It could however conflict with policies supporting housing development, due to restrictions on land within the city. It makes specific reference to ensuring society is more inclusive, including helping those those culturally or economically excluded from society.  The policy recognises the value of cultural activities associated with a diverse range of groups within society, including the LGBTQ community, BAME groups and young people. This could help to prevent exclusion and prejudice, and encourage tolerance throughout the Capital's cultural scene.	The policy has the potential to closely support those relating to economic growth, regeneration, and the safeguarding of heritage. It could however conflict with policies supporting housing development, due to restrictions on land within the city. Depending on how growth in the creative industries is managed, the policy could also conflict with those supporting the reduction of poverty and inequalities.

This is particularly important for groups with protected characteristics, who may be at higher risk in public spaces, and can help ensure all participants within London's cultural economy feel safe and comfortable. This could broadly help to reduce severance to some cultural opportunities, particularly for residents and visitors reliant upon public transport.  The policy also references inclusive access, which could support cultural opportunities for groups with limited mobility, along with buggy users.  However, the policy is limited to support for invisible disabilities, language barriers, and sensory impairments. Additionally, it could support a range of affordable travel options, which is particularly important for low-income households in overcoming severance.	n/a

The growth of the cultural sector and associated creative industries is likely to provide economic benefits to London, through increased tourism and job creation. Depending on the scale and associated management, the regeneration of town centres and deprived areas is also likely to encourage job creation. The policy seeks to support the culture of specific groups (noting LGBT+ communities, BAME groups and young people specifically) and therefore the creation of jobs could help to support these individual communities.</p> <p>Cultural regeneration is often associated with trade-offs, and could result in the loss of low-value, locally owned businesses. These institutions may play an important role in the local economy, and should be safeguarded where possible to avoid job loss within lower-income communities.</p> <p>Overall, no change is expected in the short and medium terms.
