On November 1st 2010 I was brutally attacked by an Akita hunting dog, which I understand is classified as dangerous but is not banned.

The attack led to a large chunk of my right hand being bitten off, and my 3 and 6 year old sons who I was protecting and witnessed the attack being emotionally traumatised.

I won't go into the details of the case here as I am sure you have access to the case notes, so I'll get straight to the point of this letter.

My solicitors advised me to make a personal claim against the dog owner, and I have given them my permission to do so. However they have been told by Rotherhithe Police station that they cannot release this information.

I have since taken further advice from the Public Access Office and have been told that I should direct my request to the Borough Commander and state that under section 35 of the data protection act I am actually entitled to have this information.

As the statute of limitation is fast approaching i.e. 1.11.2013 I would hope that you would treat this request with some urgency and forward me the required information ASAP.
