1. Housing Targets

The housing targets for Richmond are, in my view, not practical without seriously encroaching on green space (despite the plans proposals to protect these) and / or significantly reducing the quality of the environment and doing long term damage to the borough in which we live.

- 2. Joined up thinking with Local Authorities that border Greater London
 I live in a borough that borders non-Greater London boroughs. The New London Plan cannot be considered in isolation. It should be much less prescriptive (in terms of targets) to allow local authorities to create plans that work well alongside neighboring boroughs.
- 3. Affordable Housing

I totally support the need for more affordable housing. We must ensure that there is a better supply of affordable housing for young people and for workers in our essential services. The absolute requirement for developments to include a large percentage of affordable housing would, if properly implemented, ensure that development land prices reflect this requirement.

4. Are the base assumtions correct?

The New London Plan Draft starts with a major assumption that to be an attractive and vibrant city the population within the <u>current area</u> designated as Greater London <u>has</u> to increase by 20% by 2041. Nowhere in the plan does it refer to any research / studies which support this hypothesis. The supporting research for this assumption should be made available. Or perhaps there is no supporting research in which case a large part of the plan is built on invalid assumptions. That there will be population growth within the UK is based on good data and research, but must this translate to a 20% growth by 2041 in the Greater London Area. With improved transport facilities perhaps a large part of "London's" growth may well take place in areas neighbouring Greater London.
