	Natasha Plummer provided an overview of the implementation of the hate crime strategy.

	NP suggested that the MET be invited to the next meeting to discuss their training plan and wider issues on addressing disability hate crime.	Invite MET to the next meeting.
	<ul> <li>The following points were raised by the group:</li> <li>Some disabled people are impacted by dual discrimination based on race and disability and the implementation of the hate crime strategy should reflect this.</li> <li>The group asked if psychological support was provided as part of the strategy. NP responded that this wasn't as part of this strategy but there was wider work undertaken on victim support. This included work with local authorities and a capacity building fund for organisations working in this area. In addition, there was work with NHS England to help increase support at local level.</li> <li>Sex crime and revenge crime should be seen as a hate crime and should be incorporated into the strategy. NP responded that hadn't previously been considered but will be reviewed.</li> <li>The attitude of front line staff is a significant barrier for disabled people to reporting hate crime. This is particularly the case for learning disabled people and those with mental health problems. The group felt that this was not properly addressed in the strategy. NP agreed that the first response was critically important and that's why training had to be effective so MET staff could support people when hate crime is reported.</li> <li>The group asked for further information on how the phone app worked in terms of reporting hate crime. NP noted that it was in development stage and would be launched in July. Disabled people to be engaged in the development of the app and given the opportunity cascade it further.</li> </ul>	NP to report back on whether this will be considered. 5	Engaging Deaf and disabled people in the political system:  i. Feedback from Deaf London on event held at City Hall, Tom Lichy, Deaf London  ii. Inclusion London - Our election 2 campaign', Henrietta Doyle, Inclusion London	
	Tom Lichy presented on his work with Deaf London. The objective was to get more Deaf Londoners engaged in the political system and to confidently contact their local councillors and MP's. The event at City Hall had been really useful for the participants particularly when they did role-plays with "fake" MP's. Henrietta Doyle from Inclusion London discussed their work on encouraging more disabled people to vote. This was part of "Operation Disabled Vote. They had held hustings with representatives from the main parties to ask them what they would be doing to support disabled people. They had also campaigned on issues such as accessible polling booths.

6	Liberty Festival – engaging Deaf and disabled people, Sarah Barrow, Events Team, GLA	
	Sarah Barrow presented on the plans for this year's Liberty Festival which would again be presented with National Paralympic Day. She urged delegates to cascade information throughout their networks and help to increase the number of disabled people attending.	
	<ul> <li>The group raised the following points:</li> <li>It was important to ensure that there were sensory rooms for people to have a quiet space.</li> <li>Holding the event on a Sunday could present a challenge for people to attend because of transport issues and people with faith commitments.</li> <li>It was important to ensure accessible information was available about the event. This should engage with people with a range of impairments.</li> <li>It was important to ensure that the Liberty Festival was not overshadowed by National Paralympic Day. SB replied that this also provided an opportunity to develop additional audience members.</li> <li>The group agreed that QEOP was a particularly accessible venue.</li> <li>HM would disseminate information on the event nearer the time.</li> </ul>
