

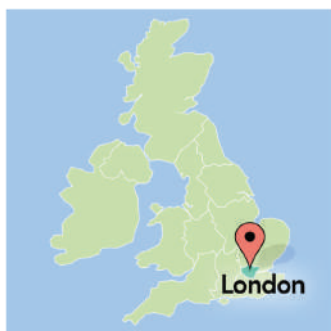

About this booklet



London is a **diverse** city. **Diverse** means lots of different types of people live here.



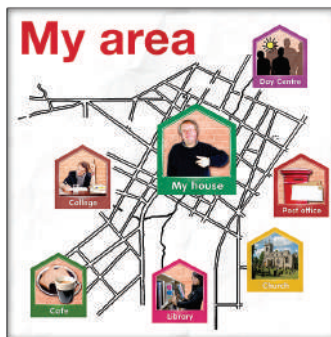
This includes people with different religions or abilities, people from different places and people with different cultures and backgrounds.



Being diverse makes London a great city but the history and stories of people from diverse backgrounds are not always told and are not always part of our **public spaces**.



Public spaces are outside spaces in our city that are free and open to everyone, like streets, parks, squares and waterways.



The **Mayor of London** has a new plan where **communities** can get money and support for projects that change our public spaces.

This money is called a **grant**. It can be used for projects that

- make something new.
- show something that is missing or hidden.
- tell a different story that might be missing.

Communities are the area you live in.

This booklet tells you

- who can apply for grant money.
- how much money you can get.
- how to apply for grant money.

This money and support is part of a big plan called **The Commission for Diversity in the Public Realm**.

Questions we asked



Over the last year we asked people in London questions about public spaces to help us with our plan.



We asked

- How do you feel in public spaces in London?
- Do you feel **represented** in public spaces in your community?
Represented means you see your own life and culture in public spaces.
- What would you like to see in public spaces in London?
- What would you change about public spaces in London?



About public space projects



Projects must

- be part of the community.
- include everyone and let people from diverse backgrounds take part.
- happen in public spaces in London like parks or squares where communities can meet.



Projects could

- **make a new object for the community** like a piece of art or something for a garden or play area.
- **show something that is missing or hidden** like history, art or culture about people from diverse backgrounds.



If there are any paid jobs as part of a project we will look at applications that give jobs to people from diverse backgrounds who might not normally get work first.



Ideas for your project

You might want to

- have a workshop or meeting to think about what your public space should look like.
- work with an artist, local group or someone who knows the history of the area.
- make a trail or record a story in audio or British Sign Language.
- make a new object that tells a different story. This might be about a person or an event from history.
- talk about the past in a story. This is called an **oral history**.
- run a workshop.



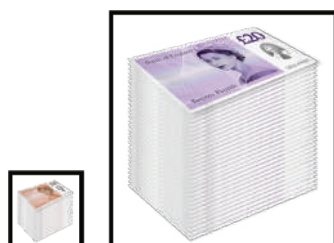

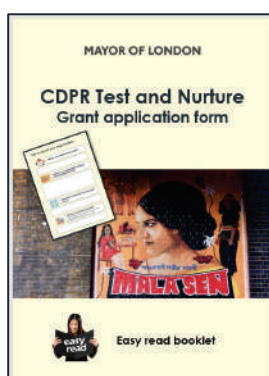
How much money you can get



We have **£1 million** of money to spend on community projects. You can apply either by January 2022 or by September 2022.

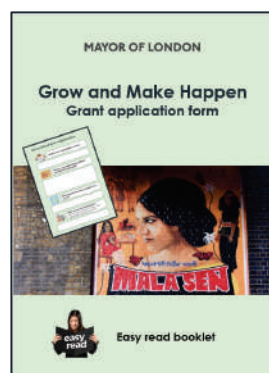


There are 2 pots of money, 1 for small projects and 1 for large projects.



Test and nurture

There is up to £5,000 of money for a small project. This could be an idea you want to try out.



