever support she may need.

"Let me be clear - I totally condemn any protesters who are stepping outside the boundaries of the law. They have no right to cause misery for the millions of people who are trying to lead their daily lives. Unlawful behaviour will not be tolerated.

"Everyone has the right to protest peacefully – it's a cherished, long-standing British tradition and a fundamental cornerstone of the democracy we live in. But people do not have the right to break the law and significantly disrupt the lives of others.

"Commuters trying to earn a living have been unable to travel to work and businesses disrupted. Emergency vehicles have faced difficulties navigating the road networks and the demonstrations have put added pressure on police officers whose job it is to solve crimes and protect the public."

The Met has called on other forces for extra officers to support its operation and keep Heathrow open. It warned it would take "robust" and "firm" action against anyone breaking the law by obstructing routes to the airport or flights.

A Met spokesman said: "We will not allow the illegal activities of protesters to cause further disruption and misery to thousands of travellers, many of them families, over Easter. We would urge any protester planning to attend Heathrow to strongly reconsider."

Scotland Yard has arrested more than 460 protesters at the protests at Waterloo Bridge, Marble Arch, Oxford Circus and Parliament Square.

However, police admitted yesterday the protests were "increasing in intensity" as activists started launching so-called "swarming roadblocks" where they stand in front of other major junctions to unfurl banners and block junctions.

XR organisers also said they were summoning "thousands more" demonstrators from around the country to be arrested.

Former Met Commissioner Lord Stevens urged the force to abandon its lenient approach, adding that the resulting transport chaos was "absolutely beyond acceptance."

He said: "Where the mistake has been made is to give them the authority or give them the ability to do this. And what's happened is they've stayed there," he said during an interview with LBC radio. The bottom line is, you have to get in there, you have to make the arrests and clear the streets."

Lord Stevens, who as Met Commissioner sanctioned the controversial tactic of "kettling" protesters during the 2001 May Day riots in London, warned that the failure to shut down the protests could actually be contributing to London's rising knife crime crisis.

"A lot of police will be taken from boroughs outside London," he said. "We know from past experience that when that happens crime goes up - and here we are in the middle of a knife crime crisis and we really have to get on with it."

He added that stalemate between police and protesters had become so entrenched that the time may have come for politicians to meet leaders of the group and then encourage them to break up the protests. But he concluded: "The police have to enforce the law, that's the bottom line."

Mr Khan yesterday wrote to the Home Secretary saying Government cuts were hampering the Met's ability to police the protests and put him on notice of a claim for compensation for the cost of policing them.

Sajid Javid has called on police to use the "full force of the law" against Extinction Rebellion protesters causing disruption in London to draw attention to the issue of climate change.

The home secretary, who is positioning himself for a run at the Conservative party leadership, made a series of tweets condemning "any protesters who are stepping outside the boundaries of the law".

He called on the police to "take a firm stance" against protesters who were "significantly disrupting the lives of others".

"Over recent days, commuters trying to earn a living have been unable to travel to work and businesses have been disrupted," he said, following a meeting with Met police chiefs.

"Emergency vehicles have faced difficulties navigating the road networks and the demonstrations have put added pressure on police officers whose job it is to solve crimes and protect the public.

"Let me be clear: I totally condemn any protesters who are stepping outside the boundaries of the law. They have no right to cause misery for the millions of people who are trying to lead their daily lives. Unlawful behaviour will not be tolerated."

Hundreds have been arrested and more than 1,000 officers deployed to police the protests, which entered their fourth day on Thursday.

Scotland Yard took the rare step of releasing a detailed statement setting out the difficulties they have faced keeping control of the protests, while avoiding infringing on the activists' rights to demonstrate.

They said demonstrators' tactic of lying down meant four officers were needed to make an arrest but said there was no legal justification for more draconian tactics, such as kettling and mass-arresting groups, because the demonstrations were peaceful.

Politicians have struggled to respond to the protests, as they are keen to head off complaints that not enough is being done to tackle climate change at the same time as taking a tough stance against disruption to commuters.

Javid and Sadiq Khan, the mayor of London, have come under pressure from the rightwing press in recent days to take a more outspoken stance against any protesters disrupting public transport or acting illegally.

In a letter to the home secretary, Khan suggested that cuts to funding were restricting the ability of the Metropolitan police to cope with the activists.

"The Met's ability to police protests without impacting on core policing priorities – such as tackling knife crime – has been made significantly harder by the huge cuts to government police funding," he said.

Citing £850m of cuts to the force since 2010, he added: "Whether to tackle violent crime, or police protests, our brave police officers deserve the resources they need to keep us safe."

He highlighted the increasing cost of policing a growing number of protests in London, and said he was working with the Met to consider claiming for a special grant to help with costs for the current demonstrations.

He has said on Twitter that the world is "facing a climate emergency" and that he "fully supports the right of protesters to protest on this vital issue", while urging organisers to "work with police to ensure their demonstrations are peaceful and lawful and that disruption is kept to a minimum".

The environment secretary, Michael Gove, said: "We've got the message," after some activists glued themselves to a train and others chained themselves to a garden fence at the home of the Labour leader, Jeremy Corbyn.

Claire Perry, the energy and climate change minister, also said that she "got the science, motivation and passion driving climate emergency protests" but could not see that "disrupting one of world's busiest transport systems ... blocking emergency routes and making life difficult for so many is going to build consensus and support for the changes we need".

A group of demonstrators have staged a climate change protest at Heathrow Airport.

Between 15 and 20 people, many of them aged under 17, unfurled a banner on the pavement outside the transport hub reading "are we the last generation" on Friday morning.

The protest is part of wider demonstrations around London organised by the campaign group Extinction Rebellion (XR), which has blocked routes around Marble Arch, Oxford Circus, Parliament Square and Waterloo Bridge since Monday.

Protesters stood by the tunnel that leads to Terminals 2 and 3 at the airport, but all roads around the roundabout remained open.

Extinction Rebellion said police had warned the youngsters at Heathrow that they could be arrested.

Home Secretary Sajid Javid has urged police to use the "full force of the law" to deal with illegal XR demonstrations as they enter a fifth day.

More than 500 protesters had been arrested by Thursday night as activists continued to ignore orders to leave roadblocks at Waterloo Bridge, Oxford Circus and Parliament Square.

Organisers said action would be escalated to include Britain's busiest airport on Good Friday, with around 500,000 people expected to fly out for Easter breaks over the bank holiday weekend.

Scotland Yard has warned protesters the force had "strong plans" in place with a significant number of officers ready to respond.

The airport said it was "working with the authorities", while Metropolitan Police Assistant Commissioner Nick Ephgrave said:

"Protesters can expect a robust police response. We are determined to keep the airport operating."

Mayor of London Sadiq Khan said he was "extremely concerned" about the possible disruption.

"This is extremely dangerous, illegal and is putting an unacceptable toll on our police force and our city," he said.

More than 1,000 officers have been deployed daily to deal with the protests.

Some have been working 12-hour shifts, while rest days and leave have been cancelled.

The Met said the protests are putting a strain on policing in the capital with officers diverted away from "core local duties".

After a briefing from Met Commissioner Cressida Dick, the Home Secretary said: "I totally condemn any protesters who are stepping outside the boundaries of the law.

"They have no right to cause misery for the millions of people who are trying to lead their daily lives. Unlawful behaviour will not be tolerated.

"I expect the police to take a firm stance and use the full force of the law. They have my full backing in doing so."

Mass arrests for obstructing the highway and breaching the Section 14 order that prohibits protests apart from at Marble Arch do not appear to have deterred protesters and 10 people have been charged with those offences.

A further three people who were charged by British Transport Police appeared in court on Thursday morning.

Cathy Eastburn, 51, Mark Ovland, 35, and Luke Watson, 29, were remanded in custody over their alleged involvement in obstructing trains at Canary Wharf station on Wednesday morning.

