Thank you for your request for information which the Greater London Authority (GLA) received on 30 March 2018. Your request has been dealt with under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

Your request seems to be primarily aimed at Local Authorities so please note that the GLA is London's strategic government and does not operate in the same way as local authorities. We do not hold most of the information that you have asked for but we do hold some related information, which we publish on our website.

## You asked:

- 1) How many trees have been felled by the council in the last three years for which data is available please provide a year by year breakdown.
- 2) How much has it cost the council to fell trees in the last three years? Please provide year by year breakdown of total cost.
- 3) Does the council have a target number of trees to fell in each year? What is the purpose of the tree felling?

The GLA is not responsible for many public spaces or trees in London. Our response to your request is as follows:

1) How many trees have been felled by the council in the last three years for which data is available - please provide a year by year breakdown.

One Catalpa tree in Parliament Square Gardens - Fell date was Friday 12th May 2017, followed by stump removal Monday 24th July 2017

- 2) How much has it cost the council to fell trees in the last three years? Please provide year by year breakdown of total cost.
- £1,676. Works included felling, stump removal and grind, reinstating soil level and replanting with a Catalpa erubescens purpurea, stake, tie and water gator.

## 3) Does the council have a target number of trees to fell in each year? What is the purpose of the tree felling?

There is no target number. On this occasion, the tree was felled as it was infected with Ganoderma and had the potential to become a safety hazard.

The Greater London Authority does not hold information on the day to day management of most of London's street or parks trees as this is the direct responsibility of London's 33 boroughs and Transport for London (TfL).
