Title: Vaccine Opinion Poll Results

Executive Summary

On 25 June 2020, the Health Committee noted the following standing delegation:

At its Annual Meeting on 15 May 2020, the Assembly agreed to delegate authority to the Chair of the Health Committee, in consultation with the Deputy Chair of the Health Committee, to agree any outputs of that Committee, in accordance with the agreed work programme, for the period up until the May 2021 GLA elections.

In October 2020, the Health Committee launched a poll on vaccine opinions in London to support its investigation on preparing London for a COVID-19 vaccine. The Committee found that:

- In response to the question 'would you get a COVID-19 vaccine when one becomes available on the NHS?' a quarter of respondents answered 'unlikely' or 'definitely not', and around three in five people (66%) answered 'likely' or 'definitely will';
- In response to the question 'if you are unsure, unlikely or definitely wouldn't get a vaccine, what are your reasons for that response?' almost half of those who would not or might not get a vaccine (47.5%) said that they either did not trust government guidance or did not trust drug companies; and
- In response to the question 'do you think that the NHS can distribute a vaccine in London quickly once it is developed?' more than half answered 'no' or 'don't know'.

Other findings from the poll include:

- The 45-54 age group had the most respondents say they were not likely to have the vaccine;
- Over half of those who would not get a vaccine get their news from YouTube;
- Around 7 out of 10 of those who would get a vaccine get their news from national and local news channels, including radio, online and television; and
- There are fewer people in the east of London compared to the rest of the city who say they would definitely or be likely to get the vaccine.

These survey findings show that, if vaccine uptake rates need to be as high for COVID-19, Londoners and London could fall short in creating the necessary herd immunity.

The findings demonstrate that London's NHS must showcase how it is preparing for the vaccine and how it will handle vaccinations. This comes amidst announcements from the government that it is preparing for fast-approaching approvals of a new vaccine.

Decision

That the Chair, in consultation with the Deputy Chair:

- Agrees the high-level summary of the Health Committee's vaccine opinion poll results for the basis of related outputs, including press releases and correspondence; and
- Recommends a "Debunk, Reassure and Promote" campaign by the government, NHS
 England and the Mayor that: debunks myths around vaccines and vaccinations; reassures
 people of the safety of the vaccine; and promotes the uptake of vaccines to all age
 groups, but specifically targets those who the government has said will be getting the
 vaccine first.