Organisers said they expected more people to join the protests and warned they would continue until their demands are met.

The group wants the Government to declare a climate emergency and take action to reduce greenhouse gas emissions to net zero by 2025.

Actress Dame Emma Thompson joined the protests in London after flying from Los Angeles.

In a video shared by the campaign group on Thursday, the Hollywood star urged viewers to "come and join" the demonstrations.

A representative of Dame Emma said she needed to take the 5,400-mile flight home to London after working in LA.

Large numbers of protesters moved from Oxford Circus to Parliament Square on Thursday night after organisers announced police were planning to make arrests in Westminster.

Sir David Attenborough's BBC documentary Climate Change: The Facts was projected on to Westminster Abbey.





Extinction Rebellion latest: police descend on Oxford Circus as Dame Emma Thompson rallies climate change activists from pink boat

Scores of police officers descended on central London this afternoon as they closed in on Extinction Rebellion (XR) protesters on the fifth day of demonstrations.

Metropolitan Police officers surrounded a pink boat in Oxford Circus as Dame Emma Thompson rallied activists with a rousing speech and poem.

She joined the protests after jetting into London from Los Angeles.

There have been more than 570 arrests this week across London linked to the protests.

"We are here in this little island of sanity and it makes me so happy to be able to join you all and to add my voice to the young people here who have inspired a whole new movement," Dame Emma said to cheers of support.

Speaking to reporters, she said her generation had failed to protect the planet for young people.

She added: "We have seriously failed them and our planet is in serious trouble, we have much, much less time than we thought.

"I have seen the evidence for myself and I really care about my children and grandchildren enough to want to be here today to stand with the next generation."

When asked whether protesters were having too much fun, Dame Emma said protests should have a sense of joy.

She added: "If you can't have fun whilst saving the planet, what's the point?

"Protest should always have a sense of joy in it because what we are protesting about is saving this extraordinary home of ours and also celebrating the passion and inspiring energy of this young generation.

"These are young people who have finally said to my generation 'I'm so sorry but you have failed us'.

"We all feel dreadful about that. My feeling is I feel massively inspired by this young generation and want to stand next to them."

She said climate change is "the most pressing and urgent problem of our time, in the history of the human race".

Shortly after Dame Emma's address, a team of police officers encircled the boat and told bystanders there was an ordinance to clear the area.

Police pushed bystanders further away from the blockade while dozens more officers moved in.

Dame Emma left the protest but told activists she was sorry she had to go.

She said it was the police's decision to expend manpower at a non-violent protest. She added: "If they choose to close down a non-violent protest by using their police... that's their decision. If that causes difficulties then that's their problem and their decision."

Earlier, on Friday morning, about 20 activists, most of them under 17, had staged a brief demonstration on roads near Heathrow Airport.

Standing close to a tunnel which leads to terminals two and three, they unfurled a black banner with the message: "Are we the last generation?"

Several police officers watched over group before an XR spokesman announced before midday there were no further plans to cause disruption at the airport.

All roads remained open during the demonstration, which is part of a two-week campaign that began in central London on Monday.

Heathrow previously said it was "working with authorities" to remain business as usual.

Waterloo Bridge has now been blocked by demonstrators for five days despite the Metropolitan Police making more than 570 arrests.

Ten people had been charged by the force by Thursday night and three others arrested by British Transport Police were remanded in custody after they appeared in court accused of obstructing trains at Canary Wharf.

The Met said: "The protesters are using tactics of lying on the ground when approached. This means that it takes at least four officers to remove one person to ensure their safety which is resource intensive."

Routes are also blocked around Parliament Square and Marble Arch, and Home Secretary Sajid Javid has urged police to use the "full force of the law".

"I totally condemn any protesters who are stepping outside the boundaries of the law," Mr Javid said.

"They have no right to cause misery for the millions of people who are trying to lead their daily lives."

Ken Marsh, chairman of the Metropolitan Police Federation, told BBC Breakfast the protests were "very, very difficult" to handle and could cost "millions".

He said: "The sufferers will be the communities in the local boroughs where officers are being taken from the community areas and the funding and money has to be found to deal with what we are doing."

XR has pledged to continue causing disruption until its demands are met.

A pink boat used by Extinction Rebellion (XR) activists to blockade Oxford Circus has been towed away by police after five days at the heart of the climate demonstrations in London.

The boat, which became a symbol for the ongoing disruption, was dismantled on Friday afternoon, several hours after Dame Emma Thompson used it as a stage to rally protesters.

Police were initially forced to remove several activists from the deck as dozens of other officers formed a huge line to force back others on the ground.

The mast was then dismantled and the boat was towed away to a nearby location as the crowds chanted, "we have more boats".

A cordon was also placed around the area during the removal.

The scene unfolded as the Metropolitan Police said it had made 106 arrests by around 5.30pm on Friday, bringing the total since Monday to 682.

"The serious disruption the demonstrations are causing to people in London and beyond is unacceptable and we completely understand the concern it is causing to those who are disrupted by it," a tweet said.

Hours earlier Dame Emma, the Oscar-winning British actress, arrived in Oxford Circus and gave a speech to crowds from the boat.

She said: "We are here in this little island of sanity and it makes me so happy to be able to join you all and to add my voice to the young people here who have inspired a whole new movement."

• Reporter VO from XR protest: To the relief of thousands of passengers flying out of Heathrow this morning, the planned protest by Extinction Rebellion protestors failed to cause any disruption but at Oxford Circus, 5 days in it is a different story. Protestors there received a boost by the arrival of Oscar-winning actor Emma Thompson.

Emma Thompson: It is extremely painful to inconvenient people and make them suffer in any way but the consequences of not acting on what is happening to the planet are so much worse that there are occasions where one has no choice but to act in this way.

Reporter VO: Enjoying a traffic-free Oxford Street, some felt the protestors had done the capital proud.

Voxes of people saying they had come to support the activists, others saying "enough is enough."

Whatever you think of the protests, they have certainly grabbed London's attention. Few would have thought the protest would shut down major streets for the last 5 days in a row but now you have the sight of a major Hollywood actor on top of a pink boat at an illegal protest. It means that these images are going to be beamed around the world for some time. Shortly after she left, the police arrived and nearby shop workers' customers were moved beyond the police cordon.

Reporter VO: It has been a long 5 days but it is possible that XR's stand at Oxford Circus is coming to an end.

Anchor: Does it look like these protests will go on much longer?

Reporter on location: It doesn't look like they will continue much longer, there has been something of a standoff between the protestors and the police and the pink boat, which has been a centrepiece of the last few days is attached to this truck ready to get dragged away.

Met rep: What we have seen is a different tactic being employed by this particular group of demonstrators and we need to learn how to respond to that. One thing that is good about this organisation is we will always respond to that, we debrief our operations and we will think about how we respond looking at tactics from us and from demonstrators and seeking to learn from this so that if it happens again, we are in a better position.

Reporter VO: You only have to look around to see what a resource-heavy operation this has been for the police. In terms of the success of the protests the past 5 days, yes they did bring parts of central London to a standstill but none of the politicians have been engaging with their key demands. So exactly what kind of effect this will have compared to the other ways of protesting about climate change will be reviewed in the next few weeks.

Extinction Rebellion: Police move in on London protesters

Hundreds of police officers have closed in on Extinction Rebellion protesters in central London as demonstrations entered a fifth day.

Officers surrounded a pink boat in Oxford Circus as actress Dame Emma Thompson told activists her generation had "failed young people".

More than 570 people have been arrested at protests this week in Oxford Circus, Parliament Square and Waterloo Bridge

Dame Emma joined the protests after flying from Los Angeles on Thursday.

She said: "We are here in this little island of sanity and it makes me so happy to be able to join you all and to add my voice to the young people here who have inspired a whole new movement."

Police wearing jackets saying "protester removal team" have begun carrying and leading activists away from the protest in Oxford Circus.

One woman was carried out the cordons by four officers while a man led was away by two more.

