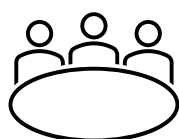
2025-26 Q2: AUDIT PANEL HIGHLIGHTS

In the second quarter, the Panel examined audit reports on: the Internal Audit Annual Report 2024/25, GLA Procurement of Major Events Follow Up, Disability Working Practices, GLA Payroll, and Royal Docks (confidential appendix).

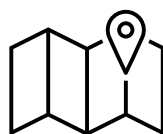
The Panel raised questions about the GLA Payroll audit, which provided an adequate assurance. The audit identified issues such as late leaver notifications, missing documentation, and unexplained salary deductions. The Disability Working Practices audit also raised concerns, with mandatory equality training completion below target and no clear accountability for follow-up.

2025-26 Q2: ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

In this quarter the Committee continued to visit different areas of London to understand aspects of London's environmental challenges. First, to visit Epping Forest to visit ancient woodlands to follow up on earlier work around trees and London's Local Nature Recovery Strategy. And second, to spend an afternoon at Biggin Hill Airport to see how the aviation sector is trying to reduce its environmental impacts.

The Committee also held two formal meetings. In September, the Committee looked into how London can scale up climate finance to reach net zero and strengthen climate resilience. Experts in climate finance, representatives from the GLA, and those leading the Green Finance Fund and London EDGE fund contributed insights, alongside Emma Howard Boyd, former Chair of the London Resilience Review. In October, following the Government's backing of a third Heathrow runway, the Committee examined the environmental implications of expansion. In the meeting, the Committee focussed on noise, air quality, and compatibility with London's climate goals.

Two report publications shaped this quarter's output. In [Swimmable Rivers](#), the Committee called on the Mayor to set ambitious, transparent targets for cleaning up London's rivers and waterways, presenting twelve recommendations to make the capital's waterways healthier and more accessible. Members also met with the Teddington Bluetits (a swimming group based in West London) at the launch of this report. In [Parks: Under Pressure](#), the Committee examined the growing challenges facing London's parks and set out practical steps to support these vital green spaces.

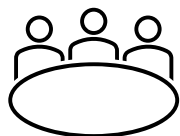

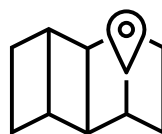

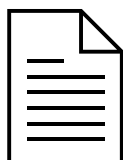

2025-26 Q2: ECONOMY, CULTURE AND SKILLS COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

The Economy, Culture and Skills Committee published its report on Universal Basic Income in September 2025. The report was framed as a review of the evidence and opinions across a range of Londoners on UBI, and reflected the pros and cons of the debate on how and whether it could work in the city.

The Committee also continued its investigation into employment for prison leavers in London. At its meeting in September, it heard from a panel of employers who specialise in employing people who have spent time in prison to hear about the challenges and opportunities it offers, and what support would help them or others employ more. Later that month, the Committee visited the Dusty Knuckle bakery in Dalston. Members participated in a behind-the-scenes tour of the bakery and spoke to people who had worked at Dusty Knuckle after spending time in prison, to learn about their experiences.

In October, the Committee launched its investigation into the declining number of children in London. Members heard an informal briefing from the City Intelligence Unit on the data, then held a formal meeting to hear from experts, including a leading demographer in the field, Dr Bernice Kuang. The Committee also launched a call for evidence and submitted FOIs to boroughs to gather data about school closures in London.

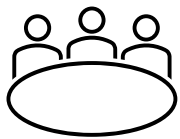

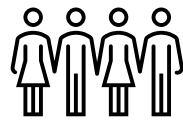

2025-26 Q2: BUDGET AND PERFORMANCE COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

The Budget and Performance Committee held two meetings this quarter.

At its September meeting, the Committee reviewed progress on the Mayor's 2024 manifesto commitments, in the context that the GLA is already one-third-of the way through the current mayoral term. On the committee's request, the Mayor's office provided a full, numbered list of his manifesto commitments, which the Committee has since published.

Members sought clarification on baseline assumptions, such as the pledge to recruit 1,300 additional police officers and Police Community Support Officers. Member scrutiny confirmed the Met is measuring this from a baseline of 35,291, which equates to the number of police officers and Police Community Support Officers as of May 2024. Following the meeting, the Committee wrote to the Mayor with recommendations for further clarity on the delivery of key commitments.

