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Mayor's foreword

I know from my own experience that London is a city in which young people from any background can achieve whatever they put their minds to, with hard work and the right support. London provided the opportunity for me to become Mayor, and I'm committed to ensuring our city continues to provide the opportunities young people need to shape their future.

Yet the services that have in the past helped many young Londoners to discover their potential have been the subject of severe government cuts in the past few years. The youth services, after school clubs, preventative care and mental health support that have helped young people to develop and thrive, have in many cases disappeared.

Without access to the same opportunities that I could seek out, and under pressure from the people around them, some young people can feel like they have nowhere to turn. They can make bad decisions, and in some cases, end up getting involved in crime and violence.

Our Young Londoners Fund aims to provide the kind of support young people need to build a better future. It will help to keep young people from getting involved in criminal activity, not only enhancing their own life chances, but improving their communities and the city as a whole.

We want this fund to make a real difference - and City Hall is committed to working with London's amazing community groups to get this right. There's a huge breadth and depth of experts out there, already doing great work in difficult circumstances, and I know we will receive an array of exciting ideas in response to this prospectus. With the right support, every young Londoner can make positive choices; working together we can help them create the future they deserve.

Summary

We have launched the Young Londoners Fund to help and support children and young people to fulfil their potential. We particularly want to help those at risk of getting caught up in crime. The fund will support a range of activities for young people aged 10 to 21, including education, sport and culture¹. We will invest £45m over a three-year period from 2018 with:

- £30m for a new fund for projects in local communities
- £15m to scale-up existing City Hall funded projects to support young Londoners (this includes the £0.5m Sport Unites Small Grants Fund)

The fund will provide:

- ambitious and positive activities for young people. This will help them to make positive choices and reach their potential.

This prospectus has information on how to apply for the Young Londoners Fund and the Sport Unites Small Grants Fund.

Information on how to apply is in paragraph 3.1 below.

The deadline for applications is 12-noon, Monday 9 July.

1. Context

1.1. Background

London is a fantastic city in which to grow up. It is a dynamic and vibrant place that provides lots of opportunities for many young people. But for too many young Londoners, obstacles remain that prevent them from reaching their potential.

In some circumstances, making the wrong life choices can even lead young people into criminality. If we are to keep our city safe, and ensure all Londoners are able to contribute to our city, then more needs to be done to tackle this problem.

Over recent years, there has been a national rise in serious violence. In London, we know how knife violence is a serious problem in some communities. It has terrible consequences for the people and families involved, and major repercussions for many others.

Those committing serious violence will feel the full force of the law. We need a well-resourced police force to keep our communities safe. Perpetrators must expect to be caught, prosecuted and punished.

However, at the same time, we must address the underlying issues that can cause criminality and do what we can to stop young people turning to serious violence in the first place. This requires a different approach – one that offers young people a more positive route through life.

The Young Londoners Fund will open-up new options for some of the young people most at risk of taking the wrong path. It will use a public health approach to youth violence, offering activities that help young people feel positive and which steer them away from making bad choices. Some resources will also go towards tackling reoffending, but the main aim of the fund is to run activities to stop young people ever getting involved in serious violence.

The fund will be used to support and improve the amazing resources that have always been at the heart of London's communities. Government cuts to youth services, community groups and education have had a big impact on the local support available to young people. The Young Londoners Fund will help to reduce the impact this can have on their lives. By opening-up opportunities for young people and improving the resilience of their families and communities it will be an important part of the Mayor's wider efforts to reduce serious violence in London.

1.2. What does the Young Londoners Fund already support

We have already allocated additional funding to scale-up City Hall projects to support young Londoners. Applications are now open for [Young London Inspired](#) and [Stepping Stones](#). Applications for [HeadStart Action](#) will open in June. When planning your project, please consider whether you should apply to these three funds first, rather than the Young Londoners Fund.

Please also make sure you don't duplicate activity we're already funding. See appendix 1 for more information on what we are already supporting through the Young Londoners Fund.