Under the blazing sun, people were handing out water and asking if anyone wanted sun cream, some shielding themselves from the heat with rainbow-striped umbrellas.

But this is a bank holiday gathering with a difference, between police and activists converged at the centre of Oxford Circus.

If the police had kept more of a low-key presence earlier this week, there was no mistaking them now.

Dozens formed cordons in concentric circles - one around the pink boat at the protest's centre, then one around the press and protesters - and lines of officers further down Regent Street, preventing more people coming closer.

And officer numbers increased in the afternoon, with teams armed with tools removing those who had attached themselves to the boat.

The atmosphere has been good natured, with protesters chatting to officers, with a drum beating and colourful flags fluttering in the slight breeze.

But every now and then, whistles and cheers have gone up as protesters have been carried away to waiting police vans, with shouts of "climate justice now".

One protester addressing the activists by loudspeaker emphasised it was a peaceful event, urging people not to engage in any violent behaviour.

She asked people to turn to the nearest police officer and say "I love you", to cheers from the crowd.

Before long, those same officers were removing another one of the activists.

Protests are still being held at Waterloo Bridge and Parliament Square. The Met Police said officers had been working 12-hour shifts and have had leave cancelled.



It comes as a small group of demonstrators staged a protest at Heathrow Airport amid threats to disrupt flights over Easter.

Protesters stood by the tunnel leading to Heathrow Terminals 2 and 3, but all roads remain open.



However, Robin Ellis-Cockcroft, 24, said the group had succeeded in creating an "emotional disruption" at Heathrow, adding that no further Extinction Rebellion protests would take place on Friday.


Ken Marsh, chairman of the Metropolitan Police Federation, said: "This is very, very difficult for us because my colleagues have never come across the situation that they are faced with at the moment.


"They are dealing with very, very passive people, probably quite nice people, who don't want confrontation whatsoever with the police or anyone else but are breaking the law."

Environmental activists have also been in action in other parts of the world.

In Paris, they blocked the entrance of the Societe Generale bank headquarters, as part of a protest urging world leaders to act on climate change.





Pepper spray was used by anti-riot police in an attempt to disperse the demonstrators.

Activists also gathered outside the Ministry of the Ecological and Inclusive Transition in La Defense, near Paris, and blocked the entrance of the headquarters of French oil giant Total there.







Meanwhile, two of the UK's leading thinkers on climate change dismissed the demand of Extinction Rebellion for virtually zero carbon emissions by 2025, arguing the 2050 date was more realistic.

Corrinne Le Quere, professor of climate change and science and policy at the University of East Anglia, told BBC Radio 4's Today programme that 2025 was "probably quite unrealistic" as a target to "move completely away from fossil fuels".

The economist Lord Stern agreed, saying: "The target of zero net emissions by 2050 makes sense and that looks like the right one, and I think the government is quite likely - at least I hope it will, and we'll be pressing them to do that - to come up with that target sometime in the next few months, and I think it's very important they do."

"It's like life-changingly disruptive. That's the point, that's what we're here for.

"We said we'd disrupt Heathrow and we've disrupted Heathrow. We've disrupted the narrative of everyday life. We've disrupted the idea that we can just carry on and this climate crisis is something we can just ignore and talk about later.

"It's an emotional disruption. The point of this is reaching people on an emotional level."

They have been informed by police that they are in breach of by-laws and may be arrested.

"Protest should always have a sense of joy in it because what we are protesting about is saving this extraordinary home of ours and also celebrating the passion and inspiring energy of this young generation.

"These are young people who have finally said to my generation 'I'm so sorry but you have failed us'.

"We all feel dreadful about that. My feeling is I feel massively inspired by this young generation and want to stand next to them."

The teenage founder of the school strikes against climate change has said she hopes to join the protesters in London.

Greta Thunberg told The Guardian on Friday she hopes to join the Extinction Rebellion (XR) protests when she arrives in London over the Easter weekend.

Her comments come as the protests at Marble Arch, Oxford Circus, Waterloo Bridge and Parliament Square were approaching their sixth day.

The 16-year-old Swedish activist is due to meet senior British politicians next week having already met with Pope Francis and addressed the EU Parliament.

She told The Guardian she would also like to join the protests if they are still going when she arrives.

She added: "I would love to participate in their protests while in London if there is time and if they are still protesting.

"I think it's one of the most important and hopeful movements of our time. Civil disobedience is necessary to create attention to the ongoing climate and ecological crisis."

Large numbers of police officers moved into Oxford Circus on Friday to remove the pink boat XR had installed there which has become a symbol for the ongoing disruption.

The boat, which is named after murdered environmentalist Berta Caceres, was dismantled several hours after Dame Emma Thompson used it as a stage to rally protesters.

Police were initially forced to remove activists from the deck and frame as dozens of other officers formed a huge cordon to force back others on the ground.

Activists tried to stop the boat from being towed away, with one woman gluing herself to the road in front of it in Great Portland Street, XR said.

But the group decided to let the boat go and then chanted "we love you" to the large police convoy escorting the boat before departing.

Earlier, on Friday morning, about 20 activists, most of them under 17, had staged a brief demonstration on roads near Heathrow Airport.

The scenes unfolded as the Metropolitan Police said it had made 106 arrests by around 5.30pm on Friday, bringing the total since Monday to 682.

In a statement on Friday night the force said it had focused its arrests at Oxford Circus to give businesses the chance to get back to "business as usual".

It added: "One thing that is unusual about this demonstration is the willingness of those participating to be arrested and also their lack of resistance to the arrests.

"To date, since Monday April 15, we have made over 680 arrests and of course that places a logistical problem on, and not just, the police service for cell space but also the wider criminal justice system."

Ten people had been charged by the Met by Thursday night and three others arrested by British Transport Police were remanded in custody after they appeared in court accused of obstructing trains at Canary Wharf.

Routes are also blocked around Waterloo Bridge, Parliament Square and Marble Arch, and Home Secretary Sajid Javid has urged police to use the "full force of the law".

Dame Emma, the Oscar-winning British actress, arrived in Oxford Circus on Friday and gave a speech to crowds from the boat before departing after the police surrounded the vessel.

XR has pledged to continue causing disruption until its demands are met.

Officers from London's Metropolitan Police have been accused of "brutal" treatment against climate change activists from the Extinction Rebellion group.

Footage shared on social media on Friday showed officers at Oxford Circus dragging two protesters across tarmac.

At one point, the officer dragging the female activist pulls her so quickly he loses balance and topples next to her.

As another policeman comes to assist, another officer dragging a male protester in a red t-shirt can be seen lifting him up by his belt.

"Brutal dragging of protesters by the police earlier at #ExtinctionRebellion Idn," one Twitter user said, alongside a video of the incident. It was not immediately clear when the footage was taken.

The tactic of one officer per protester appears to contradict the force's own guidelines.

In a statement earlier this week it said it took at least four officers "to remove one person from a site to ensure their safety".

"We have always been, are and will always be non-violent," XR tweeted in response to the footage. "This aggression from the police against our peaceful Rebels in London is inexcusable. Shame on them, do they not know that we are rebelling for their families and loved ones also."

In response to the video, a Metropolitan Police spokesperson told The Independent: "Protesters have been told to leave Oxford Street and go to Marble Arch. Some demonstrators have decided not to go to Marble Arch and obstructed officers in the course of their duties. The response by officers has been proportionate in order to facilitate their removal."

The incident came amid a concerted effort by police to clear the capital's busiest shopping street of protesters, who have blocked the junction with Regent Street using a pink model boat which acted as a stage since Monday.

But Oxford Street remained blocked by activists on Friday night, alongside sites at Marble Arch, Parliament Square and Waterloo Bridge.

Almost 600 people have been arrested since the demonstrations begun, including three who have been denied bail after gluing themselves to a train at Canary Wharf.

London's police have made their most concerted effort to clear climate protesters from one of the four thoroughfares in the heart of the UK capital that they have occupied since Monday.

