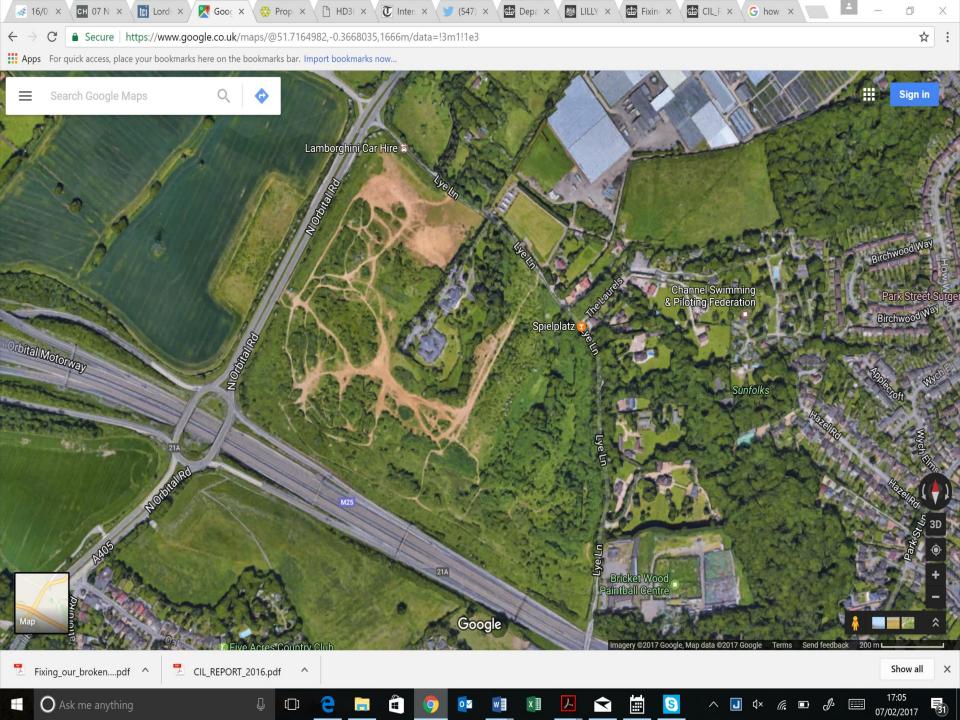
Brownfield Land is a renewable resource

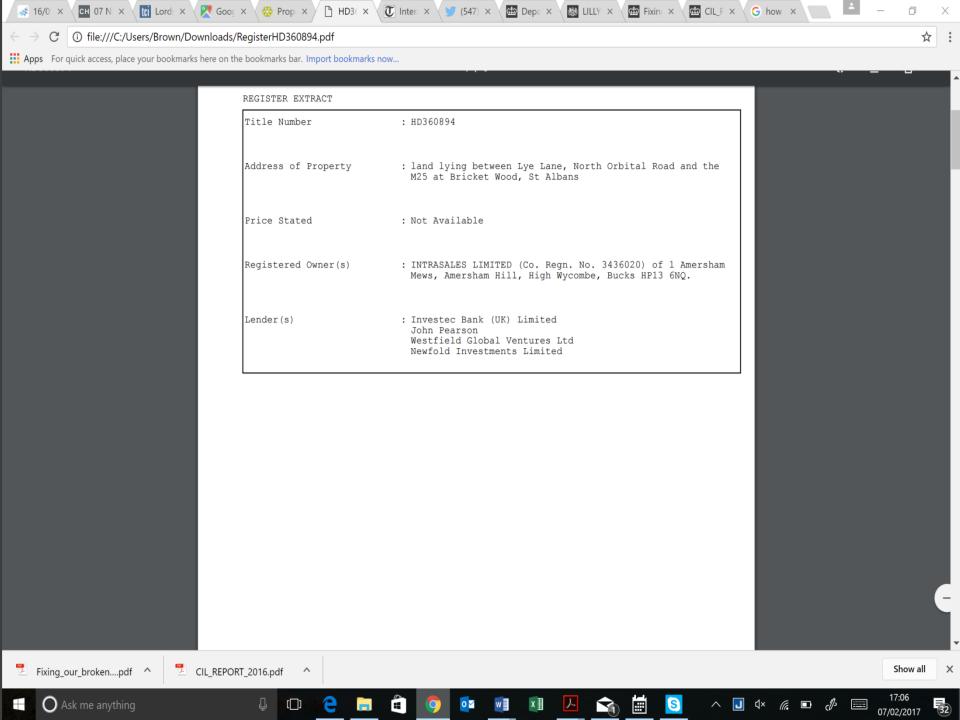
- Degraded Green Belt is rare, and usually owned by speculators or public agencies
- From PTAL to ATAL, walkable neighbourhoods deliver housing numbers

