Hit and run casualties in London: an unacceptable epidemic

This short briefing contains data obtained by me, and previously by my predecessor Jenny Jones AM, on the rise of 'hit and run' incidents on London's streets, where a driver of a vehicle fails to stop when involved in a crash on our roads.

The data obtained from the Mayor goes back to 2009 and up to 2015, and shows a huge 60 per cent increase in hit and run incidents that caused injuries across London in this time.



Figures also show there has been a 40 per cent increase in hit and run incidents since 2011, when detailed data for each London borough became available.

Only six out of 33 boroughs have seen a reduction in hit and run in that time – the largest reduction was Bromley at -36 per cent. The boroughs with the highest increase in hit and run incidents were Merton at 149 per cent and Wandsworth at 117 per cent.

As a percentage of overall collisions, hit and runs have increased from 13 per cent in 2009 to 20 per cent last year in 2015.

With drivers now failing to stop after a shocking one in five crashes, this is a real epidemic that needs real action from the police to tackle it. However, not only are people being hurt but there is also no information available to show whether the perpetrators of these crimes are being brought to justice.

Hit and runs are associated with other illegal activities such as drunk driving, speeding, being disqualified or simply having no insurance.

People need to know that if they run away from a crash they will face consequences, so I am very disappointed that the Metropolitan Police Service is still not able to provide data on the rate of prosecution of hit and run drivers. The Mayor told me: "Due to limitations within the current systems utilised by the MPS, it is not possible to report specifically the number of these cases that were subject to prosecution action."

With huge pressures on the police budget, a new Police and Crime Plan being drafted and big decisions for the Mayor to make, we need to know how effective police currently are in dealing with these crimes, and to be able to prioritise work to tackle it.


Data on hit and run incidents

Across London, the number of hit and run incidents has now risen every year since 2009 both in number terms and as a percentage of total collisions.1




Most but not all boroughs have seen an increase in incidents since 2011 (the year from which comparative data is available).