The operation involving hundreds of officers at Oxford Circus in the West End came hours after supporters of Extinction Rebellion, the group organising the protests, failed in their attempt to disrupt road traffic at Heathrow airport.

On Thursday Sajid Javid, the home secretary, had urged the police to use "the full force of the law" against demonstrators committing crimes. On Friday afternoon the Metropolitan Police said they had arrested 682 people in connection with the protests since Monday, describing the "serious disruption" as "unacceptable".

The British Transport Police and the Metropolitan Police's Protester Removal Team surrounded a 30-foot pink boat emblazoned with the slogan "Tell the truth" that had been parked in the middle of Oxford Circus since Monday. The 20 demonstrators who had glued themselves to the vessel were taken away and then the boat was removed.

Police had also closed nearby streets, including Regent Street — usually one of London's busiest shopping venues — during the operation. But hundreds of demonstrators gathered outside the police cordon and reoccupied Oxford Circus after the boat was removed.

A protester from a Catholic group glued herself to the road in the front of the boat when it had been towed as far as Great Portland Street, delaying its removal for an hour and a half.

Then an Extinction Rebellion procession walked in front of the boat singing mourning songs around 9pm before dispersing back to the key sites.

Sam Knights, an Extinction Rebellion organiser, said the mass deployment at Oxford Circus was a new tactic by the police. "They've come a lot more prepared," he said.

Protesters have used the boat as a stage since Monday. Jessie Docherty, 42, from Wales, one of the production team for the performances, said: "This feels like a very dignified appropriate ending to a lovely time. We were here for longer than people expected. There is no sense that everybody is not going to come back again and again."

Iggy Fox, an Extinction Rebellion co-ordinator, said the removal of the boat would not end the protest at Oxford Circus. "You can see that there are far more people than there are police," he said. "Some people are sitting down to blockade and join [the protesters willing to be detained]."

Mayor of London Sadiq Khan said on Friday he shared the passion of those fighting climate change but was concerned about the demands of dealing with the demonstrations on other areas of police work like tackling violent crime.

"I urge anyone involved to co-operate with the police and comply with their instructions by attending the designated place that those wanting to legally protest should gather — Marble Arch. If protesters break the law, the police will have no choice but to make arrests."

The police were not making any effort on Friday to clear protesters from Parliament Square, Waterloo Bridge or Marble Arch, the three other venues protesters have occupied since Monday.

The scale of the protests has stretched the Met's resources. Many officers are working 12-hour shifts and have had their Easter leave cancelled.

Extinction Rebellion wants the government to declare a climate emergency, reduce greenhouse gas emissions to a net level of zero by 2025 and create a "citizens' assembly" to develop policies to reach this target.

Businesses in the West End say they have lost millions of pounds in revenue as shoppers have stayed away because of the protests.

The police operation at Oxford Circus began shortly after a speech by Oscar-winning actor Emma Thompson.

She told the Financial Times her generation had "failed" young people and that the protests were necessary to get ministers' attention. "The government has been silent on every issue except Brexit. They haven't been governing for three years," she said, adding that she was willing to be arrested.

Earlier on Friday morning, fewer than 20 activists, many of them teenagers, failed to disrupt road traffic at Heathrow, Britain's biggest airport. They tried to occupy a roundabout but were quickly surrounded by police. The action, which organisers said would "shut down" the airport, lasted about an hour.

Heathrow said there had been no disruption to services. "We are working with the authorities to address any threat of protests which could disrupt the airport," a spokesperson said.

"While we respect the right to peaceful protest and agree with the need to act on climate change, we don't agree that passengers should have their well-earned Easter break with family and friends disrupted."

This Easter the Extinction Rebellion protests remind us what true passion is all about Janet Street-Porter

The Extinction Rebellion climate change protestors are an easy target for middle England. The true believers include passionate pensioners (few have full time jobs), well-spoken teenagers (on Easter breaks from private schools), and – the icing on the cake – the presence of leading luvvie Dame Emma Thompson, who flew in from Los Angeles to state her allegiance, running up a large carbon footprint in the process.

All week, as parts of central London ground to a standstill, drivers fumed and raged. Bridges remained closed, with temporary campsites replacing the roar of diesel engines. With over 500 arrests and every cell full, police officers have had their holiday leave cancelled, accused of not doing enough to control the demonstrations. Protestors glued themselves to public buildings and trains and even pitched up outside Jeremy Corbyn's house. They were heartbroken (according to the press) when the Labour leader eventually emerged with his wife and refused to speak to them.

One person's passionate cause is another's source of unspeakable irritation. Tourists and visitors might have found the demonstrations entertaining, but office workers and commuters weren't so tolerant. I had to catch a train from Liverpool Street on Wednesday and spent all morning worrying whether the underground was going to be closed down (it wasn't). Today, tempers will flare as half a million travellers attempt to fly out of Heathrow on Easter breaks. Protestors have signalled they'd like to close the airport down, claiming air travel should be rationed and only used for emergencies.

It's not hard to mock these earnest Extinction Rebellion protestors. The Daily Mail has been the most vociferous — yet the newspaper claims to care about the environment, with campaigns targeting plastic in oceans and tons of wet wipes clogging up the Thames. The newspaper is marshalling an army of volunteers to collect litter up and down the country, but this is just window dressing in the big picture regarding environment pollution. For real change, every one of us must rethink how we shop and travel, pushing councils and politicians into radical action if we really want clean air and our rivers to be free of pollutants.

The ER participants are willing to be mocked to gain our attention and their tactics – to put "peaceful and smiley arrestables" in the front line of any demonstration, to engage as many police officers as possible in dealing with these (largely middle class) sacrificial lambs who don't fear conviction and regard it as a badge of honour – has been remarkably effective in obtaining maximum publicity.

Many scientists say Britain is already doing its fair share in targeting emissions and dealing with pollution, but these protestors reckon it's too little, too late. ER want net-zero carbon emissions by 2025 – an impossible target, according to experts, who say that 2050 is more realistic.

How appropriate that Easter – a solemn celebration of one holy man's decision to make the ultimate sacrifice and die for his faith – is being marked with such public displays of heartfelt conviction. Passion has more or less disappeared from our politics over the last decade. The Poll Tax riots brought passion (along with violence) onto city streets. Combative protests at the G2 summit and the spiralling demonstrations over student tuition fees (which culminated in a statue of Winston Churchill and the Cenotaph being defaced) didn't really engage the whole population, who looked on appalled at images of kettling and containment and armed police. In 2016, Brexit stole up on us, and turned ordinary people on to politics again, it enraged them and engaged them in equal measure.

Since the 2016 referendum, people who would never have spent five minutes discussing Labour policy or Tory tax evasion spend at least five minutes every single day moaning about Brexit. We might think politicians are a scabby untrustworthy bunch, full of hot air and false promises, but at least we now talk about all our options going forward. We might hate the existing parties, and many of us dream of a new centrist movement. Brexit has been like Viagra, it has re-energised parts that traditional politics has failed to reach. Passion (along with bad manners and loathing) has returned in everyday life. By the way, Brexit wasn't the "biggest democratic exercise" in modern politics – more people voted in the 1992 general election.

Or course, being British, we disguise our new-found interest in politics as exasperation and cynicism, but it's undeniably there. Climate change is another issue, like Brexit, that will turn out to engage the British public in a way that politicians have been slow to notice. The London mayor has been lacklustre, failing to make radical changes to transport which would improve air quality. He failed to curb deliveries during office hours, failed to ban heavy lorries during daytime, failed to force all cabs and rental vehicles to convert to electricity. He hasn't forced fast food outlets to reduce wrapping waste by 50 per cent or pay to clean the surrounding streets. In short, he has tinkered around the edges of the biggest problem impinging on the lives of city dwellers and workers.

This Easter, let's celebrate the return of passion to our streets. It's exactly what Jesus would have wanted.







