1. Summary

1.1 The Committee receives a report monitoring the progress of its work programme at each meeting. This report sets out the timetable for Committee meetings in 2016/17 and the framework provided by the Committee's terms of reference which may be helpful to Members in drawing up the future work programme.

2. Recommendations

 - (a) Note the report that sets out progress on the Committee's work programme; and
 - (b) Delegate authority to the Chair, in consultation with the Deputy Chair, to agree the subject of the main agenda item for the Committee's remaining meeting on 20 April 2017.

3. Background

3.1 Members receive a report at each Committee meeting on the progress of the projects agreed as the basis for the work programme. Additional projects will be included in the work programme from time to time reflecting the need for the Committee to respond to tasks such as consultations or other events as necessary.

Criteria for topic selection

- 3.2 The Committee's Terms of Reference provide a guide for the criteria for selecting topics for the work programme:
 - (a) To examine and report from time to time on -
 - Matters of importance to Greater London; and
 - The strategies, policies and actions of the Mayor and the Functional Bodies.

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As they relate to spatial development and planning matters in London, in particular the Mayor's Spatial Development Strategy ('The London Plan');

- (b) When invited by the Mayor, to contribute to his consideration of major planning applications;
- (c) To monitor the Mayor's exercise of his statutory powers in regard to major planning applications referred by the local planning authorities, and to report to the Assembly with any proposal for submission to the Mayor for the improvement of the process;
- (d) To review the Local Development Documents submitted to the Mayor by the local planning authorities for consistency with his strategies overall, to prepare a response to the Mayor for consideration by the Assembly, and to monitor the Mayor's decisions with regard to Local Development Documents;
- (e) To consider planning matters on request form another standing committee and report its opinion to that standing committee;
- (f) To consider, as necessary, strategic planning matters as set out in The Town and Country Planning (Mayor of London) Order 2008 and to make recommendations as appropriate. (The Assembly has no powers in relation to any individual planning applications);
- (g) To respond on behalf of the Assembly to consultations and similar processes when within its terms of reference; and
- (h) To take into account in its deliberations the cross cutting themes of: the health of persons in Greater London; the achievement of sustainable development in the United Kingdom; climate change; and the promotion of opportunity.

4. Issues for Consideration

Update on work programme items

The Mayor's Affordable Housing and Viability Supplementary Planning Guidance

4.1 One of the Committee's priorities for the coming year will be scrutiny of the emerging revisions to the London Plan and other planning policy documents. A report elsewhere on this agenda asks Members to note the Committee's response to the Mayor's consultation on Draft Affordable Housing and Viability Supplementary Planning Guidance.

Land Value Tax report - London Finance Commission Recommendation

4.2 On 22 February 2016 the Committee published "Tax Trial – A Land Value Tax for London?" the final report of a rapporteur investigation by Tom Copley AM on behalf of the Committee that explores the potential of a Land Value Tax for London. At the Committee's last meeting the Mayor's generally supportive response to the report was reported to Members.

4.3 On 27 January 2017, the London Finance Commission published its report, Devolution: a capital idea. The report builds on the Commission's previous recommendations and sets out the tax and spending powers London now needs to take control of its future. One of the Commission's recommendations was that "National government should work with London's government to trial the operation of a land value tax pilot on undeveloped land."

Green Belt seminar

- 4.4 On 16 February 2017 the Chair and Deputy Chair of the Planning Committee hosted a seminar on the Green Belt of the Future in City Hall's Living Room.
- 4.5 With demand for homes in London ever growing and continued calls to build on the Green Belt, it is more important than ever to refocus the Green Belt debate, to discuss how policy makers can make the Green Belt fit for the 21st century and how to better utilise the green belt for the benefit of all Londoners.
- 4.6 The event was attended by around 120 delegates, speakers and panellists including London borough leaders, leaders of authorities outside London in the Metropolitan Green Belt, senior officers and other relevant stakeholders.