In the October meeting, the Committee kickstarted its annual budget scrutiny process with three expert panels on policing, housing and transport. Discussions covered the Met's financial sustainability and opportunities for improving performance, housing delivery challenges, and TfL's reduced capital renewals budget and related performance risks. The Committee's letter following the meeting made 11 recommendations, including: clearer reporting for the GLA Group's budget submissions, safeguarding innovation in policing, prioritising affordable housing starts, and tackling fare evasion to improve revenue.

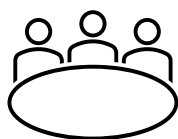

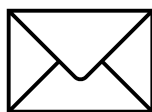

2025-26 Q2: HOUSING COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

In September, the Housing Committee held its second meeting on the Mayor's Affordable Housing Delivery. At this meeting, the Committee scrutinised the GLA on its progress in delivering its 2021-26 Affordable Homes Programme, which ends in March 2026. It heard that the GLA was confident its targets for starts would be met by the end of the programme, despite only 5,500 affordable homes having been started against the lower threshold target of 17,800.

The Committee also assessed the GLA's plans for the upcoming Social and Affordable Housing Programme, which will run from 2026-36. It heard that the GLA welcomes the government's announcement of the 2026-36 programme, which it said would provide Registered Providers in London with greater access to funding and more certainty over future grant income. However, the Committee found there is uncertainty around how the programme will operate in practice as it is still under negotiation with Government.

In September, the Housing Committee launched a call for evidence aimed at policy experts and local authorities on how social housing is allocated in London. The Committee also launched a survey – including an easy-read survey – to gather views of Londoners with experience applying for social housing.

-The Committee submitted Freedom of Information requests to local authorities across London to gather data on allocation policies, including data on waiting times for social housing across London.

In October, the Housing Committee also held its first of three meetings on allocations in social housing. This meeting focused on access and fairness in allocations. The Committee spoke with questioned policy and legal experts, campaigners, and activists to explore this issue.

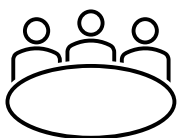

2025-26 Q2: FIRE COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

The Committee launched its investigation into fire contaminants and their impact on firefighter health and wellbeing this quarter, a topic of growing national and international concern.

In the first meeting, the Committee heard from a range of experts involved in research into exposure to contaminants and its potential health impacts, including two experts involved in the World Health Organisation's (WHO) study into firefighting as an occupational carcinogen. The Committee also heard from the lead officer on the National Fire Chiefs Council working on group on fire contaminants.

The Committee also received a [response from LFB](#) to its letter on the new London Fire Commissioner's priorities.

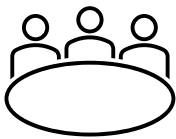

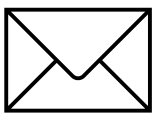

2025-26 Q2: TRANSPORT COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

The Committee began the quarter by hearing about the walkability of London's streets. First in its September meeting, where Members heard evidence from experts at Arup, Create Streets, Centre for London and the University of Westminster on how London can make its pavements safer, more accessible and more inviting. This was then quickly followed by the Committee getting out onto London's streets, undertaking a site visit to Ilford with Living Streets to explore how walkable the capital's pavements are.

The Committee also launched a new investigation into road space, driving and congestion, holding its first meeting in October. In this meeting, the Committee examined how London's roads are used, why people choose to drive, and the wider pressures on road space across the city.

The Committee also published a total of nine letters this quarter including:

- Responses to TfL consultations on detailed licensing requirements for pedicabs and on the proposal to close the Capital Call service.
- Letters to TfL and the British Transport Police following the Committee's July meeting on fare evasion.
- Correspondence with TfL and the Government arising from its investigation into taxi and private hire.
- Continued follow-up on delays in processing taxi and private hire licences, with further letters sent to the TfL Commissioner and the Deputy Mayor.

Meanwhile, the Chair of the Committee met with the Chair of the House of Commons Transport Committee to discuss the Commons Committee's ongoing inquiry into taxi and private hire licensing and the Committee's own findings.