Extinction Rebellion (XR) demonstrators will observe a candlelit vigil on Saturday evening followed by an Easter Sunday feast the following day.

Greta Thunberg, the teenage founder of the school strikes against climate change is expected to address the protesters on Easter Sunday.

The 16-year-old Swedish activist is due to meet senior British politicians next week having already met with Pope Francis and addressed the EU Parliament.

Activists who have set up a garden on Waterloo Bridge showed no signs of shifting under the hot sun, watched on by tourists and families enjoying the end of the school holiday.

Sites at Oxford Circus, Marble Arch and Parliament Square are also occupied, despite the removal by police of the pink boat which had acted as a natural focal point for the movement.

Police say more than 715 people have now been arrested, six days in to the XR protests, and 28 people have been charged.

Members of the group said they were aware that some arrested demonstrators had been taken outside of London due to a lack of custody space.

One demonstrator said she had been told that some people had been taken to Brighton and Southampton.

With the pink boat no longer at Oxford Circus, supporters have sat down in a circle at the centre of the junction.

The vessel has been replaced by two demonstrators holding a sign "We are the boat" after it was removed by police on Friday after five days.

Earlier on Saturday, about 50 police officers surrounded the group who said they had been told they could remain until "no later than 10.30am".

One demonstrator said: "Holding the space is important and being arrested is not undignified.

"We are here for an important reason, so we should be prepared to be removed for that. Being arrested is a statement."

Another demonstrator countered: "Dignified withdrawal is an option."

However, within minutes police numbers had dwindled, and demonstrators continued to occupy the road.

It comes as a video of police officers dragging demonstrators along the ground by the arms on Friday emerged, after Home Secretary Sajid Javid urged police to use the "full force of the law".

In the footage, a woman is seen being dragged along the road close to Oxford Circus by a police officer who then stumbles and falls over, knocking his hat off.

Another officer is seen dragging a man sideways.

As police lined parts of Waterloo Bridge, watching the XR protest, Lyndon Edwardson told the Press Association he has been "locked on" to the River Thames crossing for the past couple of hours.

The 27-year-old and a friend have used chains and a cycle D-lock to attach themselves to the bridge and to each other. He said they both took the action once officers arrived.

"We will be staying until they cut us out, hopefully we can be here as long as possible," the landscaper said - revealing that four other campaigners are glued and locked on to a lorry parked on the bridge.

He was first arrested two days ago and said he is willing to be arrested again. He defended the group's actions, saying that they are justified because society is in an "extreme situation", adding: "All I want is a long life - I am worried about having kids and grandchildren."

Mr Edwardson said he understands that the plan of the police is to "get rid of some of their infrastructure", so that they can try to reduce the size of the XR presence on the bridge.

Following cries and protests from one of the campaigners under the vehicle, a man was tentatively brought out by officers, placed in handcuffs and then onto a stretcher before being carried away at around 5.20pm.

Close to one of the wheels of the lorry, a sign which read "caution my hand is glued" could be seen.

At least five officers worked under the truck to free the remaining protesters, with a number still on the roof.

Police finally get organised as the pink boat sails for eco warriors

POLICE officers last night removed a pink boat left in Oxford Circus by climate change protesters after admitting they had finally "come up with a strategy", five days after parts of London were left paralysed.

Shortly after Dame Emma Thompson, the actress, had addressed the crowd from the flag-draped vessel, specialist officers moved in and began to clear the area, cutting off the sound system and carrying activists away from the scene.

The escalation of force followed criticism that Scotland Yard had failed to deal adequately with the Extinction Rebellion demonstration, which has blocked transport hubs and taken over busy thoroughfares in the capital.

Ken Marsh, chairman of the Metropolitan Police Federation, admitted it had taken several days to form an appropriate policy to deal with the largely middle-class, non-violent activists because it was an "alien" situation. "We have come up with a formula and a strategy and are now fully prepared," he told The Daily Telegraph. "It took a while but it's a very difficult situation and we had to get it right. We didn't want to be disproportionate but we're in a better place now.

"These people are from suburbia. They are saying: 'Please be careful when you put the handcuffs on'. We are usually rolling around on the floor having to fight people."

He spoke out after Sajid Javid, the Home Secretary, urged police to "use the full force of the law" following criticism of the Met's "soft" approach that had allowed the protests to continue for several days.

The protesters took over Parliament Square, Waterloo Bridge and Oxford Circus last Monday, vowing to continue causing disruption until the Government takes drastic action to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Dame Emma courted controversy by jetting 5,400 miles (8,700km) from Los Angeles to take part in the action but defended herself by insisting that she "plants a lot of trees".

She told the BBC she was "too old" to fly economy but added: "One of the things that has happened consistently over the decades I've been protesting about this - and flying economy by the way, whenever I did fly - is that it's always turned back on the individual. "The fact of the matter is everyone has been asking for clean energy for decades and it has been ignored for decades. So, where is the hypocrisy? If I could fly cleanly, I would."

She had earlier climbed aboard the pink boat to declare that the planet was "in serious trouble".

"We have much, much less time than we thought," she said.

"I have seen the evidence for myself and I really care about my children and grandchildren enough to want to be here today to stand with the next generation. We're in a race between consciousness and catastrophe." She said climate change was "the most urgent problem in the history of the human race", and branded the failure to make supermarket plastic bags illegal "psychotic".

When Dame Emma, who had previously said she wanted to be arrested, left the site, the police swiftly moved in, removing those chained or glued to the boat. They formed two rings, gradually pushing activists out of the area before officers dismantled the vessel, which was bolted to the ground.

By early evening, they had made 106 arrests, taking the total detained all week to 682.

Earlier, plans to shut down Heathrow airport were abandoned after the group's tactics were leaked.

Instead, about 15 under-17s from the protest group stood outside the transport hub holding a large banner saying: "Are we the last generation?" Bryony Gordon: Page 27

A day after being cleared out of Oxford Circus, XR protestors returned as the Metropolitan police pleased with neighbouring forces to send any available officers to help. Sarah Harris VO: They may have lost their centrepiece (pink boat) which was towed away by police last night but despite attempts to move protestors away from Oxford Circus to Marble Arch, they are back and in large numbers. Some Easter shoppers but not all were losing patience.

Voxes of mixed opinions for and against the protest

SH VO: Induction courses for those wishing to join Extinction Rebellion are continuing 4 times a day at 4 different sites with existing members recruiting friends on social media.

XR Rep 1: There is no sign from me of our numbers dwindling at all. We're training people in non-violent direct action, how to be safe and respect the police and people round here, I don't think this is going away for a while.

SH VO: Their ambition is to get arrested but sunburn seemed to be the bigger danger. They had been told London police stations are full.

XR Rep2: We've had about 20 of our group arrested at least but loads have tried really hard to do that and some haven't achieved it yet but we've got a few more days.

XR Rep3: We don't take lightly the resources that are being used here but I think the amount of people wanting to get arrested shows the strength of support for what we're doing.

SH VO: With police from other forces drafted in and plenty of new protestors joining, it's likely this demonstration will last well into next week.

Summary of Commissioner interview, done with Sky News (pooled) and PA at approx 1630hrs outside SOR, Lambeth HQ on Sat 20 April.

- It has been a very challenging week. Every day 1000 officers working to police protests. Not just had an impact on policing, but the whole of London. I have one message please go to Marble Arch where you can protest legally. Stop your unlawful protest. If you don't want to go Marble Rach, go home.
- Businesses? All Londoners will have sympathy. Some will be able to cope with losses, but not others. Clear that stopping Oxford Circus and blocking through route across Waterloo Bridge will have had an effect on business. I have been out and about, talking to people who are very fed up.

