I confirm that your request has been dealt with under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 and that MOPAC does hold some information relating to your request, as set out below:

MOPAC awarded one grant to tackle stalking in the financial years 2017-2018; 2018-2019; and 2019-2020. This is the Multi-Agency Stalking Interventions Programme (MASIP), funded 100% through Home Office Police Transformation Fund. Please see table below.

Further details:

- MASIP is operational in 3 Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) areas: London, Hampshire and Cheshire. The programme is comprised of the following partners:
 - Suzy Lamplugh Trust (SLT) (programme management and victim advocacy)
 - MOPAC, Metropolitan Police Service (MPS), SLT, Barnet, Enfield & Haringey Mental Health NHS Trust, Crown Prosecution Service, National Probation Service
 - Cheshire PCC, Cheshire Constabulary, North Western Boroughs Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust
 - Hampshire PCC, Hampshire Constabulary, National Probation Service, Aurora New Dawn.

- MASIP aims:

- Foster good communication and best practice in relation to information sharing, especially between the police and health services, in relation to responding to stalking
- Reduce reoffending and improve public safety by improving management of stalking perpetrators and where appropriate providing specific mental health support
- o Increase early intervention, thereby reducing the overall incidence of stalking and levels of fixation and obsession
- Improve the response to victims of stalking, ensuring they receive consistently high quality service and improving victims' satisfaction with police and across the Criminal Justice System
- Reduce risk by improving the capabilities of police and partner agencies to manage risk in cases of stalking
- Enhance communication and relationships between the police and other local services to respond effectively to the risk, harm and vulnerability posed by stalking cases
- Capture, analyse and share data on the results of different perpetrator intervention strategies.
- All provide services to non ex intimate victims of stalking
- All 3 PCC areas use different models.
