VRU funded programmes in Enfield include:

Home Office Small/Micro Vulnerable Children's Charities Funding - 20/21

In June 2020, the Home Office allocated the VRU £587,680 of funding to distribute to small/micro charities that are working with vulnerable young people at risk of being involved in serious violence. Delivery completed in March 21. Organisations in Enfield received the following:

- Diversity Living Services - £2,880
- Poverty Concern - £2,120
- Youth & community connexions - £14,824

After School Fund – Stronger Futures

Stronger Futures is a fund for grassroots and community-led organisations designed to support vulnerable young Londoners in the hours following school and at weekends. Rocket Science in partnership with Black Training and Enterprise Group (BTEG) grant manage the Stronger Futures Fund. The investment is for community-led groups to support those young Londoners most in-need, targeting schemes that evidence how they will improve 1) Educational outcomes; 2) Employment opportunities; 3) Welfare/Support. Organisations in Enfield received the following:

- Edmonton Community Partnership have received £84,390.00

Parent/Carers Champion Network

The VRU provided funding to develop a parent/carers champion network to support a public health preventative approach to violence reduction by supporting place-based needs of our communities identified by boroughs. With an equal allocation of the total funding to each London borough (2020-2021), delivery of the parent champion network will take place through Voluntary Community Sector (VCS) organisations, to train local parents to provide

Information Advice and Guidance (IAG) to other parents. Each borough will be required to submit a return detailing the parent/carer support services in their local area prior to funding being awarded. This information will be collated as part of an evidence base to inform a VRU Needs Assessment of parent/carer support in London

- Enfield Parent Engagement Network – Approximately £70,000

Supporting Inclusive Schools

Exclusion from school is one of several adverse childhood experiences which can increase the likelihood of being involved in or affected by violence in later life. The Supporting Inclusive Schools programme consists of four projects to support inclusive schools in 16 VRU-priority London boroughs and reaches over 200 educational settings in those boroughs.

- Tender's A Whole Community Approach to Healthy Relationships will tackle gender-based violence in approx.150 schools across London. Enfield received £35,000
- Stepping Stones supports a successful transition from primary to secondary school in 15 secondary schools across London. Enfield received £42,525.00
- Nurturing London will deliver a whole school approaching to nurturing and inclusive education in 26 schools across London. Enfield received approximately £35,000
- Afterschool Provision will help PRUs to keep young people engaged and safe after school in 14 PRUs across London. Enfield received £37,500.00

PRU Mentoring and Careers Advice: Programme delivery

The VRU will fund the following types of mentoring for London's PRUs recognising that for many young people, consistent one-to-one relationship with a responsible, accessible, approachable adult enables them to keep on track with their studies, behaviour, and attendance

- Career mentoring: Career mentors from all levels of society are key to creating options for pupils. This is especially true for girls.
- Academic mentors: (as opposed to tutors) support the career options development of a pupil.
- Parent mentors/liaison: preferably out in the community, visiting people in their homes to build a supportive relationship.
- Out-reach/engagement/general mentoring: Outreach to pupils to re-engage them and convince them to re-enrol/re-engage.
- Enfield has received approximately £28,000

Borough capacity building

The VRU have funding available to support the 24 boroughs that are not My Ends areas. The funding will be for 12 months delivery. This funding is to help support progress of additional partnership work and could include areas such as community engagement, supporting outreach through organisations coming together, providing training and development of champions as well as supporting strong and sustainable local networks of community members so that they are well placed to respond to local emerging needs and help advance and test new initiatives to tackle serious youth violence.

- Enfield Council has received £66,181

Critical incident fund

GREATER LONDON AUTHORITY

This fund enables London Local Authorities to apply for a grant of up to £5,000 following a homicide, or in exceptional circumstances for other critical incidents involving violence. Following a homicide or serious violent incident, there are a number of pressures which impact the Local Authority and local communities. This is due to the required response for the affected families, peer group, local community, and in most situations the wider community. A coordinated Local Authority response could provide additional outreach work in the community or adding extra CCTV cameras.

- Enfield Council has received £10,000

Preventative Fund

Due to the current increase in homicides affecting young people and violence more broadly, the VRU has made available a one-off payment to all boroughs of £5,000 towards preventative delivery, which can range from detached outreach after core working hours, developing additional community engagement and capacity building or for providing additional positive activity for young people over the Summer.

- Enfield Council have been awarded £5,000

A&E Investment

The Violence Reduction Unit is prioritising investment to those who hold key trusted relationships with young people. Frontline youth workers have the lived experience and relationships to deliver early interventions that can make all the difference to a young person's future. In 2019 the London Mayor invested £4 million to fund additional teams of youth workers in five additional Accident & Emergency hospitals in areas with high levels of young victims of violent crime. City Hall funding now supports 28 youth work posts, supporting young victims of violence and domestic abuse. In the Major Trauma Centre services, 58% of young people accessing the service reported a reduction in risk six months after receiving an intervention.

- North Middlesex Hospital has received £119,904

London Crime Prevention Fund (LCPF)

The VRU has allocated £4.4m of funding across each Community Safety Partnership to be used towards local violence reduction initiatives, ranging from mentoring and outreach schemes, prevention of exclusions and parenting support programmes. The VRU continues to liaise directly with boroughs as well as providing flexibility for project variation since COVID-19 and to support on-going recovery.

LCPF funding is provided to groups of partners to work together to deliver solutions to entrenched or emerging crime and community safety issues. The purpose of the fund is to drive innovative, innovative approaches and to extend the reach of existing effective services in London through the co-design, co-commissioning, and co-delivery of services. Enfield has received approximately £590,000 for local projects