 I am very proud of what the MPS is doing. We have extremely experienced public order policing experienced people on the ground. Officers been working extremely hard in challenging situation providing a proportionate response.
- Lessons learnt? There are armchair critics who will be saying we would do things differently. Officers are making difficult decisions with a high level of scrutiny (people recording on mobile phones etc). They are doing a fantastic job and I am very grateful to them.
- What happens next? Up to protestors to some extent. Police will dismantle street furniture to stop locking on if we need to. Minimise disruption in order to keep things moving.
 We are strong and determined. I have been officer for 36 years and have never known a single operation where we have arrested over 750 people.
- Will you run out of officers and cells? Many of the protestors are glueing themselves onto [things], or using mechanical contraptions to make it difficult for officers to arrest. Officers spending a lot of time getting people free. Then people are refusing to walk have to be carried. Amazed no one been injured. Sometimes takes 5 officers = resource intensive.
- Custody suites? They are very busy but we still have cell space available. If we need to, we will seek custody cells in other parts of the country. This is quite normal.

- Spoken to PM? Not saying who she has spoken to spoken to many senior politicians and has a direct line to Mayor and Home Sec. (In response to suggestions others are influencing policing strategy)

 Operations on the ground are for MPS, BTP and City to direct and we will direct how we police them.
- Lessons learnt? After any large scale op we will look to see if there is anything else we can do differently. Legal side? We might need to speak to CJ colleagues about legal framework but now not the time to do that. If powers are insufficient then we will be asking for changes, but now not the time to go into that.
- Marathon next week? My message to protestors is that the marathon is a large event, and a lot of people across UK will be furious if it was disrupted by protest.
- The video of officers dragging people? Officers have been in challenging situations where they have refused to move and been obstructing officers from doing their work in a challenging operation. Won't comment on individual cases.
- MPS is a huge service that is continuing to run its business, and dealing with violent crime. Officers working extensive hours. Will adapt and flex as we need to, and will ask for help if we need to. Very very proud of what we have achieved Heathrow not disrupted, Officers been extraordinarily professional. It is has been very busy these last few days, but staff been very professional.

Olympic gold medallist Etienne Stott has said any inconvenience caused by climate change demonstrators in London will be dwarfed by the future ecological emergency as he joined the movement.

The London 2012 canoe slalom champion said civil disobedience by Extinction Rebellion campaigners was "justified" as he put aside university work to protest at Waterloo Bridge on Saturday.

The Metropolitan Police have asked for help from hundreds of extra officers as the number of arrests passed 750 on the sixth day of demonstrations.

Commissioner Cressida Dick has called for the group to stop its "miserable disruption" and said people were "fed up" of their ongoing presence.

Stott, 39, said he came up to the capital after demonstrating last week in Nottingham and will risk arrest by staying put if police ask him to move on.

He said: "I joined the protests because I don't think there is anything more meaningful that I could be doing in my life right now.

"The climate emergency is just such a serious thing, and for me I'm willing to put in as much time and energy as I can spare and try and use everything I can to try and make the situation better."

On Saturday afternoon the police managed to successfully clear demonstrators in the junction at Oxford Circus, which was reopened to traffic, while dozens of officers carried out arrests on Waterloo Bridge and slowly removed campaigners who had attached themselves to a truck acting as a stage.

Asked what he will do if police ask him to leave, Stott said: "I am going to say I am not moving on, because I want to stay here until the Government declare a climate emergency."

Stott said he was currently studying for his final module of a psychology degree he has been working towards for 10 years at the Open University.

He said he was worried about putting aside his assignments, but declared that "the time is now and I've got to be here".

He said: "It's a critical time for me and I felt really bad I had not come down earlier because I was trying to do my stuff, but then I realised this has gone so far now in London that we need to keep it going and just try and maintain that pressure, maintain that visibility, so people realise this is desperately serious, and we are serious to try and get this sorted out."

He added: "I feel like it is really really tough to disrupt people's lives like this, but this is really important because I believe the disruption that will come down the line if we do not declare a climate emergency and do not tackle this situation of climate change, it will just dwarf any inconvenience here today."

Climate change protesters who have stopped traffic in a series of peaceful demonstrations across London will "pause" their rebellion in a bid to achieve their political aims.

Extinction Rebellion (XR) have announced they are switching disruptive tactics for political negotiations as they enter a second week of campaigning to have the Government declare a climate emergency.

It comes as the Metropolitan Police revealed 831 arrests have been made in connection with the demonstrations, and 42 people charged, as of 10am.

Farhana Yamin, the group's political circle co-ordinator, said: "Today marks a transition from week one, which focused on actions that were vision-holding but also caused mass disruption across many dimensions (economic, cultural, emotional, social).

"Week two marks a new phase of rebellion focused on negotiations where the focus will shift to our actual political demands."

She added: "We want to show that XR is a cohesive long-term, global force, not some flash in the pan.

"We can do that by showing we are disciplined and cannot only start disruptive actions but also end these when needed. We are not a rabble, we are rebels with a cause!

"Being able to 'pause' a rebellion shows that we are organised and a long-term political force to be reckoned with.

"This will give XR leverage as we enter into negotiations with those in power to make headway on our three demands."

The group hopes to negotiate with the Mayor of London and Metropolitan Police to agree that they be allowed to continue their protests at Old Palace Yard, in Westminster, and leave other sites.

Over the past week protesters have stopped traffic in Oxford Circus, set up camp in Marble Arch and created a temporary garden on Waterloo Bridge.

Members would commit to not disrupting other areas in exchange for Sadiq Khan speeding up the implementation of the Declaration of Climate and Ecological Emergency and considering setting up a London Citizens' Assembly.

They will also set up a political taskforce to take forward public negotiations with the Government, warning that they are prepared to scale up action depending on how much progress is made.

Neither the Met nor the Mayor's Office would say whether they were considering the proposals.

The announcement comes on the seventh day of the protests, with the teenager who inspired the climate change school strikes due to join crowds later on Easter Sunday.

Greta Thunberg is expected to address Extinction Rebellion members ahead of meeting senior British politicians next week.

The 16-year-old Swedish activist has already met Pope Francis and spoken at the European Parliament.

Metropolitan Police Commissioner Cressida Dick said the policing operation had been unlike any she had experienced in almost four decades of policing, and called for the "miserable" disruption to end.

The Mayor said more than 9,000 police officers had been responding to the protests, which had proved "extremely challenging for our over-stretched and under-resourced police".

Mr Khan said he shared activists' passion about tackling climate change but added: "I'm extremely concerned about the impact the protests are having on our ability to tackle issues like violent crime if they continue any longer. It simply isn't right to put Londoners' safety at risk like this.

"My message to all protesters today is clear: you must now let London return to business as usual."

On Saturday afternoon, police managed to successfully clear demonstrators in the junction at Oxford Circus, which was reopened to traffic, while dozens of officers carried out arrests on Waterloo Bridge and slowly removed campaigners who had attached themselves to a truck acting as a stage.

The lorry was cleared from the area at 5.18am on Sunday, police said.

Hundreds of officers from other forces have been sent to London to help the Metropolitan Police.

Extinction Rebellion said it hoped to negotiate with the Mayor of London and the Met over continuing its demonstrations at Old Palace Yard, Westminster, and leaving other sites.

Farhana Yamin, from the group, said being able to "pause" the protests showed it was an "organised and a long-term political force to be reckoned with".

"Today marks a transition from week one, which focused on actions that were vision-holding but also caused mass disruption across many dimensions," she said.

"Week two marks a new phase of rebellion focused on negotiations where the focus will shift to our actual political demands."

Oxford Circus has reopened to traffic after officers cleared protesters but they continue to occupy Waterloo Bridge and Parliament Square.

Met Commissioner Cressida Dick said she had never experienced anything like it in her career.

She said: "I've been a police officer for 36 years - I have never known an operation, a single operation, in which over 700 people have been arrested."

Ms Dick added she was grateful for the help from hundreds of police officers drafted in from several forces, including the neighbouring City of London Police.

Officers from Kent, Sussex, Essex and Hampshire and Greater Manchester have also been sent.

