Police forces should prepare for this eventuality and make sure that the recommendations in this report are used in the future to improve the police response to hate crime victims.’</i></li> <li>• Do you share the concerns of the Inspectorate that there is a real risk of a rise in hate crime and if so, what are you doing to prepare for this?</li> <li>• What are the contingencies which are in place to replace these EU tools?