Grow and make happen

There is £4,000 to £25,000 for large projects that are bigger and have already been tried out.

Who can apply for grant money



You can apply for grant money if

- you're a community group or an organisation that doesn't make a **profit**. **Profit** is when you make more money than you spend.
- the address of your group or organisation is in London.
- your group or organisation earns less than £500,000 a year.

Other groups or organisations can apply but you might need some support from us.

We will try to choose projects from and about different types of people and groups like

- Black, Asian and minority ethnic people.
- disabled or Deaf people.
- LGBTQ+ people.
- women.
- people who don't have much money.

At least half the people in your group or organisation will need to be from these groups.

Who can't apply for grant money



You can't apply for grant money if

- you're a person applying on your own.
- you're a business or an organisation that makes a profit.
- you're a large charity.
- you're a school or a college.
- you're an organisation that makes more than £500,000 a year.



If you're a person on your own you could join a community group to apply for the money.

Support you can get



We will give support in different ways for anyone who isn't sure how to apply.



Learning sessions

These sessions will help you plan your project.



Workshops

These workshops will help you apply for grant money.

Enquiry form



You can complete this form before you complete an application form.



It gives us a chance to ask questions about your project so we can find out if your idea is good and right for our grant money.



We might share what you tell us with the **Arts Council** and **National Lottery**.



Completing the enquiry form can help you get some great advice before you apply for grant money.

How to apply



Most people will apply by completing an **application form** on our website.

Our application form



Our application form will ask you questions about your project and the people taking part.



Tell us what your project is about. You might want to send us pictures or plans to help your application.



We might need to do some checks to make sure you are who you say you are and that everything is correct before you start your project.



This is because our grants come from **public money** which means we have to follow some rules.



You will need to show us



- bank account information for your group or organisation.



- **governance** documents. These are documents that show your group or organisation are run correctly.

- official accounts for your group or organisation.



You will be in charge of the money and the legal side of the project.



You will need to have insurance and policies in place before you start your project.

When you can apply

Round 1

Round 2

There are 2 chances to apply.

- **Round 1**
21 October 2021 to 12 January 2022.
- **Round 2**
starts in Spring 2022.



You can only apply once each time. We will give you feedback if your project isn't chosen first time.

You can also come to one of our learning sessions or workshops.

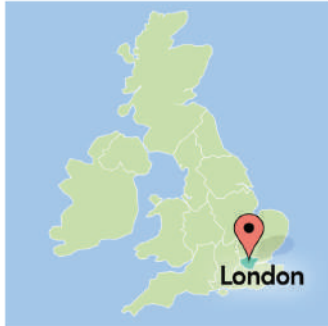
How you can spend our grant money



Our grant money is for the cost of projects. This might include



- ✓ **Fees.** For artists and other people who help with the project.
- ✓ **Access costs.** For things like sign language interpreters, translators or personal assistants.
- ✓ **Hire costs.** For the venue you are working in.
- ✓ **Equipment.** For the cost of equipment you use on the project.
- ✓ **Staff and volunteers costs.** For extra things like food.
- ✓ **Digital costs.** For online costs.
- ✓ **Transport.** For travel costs.
- ✓ **Office costs.** This can be up to 10% of your whole grant money.



The grant money **does not** cover

- projects that have already happened.
- any costs that are not part of your project.
- activities outside London.
- anything that makes money that is not part of your project.
- overseas travel.

We will decide who to give money to by looking at



- **Story and vision.** This means what you want the project to be.
- **Diversity and inclusion.** This means how the project will make a difference and who is taking part.
- **Making it happen.** This means who is on the team and who is making the project happen.

Who decides



We work with a team of people called a **panel** to decide who gets grant money. The panel look at lots of different things like

- where projects are happening.
- who projects are for and who is taking part.
- which projects will make a difference in the community.



The panel gives their choices for who gets grant money to