Police have been trying to confine the protests to Marble Arch but demonstrators have ignored the threat of arrest and continued to block roads across the capital.

Teenage activist Greta Thunberg is expected to address Extinction Rebellion members at Marble Arch later ahead of meeting senior British politicians next week.

Since the group was set up last year, members have shut bridges, poured buckets of fake blood outside Downing Street, blockaded the BBC and stripped semi-naked in Parliament.

It has three core demands: for the government to "tell the truth about climate change"; to reduce carbon emissions to zero by 2025; and to create a citizens' assembly to oversee progress.

Controversially, the group is trying to get as many people arrested as possible.

But critics say they cause unnecessary disruption and waste police time when forces are already overstretched.





The teenager who inspired the climate change school strikes is due to join protesters in London as they enter a seventh day of demonstrations.

Greta Thunberg is expected to address Extinction Rebellion members on Easter Sunday ahead of meeting senior British politicians next week.

The 16-year-old Swedish activist has already met Pope Francis and spoken at the European Parliament.

Organisers of the protests said they would be holding a "feast of renewal and celebration" on Sunday afternoon to which the public were invited.

They said: "We recognise we have caused disruption for many Londoners, so are extending our love through food to all who would like to join us."

On Bank Holiday Monday, they plan to hold a picnic on the Westway and peacefully block the road near Edgware Road underground station.

Metropolitan Police Commissioner Cressida Dick said the policing operation had been unlike any she had experienced in almost four decades of policing, with more than 750 peaceful activists arrested in less than a week.

Hundreds of officers from other forces have been drafted in to help quell the ongoing disruption.

Police have been trying to confine the protests to one site in London, at Marble Arch, but protesters have ignored the threat of arrest and continued to block roads across the capital.

Ms Dick said: "We have shown that we are strong, we are determined.

"I have never - I've been a police officer for 36 years - I have never known an operation, a single operation, in which over 700 people have been arrested.

"It shows we are determined and we will carry on."

On Saturday afternoon the police managed to successfully clear demonstrators in the junction at Oxford Circus, which was reopened to traffic, while dozens of officers carried out arrests on Waterloo Bridge and slowly removed campaigners who had attached themselves to a truck acting as a stage.

Extinction Rebellion members showed no signs of voluntarily shifting under the hot sun over the Easter weekend, watched by tourists and families enjoying the end of the school holidays.

On Saturday night, candlelit vigils were held as campaigners sang.

The Commissioner said she was grateful for the help from "hundreds" of officers drafted in from "several" forces, including the neighbouring City of London.

She added that custody suites in London were "certainly very busy" but not yet full, amid reports from demonstrators that some people had been taken outside of the capital.

Ms Dick said she was "not embarrassed" about the length of time it is taking officers to clear the streets, defending their "determination and the resilience and the courage that they are showing in the face of quite a lot of difficulty".

She predicted that large numbers of people would be "furious" if the demonstrations affect the London Marathon, which will take place next Sunday.

The Commissioner said she will be talking to the Government and criminal justice colleagues to see if changes to the police's powers should be made to help officers deal with non-violent demonstrators when they are acting unlawfully.

"That is the dilemma and if our powers are insufficient, if we don't have sufficient deterrents in the criminal justice system, then I will certainly be asking for changes."

The group has pledged to continue causing disruption until its demands are met.

The real Extinction Rebellion, protesting on the streets of London and other cities, has had plenty of coverage. Though it has brought disruption and inconvenience, the protests have been good-natured and non-violent. At a time when London, for example, is emptier than usual because of the Easter holidays, the impression is of protesters having a holiday of their own.

There are policing lessons to be learnt; future protests may not be as peaceful as Extinction Rebellion but may learn from its tactics. There are also lessons to be learnt by the protesters.

The UK has a good record. Greenhouse gas emissions in 2017 were 43% below 1990 levels and well on track for an 80% reduction by 2050. This country's share of global greenhouse gas emissions is a little over 1%. London, where the protests were biggest, was pioneering in introducing a congestion charge for vehicles and has an ultra-low emission zone. Unrealistic demands, such as zero carbon emissions by 2025, contribute little.

The big three countries for carbon emissions are China, America and India, half of the global total. China's coal-fired power plants have pushed the people's republic up to nearly 30% of global carbon dioxide emissions. Donald Trump is a climate change sceptic but, as we discovered in a different context from the Mueller report, many Americans and US states follow their own consciences.

Germany accounts for almost twice as many emissions as the UK. Coal and lignite plants supply 40% of its electricity thanks to a knee-jerk reaction against nuclear power. Yes, there is more to be done. But we should be clear about where the effort is best directed.

Bounce for UK and global markets enough to put a spring in the step Jeremy Warner

It's time to be a little more optimistic about immediate prospects in the UK, European and global economies. The moment of greatest danger - when an abrupt, disruptive Brexit threatened to plunge the entire European economy into renewed crisis, Trump's trade war looked as if it might spiral out of control, the Fed seemed to be overtightening, and China's miraculous growth spurt appeared to have lost its way - has passed. Let's be clear: sunlit uplands are not in prospect, but the removal of these uncertainties ought to breathe new life into business and consumer confidence, underpinning some kind of a bounce in economic activity going into the summer months.

Start with Brexit, as regrettably we always must. The delay until October guarantees a lengthy breathing space in which either a transitional deal is agreed or Brexit is taken off the table altogether. European elections are of no significance. They don't affect the dynamics around what sort of Brexit, if any at all, might occur.

I make no judgment on whether politically this is a good or a bad thing, but observe only that the latest ComRes poll shows that Remain would overwhelmingly win a second referendum - by 58pc to 42pc. No deal, for all its very vocal and high profile advocates, is still very much a minority preference, and is now the least likely outcome by some distance. This outrages many, but for most business leaders it is a major risk removed. European economies can also breathe a sigh of relief. The threat of a sudden stop in trade with the EU's second biggest economy has been lifted, at least for now.

The US too is heading into politically and therefore economically less choppy waters. Publication of the Robert Mueller report, which dismisses allegations of Russian collusion, lifts a giant cloud from the presidency, giving Donald Trump a new lease of life and reinvigorating an economic boom struggling to stay alive. The priorities of the electoral cycle mean no lever will be left unpulled in sustaining the expansion over the next year and a half.

And finally there is China, where renewed fiscal and monetary stimulus is starting to gain traction. None of this means underlying vulnerabilities have gone away. They have merely been swept under the carpet. This is very much global recession postponed, not removed.

Unreliable auditors When you have been a financial journalist as long as I have, you get to see that it is indeed perfectly true - what goes around comes around. Every seven years or so there will be a major accounting scandal, prompting calls for something be done about the monopoly power of the big audit practices. As a general rule of thumb, one of their number will have given the company in question a clean bill of health only months before the balloon goes up. What is the point of audit if it is incapable of spotting wrong 'uns? There were a whole spate of such scandals during the early Nineties when, among a certain type of financier and entrepreneur, window dressing of accounts to make things appear much better than they really were seemed to be par for the course.

Then came Enron in the early 2000s, a not dissimilar but much larger case of cooking the books. This did actually manage to produce an auditing scalp. Arthur Andersen, then one of the "big five" international audit practices, was completely destroyed by the affair, ironically not primarily because of its audit failures, but because senior employees ordered a cover-up.

The collapse last year of the construction and outsourcing company Carillion at an estimated cost to the taxpayer, never mind other creditors, of £148m, has raised similar questions over the efficacy of the audit - as well as another great outpouring of reviews and investigations. Last week, these duly produced two key recommendations for

reform from the Competition and Markets Authority - an "operational split" between audit and consultancy services, to reduce the "distracting interest" of more lucrative non-audit work; and mandatory joint audit, including at least one non-big four firm, for most of the UK's large companies.