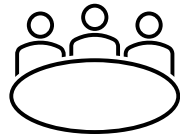

2025-26 Q2: PLANNING & REGENERATION COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

This quarter the Committee continued its investigation into energy infrastructure and planning in London. This included a final meeting, in which the Committee scrutinised the GLA, energy providers and local authorities. The Committee questioned guests on the progress made to address capacity issues in West London since 2022 and on what is required to speed up delivery of essential infrastructure. Additionally, the Committee received a briefing on LENZA (Local Energy Net Zero Accelerator) from SSEN.

The Committee also launched its investigation on mid-rise development, with the Committee holding the first meeting of its investigation in October and publishing a call for evidence.

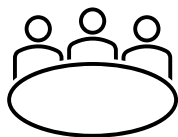

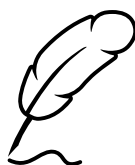

2025-26 Q2: HEALTH COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

This quarter, the Health Committee held the first meeting of its two-part investigation into the use of weight-loss medication in London. The meeting, held in September, brought together a range of experts including clinicians, pharmacists, and representatives from health providers. Members heard valuable insights into the benefits and risks associated with GLP-1 medications, including Ozempic and Mounjaro.

The Committee continued work on its investigation into men's mental health. Throughout this quarter, the Committee has been finalising its report, which is scheduled for publication in November 2025.

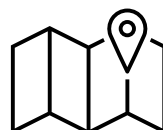

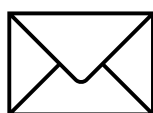

2025-26 Q2: POLICE AND CRIME COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

Q&A meetings shaped much of the Committee's scrutiny this quarter. In one of its most high-profile sessions, the Committee put the Met Commissioner on the spot in the wake of the BBC Panorama revelations about misconduct at Charing Cross Police Station. And in its Q&A meeting in September, Members questioned the Deputy Mayor for Policing and Crime (DMPC) and Kenny Bowie, Director of Strategy & MPS Oversight, on the draft A New Met for London – Phase 2 plan and the policing of the Notting Hill Carnival.

The Committee also continued its investigation into neighbourhood policing and young Londoners. Following a formal meeting in September, Members then sought to hear directly to young people themselves, participating in a roundtable facilitated by Safer London on 8 October where young Londoners shared first-hand accounts of their experiences with neighbourhood policing.

The Committee also sent to three letters to the Met and one to the DMPC:

- Calling for greater openness around the work of the Territorial Support Group.
- Setting out the Committee's response to the Met's A New Met for London Phase 2 (2025–28) consultation.
- Raising concerns and seeking further detail on the Met's decision to close police front counters across London.

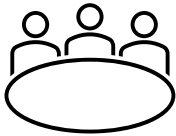

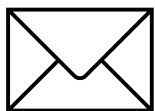

2025-26 Q2: GLA OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

In September the Committee published its report *Trusting London to deliver: our place in the Government's devolution reforms*, marking 25 years of London's governance model. The report assessed the effectiveness of the current settlement, compared London's powers with those of other global cities, and incorporated survey data from over 1,000 Londoners. It recommended reforms to strengthen London's role under the forthcoming English Devolution and Community Empowerment Bill. The report was timed to coincide with House of Commons scrutiny of the relevant legislation, and was launched at an event in the House of Commons.

In its September meeting, the Committee also reviewed Mayoral mandates and delivery plans, called for greater transparency on the GLA website, and examined the annual workforce report, noting improvements in data reliability following system upgrades.

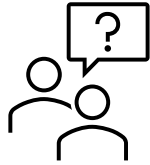
In October the Committee submitted written evidence to the Public Bill Committee on the English Devolution and Community Empowerment Bill, drawing on findings from its September report to advocate for a fair and effective settlement for London.

Its October meeting focussed on resilience and emergency preparedness. Members questioned the GLA's Director of Resilience and the LFB's Assistant Commissioner and Deputy Chair of the London Resilience Forum on the state of preparedness in the capital for an event that requires a resilience response. It requested details on funding allocations for resilience initiatives, including warm and cool spaces, and community projects.

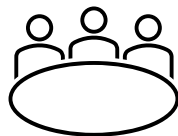

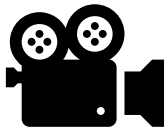