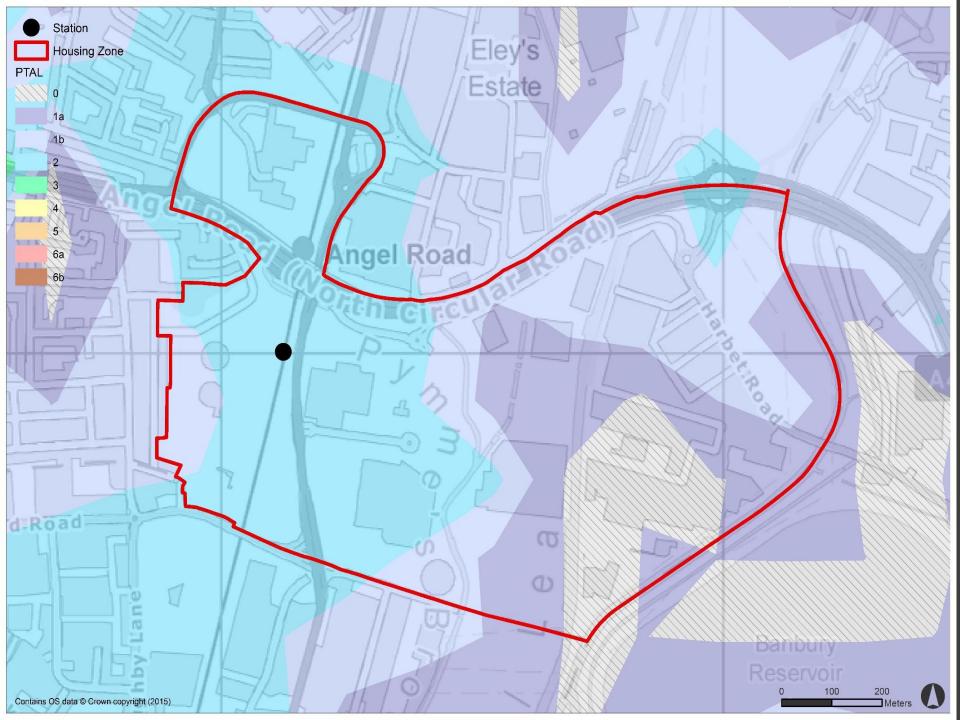


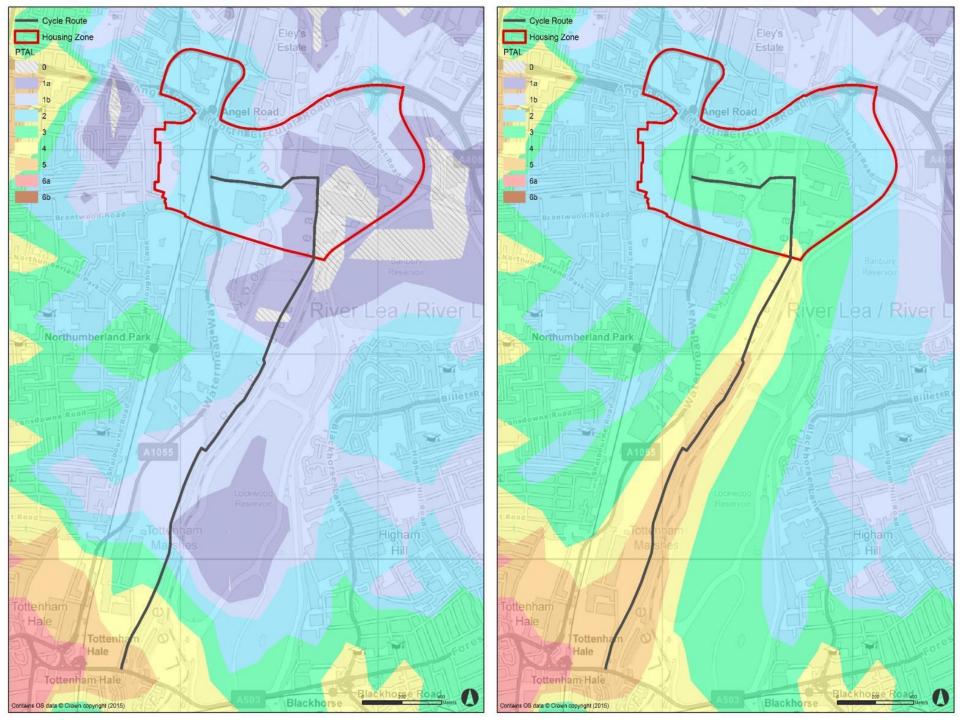
- An area of land or premises that has been previously used, but has subsequently become vacant, derelict or contaminated (MITS)
- Vacant or derelict or allocated in plan or with planning permission or with potential (NLUD)
- Any land, and its curtilage, which is, or was, occupied by a permanent structure (NPPF – 'Previously Developed Land')