Will they do any good? I'm not as sceptical as some. Use of the audit as a loss leader for the sale of more lucrative professional and business services has long been a major cause for concern, resulting in an obvious conflict of interest and blurring of boundaries, which in a number of instances has demonstrably compromised the audit. Is the main job of the big accounting practices to provide oversight on behalf of creditors - the function of audited accounts - or to enrich themselves by selling other services? The importance of this latter activity to the UK economy is not to be underestimated. Professional and business services are estimated to have generated some £70bn of exports last year, and have consistently grown faster than any other sector of the UK economy, generating some two million new, relatively highly paid jobs over the last 40 years. Already struggling with the challenges of Brexit, which threatens to limit these sales in overseas markets, this may not be the best time for a regulatory crackdown.

Global companies, moreover, require highly specialised skills and international reach. According to Hermione Hudson, UK head of assurance at PwC, "between 20-50pc of the work on PwC's largest audits may be performed by specialists who are not themselves financial auditors, such as cyber, pensions, tax, valuation and technology experts".

Plainly, there is some risk of throwing the baby out with the bath water. All the same, formal separation, which in any case some firms claim virtually to have done already, doesn't strike me as an altogether bad development. Certainly it would concentrate minds among those confined to audit, encouraging them to focus on their proper, regulatory purpose, and making them less subject to management capture and deception.

A dual audit might carry a cost, but it would also help keep the accountants honest, and by making predatory pricing more difficult, promote the development of viable challenger firms to compete with the stranglehold of the big four. But will these reforms prevent the next accounting scandal in the making? I wouldn't bet on it.

Ever been a worse mayor? Come back Ken Livingstone, all is forgiven? It is hard to imagine anything worse than the present incumbent Sadiq Khan. His apparent toleration of the Extinction Rebellion protests, which have brought large parts of the capital to a virtual standstill, is a disgrace to the position, and his constant buck-passing over delays and cost overruns to CrossRail, a shameful abdication of responsibility.

The Commissioner said she will be talking to the Government and criminal justice colleagues to see if changes to the police's powers should be made to help officers deal with non-violent demonstrators when they are acting unlawfully.

'That is the dilemma and if our powers are insufficient, if we don't have sufficient deterrents in the criminal justice system, then I will certainly be asking for changes.'

The group has pledged to continue causing disruption until its demands are met.

It wants the Government to declare a climate emergency and take action to reduce greenhouse gas emissions to net zero by 2025.

There are increasing fears that protests by XR, which boasts more than 100 regional groups, could spread nationwide.

Leaked minutes from a meeting of activists in Devon earlier this year reveal plans to 'educate children and infiltrate the school system' along with the use of puppets and street theatre to blockade streets.



It's eight days since the Extinction Rebellion protest catapulted climate change into the spotlight, finally giving it the attention it deserves, in the eyes of many.

And, after what feels like a lengthy period of resignation in the battle against global warming, the new-found momentum shows no sign of slowing.

The disruptive part of the rebellion is largely done for now - there were more than 1,000 arrests in a week, making it the biggest civil disobedience event in modern British history.

But the protesters are now limbering up for the next phase - negotiating with the Government and London Mayor Sadiq Khan about decisive action - with the threat of further disobedience if the politicians don't play ball.

At the same time, Greta Thunberg, the 16-year old Swedish activist who inspired school children across the world to strike over climate change this year, is in London this week.

In a sign of how seriously politicians seem to be taking the issue now, she met Environment Secretary Michael Gove, Speaker of the House John Bercow and Jeremy Corbyn yesterday - as well as Liberal Democrat leader Vince Cable, Green Party MP Caroline Lucas and former Labour leader Ed Miliband.

Against this backdrop, every new piece of evidence about the threat posed by climate change seems to carry a little bit more weight than it might have done 10 days ago (our Arctic warming coverage on page five perhaps being a case in point). It could be wishful thinking - and it will be interesting to see if it lasts. But it does seem that the campaign against global warming has just reached a tipping point.







Extinction Rebellion: Climate change protesters glue themselves to London Stock Exchange

Many publications report that protesters from Extinction Rebellion have today glued themselves to the London Stock Exchange as part of a series of new demonstrations targeted at the capital's financial district. The Independent reports that five men and woman wearing black suits and red ties glued themselves together in a line, blocking the entrance to the building. The group said the area is being targeted because "the financial industry is responsible for funding climate and ecological destruction and we are calling on them, the companies and the institutions that allow this to happen, to tell the truth", the Independent reports. The <u>Guardian</u> reports that this "rush-hour disruption" is the last action before the group brings an end to its current actions in London. However, the group said that the world should "expect more actions very soon", <u>BusinessGreen</u> reports. The group will hold a "closing ceremony" today at 5pm in Hyde Park and will also withdraw from Marble Arch and Parliament Square, Business Green adds. The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> and <u>Climate Home News</u> also cover the group's latest moves. The <u>Guardian</u> also reports that public support for the group has "soared" following its easter protests.

Separately, the <u>Guardian</u> reports that up to 10,000 anti-fracking protesters plan to line the route of the Tour de Yorkshire, which starts in Doncaster next Thursday. Protesters will wear masks depicting Ineos

chief Sir Jim Ratcliffe as the devil, the Guardian says. The chemical company Ineos "has been announced as the new sponsor of what was Team Sky – home to Tour de France winners Chris Froome and Geraint Thomas", it adds.

Deforestation: Tropical tree losses persist at high levels

Several publications report on new data from the Global Forest Watch showing that around 12m hectares of forest in the world's tropical regions were lost in 2018. This is the "equivalent to 30 football fields per minute", BBC News reports. The data shows that deforestation is "still on an upward trend", the <u>Guardian</u> reports. "Although 2018 losses were lower than in 2016 and 2017, when dry conditions led to large fires, last year was the next worst since 2002, when such records began," the Guardian says. <u>InsideClimate</u> <u>News</u> says the rate of forest loss "threatens a crucial climate solution".

Science Advances

Efforts to reduce air pollution in China's cities could increase pollution, CO2 emissions and water consumption in neighbouring regions, a new study suggests. Using atmospheric chemical transport modelling, the researchers simulate clean air policy scenarios and evaluate their environmental impacts on PM2.5 emissions, CO2 emissions and water consumption in the cities of Beijing, Tianjin and Hebei and the spillover effects to other regions. Here's what I plan to send to (and potentially other stakeholders) on our key lines. The first list is so they know what we're doing and can perhaps endorse. The second is so they know what our key asks are. And the third is more for info.

Key asks of government to achieve the 1.5 degree plan

- 1. Delegate powers and resources to set minimum energy efficiency standards for our existing buildings, so the Mayor can improve and enforce them
- 2. Delegate powers and resources to set emissions limits for new boilers and for combined heat and power plants in London
- London has been chronically underfunded on energy efficiency for over a decade. Recent cuts have made
 this even worse. Government needs to acknowledge this and significantly increase its funding for home
 insulation above and beyond the Energy Company Obligation, ensuring that London gets its fair share.
- 4. To help Londoners switch to cleaner vehicles, government needs to match the Mayor's £23 million low income scrappage scheme

Key messages from our 1.5 degree plan

London is one of the only global cities to have published a climate action plan which is compatible with the Paris Climate agreement and a 1.5 degree pathway. Its key messages are:

- 1. We urgently need to increase the number of buildings retrofitted with energy efficiency measures.
- 2. Strong national government policy and programmes are needed to get London's buildings to the required levels of energy efficiency
- 3. London's path towards zero carbon relies on continued grid decarbonisation and more ambitious national government action.
- 4. Any increases in London's energy demand should be offset by energy efficiency deployment and increasing use of smart technology to smooth peaks in demand.

- 5. Costs associated with grid upgrades should be manageable.
- 6. Government must decide which low carbon heat pathway the UK will take by the mid-2020s at the latest.
- 7. Each different energy system pathway has its own pros and cons. However, costs may be similar and business as usual is not the cheapest option.
- 8. Decarbonising transport and increasing use of active and public transport remains a key objective for London.
