ROUGH SLEEPING INITIATIVE GRANT DETERMINATION (2018-19) [No. 31/3392]

I am pleased to inform you that the Department is now able to issue a Grant Determination for the Rough Sleeping Initiative Grant for the remaining 2018-19 period.

I enclose a Determination made under section 31 of the Local Government Act 2003.

The grant is ring-fenced for 2018-19 and is to be used for Rough Sleeping Initiative interventions only. Interventions were set out in the proposal form submitted by you in May 2018. MHCLG has subsequently been in contact with you to let you know which of your interventions we have approved for funding.

Our team of expert practitioners will continue to work closely with you to help implement and monitor your plans. Monthly reports for your completion will be sent throughout the Funding Period and will include details on project mobilisation as well as rough sleeping prevention and relief rates. Full guidance on accessing and completing the reports will be provided shortly. In addition to the November rough sleeping count, you are required to conduct rough sleeping counts in September, January and March. The MHCLG and our expert practitioners will provide further guidance and support to aid you in preparing for and implementing these additional counts. By exception and with the agreement of MHCLG we may allow local authorities to undertake estimates rather than counts. Please contact us if you feel this is necessary.

A Rough Sleeping Initiative launch event in the summer will provide further guidance on the reporting process and rough sleeping counts. The event will also provide an opportunity to discuss progress, success and lessons learnt with other local authorities. We hope you will be able to join us.

ROUGH SLEEPING INITIATIVE GRANT DETERMINATION (2018-19) [No. 31/3392]

The Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government ("the Secretary of State") in exercise of the powers conferred by section 31 of the Local Government Act 2003 hereby makes the following determination:-

Citation

1) This determination may be cited as the Rough Sleeping Initiative Grant Determination (2018-19) [No. 31/3392].

Purpose of the grant

 The purpose of the grant is to provide support to local authorities in England towards expenditure lawfully incurred or to be incurred to reduce rough sleeping.

Determination

3) The Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government determines as the authorities to which grant is to be paid and the amount of grant to be paid, the authorities and the amounts set out in Annex B.

Grant conditions

4) Pursuant to sections 31(3) and 31(4) of the Local Government Act 2003, the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government determines that the grant will be paid subject to the conditions in Annex A.

Treasury consent

5) Before making this determination in relation to local authorities in England, the Secretary of State obtained the consent of the Treasury.

Annex A - Grant Conditions

- 1. Grant paid to a local authority under this determination may be used only to fund Rough Sleeping Initiative interventions that were approved by MHCLG for funding. Interventions were set out in the proposal form submitted by the local authority in May 2018 and were subsequently approved or rejected by the MHCLG for funding.
- 2. The authority must complete a progress report, provided by the MHCLG, at monthly intervals or at such other intervals as may be specified by the MHCLG. The report will be submitted by a date to be specified by the MHCLG and will provide details of progress against the outputs, activities, milestones and targets set out in the proposal agreed by MHCLG, alongside rough sleeping prevention and relief statistics.
- 3. The local authority will conduct rough sleeping counts in September, January and March. If the MHCLG agree it is not feasible for the local authority to conduct rough sleeping counts, the local authority will provide estimates of rough sleeping.
- 4. Grant will be paid according to the allocations attached at Annex B.
