I think it might be difficult to develop an actual map at streetsite level, because the streetsites don't really have clearly defined spatial areas and boundaries. The streetsite is more of a notional categorisation that does what it needs to from the point of view of an outreach worker, but doesn't necessarily translate outside of that immediate context.

It might be easier to map the data at ward level, but it would still be quite a big task to go through the process of assigning wards to all the streetsites, and there will probably be a lot of cases where streetsites cover more than one ward.

In terms of frequency, assuming that all other problematic elements are resolved, I would think that a monthly report would be a reasonable approach.

Hello all

To provide some clarification from the CHAIN side, when a street contact is recorded on the system the user will also specify the streetsite at which this occurred. Each borough has its own list of streetsite options, and the available options are generally decided upon by the outreach service that is operating in that borough. Depending on the pattern and density of rough sleeping in the borough, the options can vary quite widely from very specific streets (e.g. "Westminster - Orange Street") to more generalised areas (e.g. "Camden - Kings Cross"). In the outer boroughs we tend to have fewer street

site options, and teams will often mainly use a catch all option (e.g. "Barking & Dagenham - Other") with specific details recorded in an accompanying notes field.

Certain boroughs (Westminster, Ealing, Lambeth and Southwark) have also expressed a requirement to report on geographical distribution at ward level, so in those cases we have assigned each streetsite option to a ward, based on information supplied to us by the outreach teams.

For Westminster we have also assigned each streetsite to a count patch, which are geographical divisions used by the outreach teams for their intelligence purposes. Westminster have also assigned a Google Maps URL to each of their streetsites, based on an arbitrary location somewhere in the middle of the streetsite area.

As you will ascertain from the above, Westminster is generally the borough with the richest and most precise geographical data available, and in other boroughs the usefulness of geographical data will vary.

In terms of reporting, we can certainly provide periodic summaries of number of contacts and/or number of people contacted at each streetsite, grouped by borough (and ward, if available).

Thanks, our intention is to get a pan London understanding of the current intelligence picture of rough-sleeping on a geographical basis.
As discussed, this is an outcome from our bi-lateral discussion between Chief Superintendent Borough Commander, Westminster and our regional Director for Immigration Enforcement,
We do not intend to move from a business as usual approach which means responding to partners as and when required.
However, having a geographical London-wide picture of hotspots would give us some assurance that we understand what is happening on the ground and allow us to ensure that we are matching resources to need. It would also be useful to see the development of activity over time, so a product produced on a periodical basis would be helpful.
Evidently, CHAIN research and the underpinning data will provide what we are looking for. There may be an issue going down to ward level or further (postcode), as we would like, as this level of detail may not be recorded or it may not be recorded in a uniform way to make it usable.
The best product would be a GIS-based one, but this will require an analyst with access to the software. (may be able to comment on thus.)

and would you be willing to work on maps showing all contacts over a month for Westminster, Ealing, Lambeth and Southwark that can be updated monthly and shared with and Paul at the Met? I'd suggest we accompany this with data on contacts in other boroughs, by location. Although this won't be as readily digestible as the maps, it will make sure you're alerted to any pronounced shifts in the areas where rough sleepers are being located.

This is a really useful step forward; I think it would be most useful to have a monthly cycle of reporting although that should be open for review as we don't really know what the impact of the changes in benefit rules will be over the next few months.

I fully accept the discussion around mapping outside the four boroughs and the amount of work this would cause. Perhaps we could work with a Westminster hotspot map initially as this is both deliverable on the basis of the data available and clearly the main priority area?

My preference would be to work from all the data available rather than a notion of what a hotspot is as the product will not generate confidence if it is not complete and trend analysis will be undermined by false negatives.

The monthly product would look like the attachment with a Westminster map providing a pictorial representation. If Ealing, Lambeth and Southwark can be easily mapped, it would be useful to have them as well, partners evidently want them and there seems no point in not providing those maps as part of the monthly package. No doubt once this is produced it will create further demand, my preference would be to include Camden and Islington, and then Kensington and Chelsea.

Location definition will be a problem for us, and probably the police. Local knowledge serves local delivery but the provision of a comprehensive overview, my intention here, is being made more difficult by the variety of definitions and the imprecise nature of some of them. Our intention, and perhaps others', is to be able to plot encounters, plan our outreach work and collect Management Information in a meaningful way.

It would be useful to know what extra work would be required to map encounters on a specific location basis, map reference, post code etc.

If we jointly own the product, I think our position would be that it should not be in the public domain and there should be some restrictions on access. The CHAIN reporting already in the public domain is probably as far as we should go – I would suggest.

The objective will be is to map out a pan-London picture of the hotspots (as here) and develop an understanding of priorities and risks. Our overall intention is to deliver this rough-sleeping work in co-operation with existing partners, with the minimal disruption to local arrangements where these are working.

MPS and the Home Office will work together to provide a strategic framework but, of course, it is important to keep yourself, the GLA and the Mayor's office up to

speed notwithstanding our intention to broadly maintain a business as usual approach.

So, it sounds like we have data on the locations at which rough sleepers are identified, but that – other than for Westminster, Ealing, Lambeth and Southwark - it's not readily mappable at the moment.

could produce a regular (monthly) report along the lines of the attached information that's circulated to the MRSG, but that covers all rough sleeping contacts rather than just instances where more than three people were seen sleeping rough (the definition of a hotspot used for outreach purposes).

Then I think the key question is for would a report of this nature be sufficient for your purposes at present, or would the benefits of mapped data be such that you would be willing to invest resources in mapping the street sites to either wards or, as Westminster have already done, Google map locations? As says, this would be quite a big task and, if sites were mapped to wards, may yield some rather imprecise results when sites cover two or more wards. But doing that would make it possible to produce a map.