1.3. Who can apply for the Young Londoners Fund?

We are looking for organisations to run projects that support children and young people in London to make positive choices. They can be up to three years in length, with the first small grant funded projects starting in October 2018. Organisations can apply providing they meet the following criteria:

- **Your organisation must be legally constituted.** If not, you must be part of a Consortium who is a legally constituted organisation or be in a partnership with a Sole Lead Applicant.
- Your organisation must have a bank account, with two separate signatories, (registered in the name of the applicant organisation) into which the grant can be paid.
- The annual grant proposed must not constitute more than 50 per cent of the annual turnover of your organisation if you are a Sole Deliverer, or of your Sole Lead Applicant, or of your Consortium.
- Your lead applicant must be able to provide audited/examined accounts for at least one year which comply with the relevant regulatory body.
- You must have a proven track record in the work your organisation does.
- You must have expertise and / or experience in delivering the kind of work set out in your proposal.
- You must have all necessary insurances and safeguarding policies in place and be committed to carrying out DBS checks for everyone working with young people.
- You should have or commit to working towards the [London Youth Quality Mark](#).

Applicants must apply as either a Sole Deliverer, a Sole Lead Applicant, or a Consortium.

If you are applying as Sole Lead Applicant or a Consortium you must provide support to your partners or members. This could, for example mean helping them with monitoring, assessing their impact, approaching multi-agencies, and staff training.

We encourage small organisations who do not meet the criteria above to find out if there is the opportunity for you to join a local partnership or Consortium who is making an application for the Young Londoners Fund. Please see paragraph 4.6 for information on support for applicants.

2. Aims and objectives

2.1. Programme aims and objectives

The Young Londoners Fund aims to:

- provide aspirational and positive activities to help support young people to make positive choices and reach their potential
- give new options to children and young people most at risk of taking the wrong path and stop them getting involved in violence and criminal activity
- improve coordination and capacity of London’s youth offer so more children and young people can access services

Programme objective:

- The fund will support children and young people (aged 10 to 21) across London, through a range of innovative and proven delivery models.

2.2. Who the funding aims to support

Projects should support young people living in any London borough or the City of London who are either at risk of exclusion or involvement in criminal activity or have been involved in criminal activity.

Applicants may identify a specific sub-group of young people who meet the definitions above, depending on the focus of your project. For example, you may choose to focus your

project on young people who are at risk of experiencing mental ill health or have had adverse childhood experiences, or you may focus on young victims of criminality.

Projects which support a universal, mixed, group of young people would still be eligible for funding. However, applicants must clearly show the anticipated impact of project activities on young people who are either at risk of exclusion or involvement in criminal activity or have been involved in criminal activity.

You can find examples of data sources in appendix 2 to help you identify and evidence the need for your project.

2.3. Funding available

We have made £30m from the Young Londoners Fund available for projects in local communities. We will invite applications in two funding rounds. We expect to commit approximately half of the fund in round 1:

- Round 1: Applications open 15 May 2018
- Round 2: Applications are due to open May 2019

Sole Deliverers, Sole Lead Applicants and Consortiums can apply for a small or medium grant. **To be eligible for a large grant, applicants must be a Sole Lead Applicant or a Consortium.** Please see paragraph 1.3 for definitions of a Sole Deliverer, Sole Lead Applicant and Consortium. Indicative round 1 allocations for each size of grant and target group are shown in the table below.

We are planning to launch a second Young Londoners Fund grant application round in May 2019. Please note, we may amend the Young Londoners Fund eligibility and target groups in the second-round dependent on the applications and the learning from the first round of funding. This will help us ensure we have a balanced programme.

Applicants applying for the Sport Unites Small Grants Fund should also use this prospectus and the Young Londoners Fund application form. The indicative

allocation for sport-related projects through the Sports Unite Small Grants Fund is shown in the table below.

2.3.1. Project length

Funding is available for up to three years. Small grant funded projects will start in October 2018. Other projects will be expected to begin working with their first group of young people by January 2019. Projects must be completed within three years of starting delivery and not later than December 2021.

2.3.2. Match funding

Projects will be asked to show evidence of added-value through other income sources or in-kind support in the application form, although match funding is not essential.

2.4. Activities - what we will fund

We welcome creative proposals which include activities you think can make the most difference to young people. Projects should provide activities that aim to help young people feel positive about their prospects, steering them away from making bad decisions. Projects should also open-up opportunities for young people and improving the resilience of their families and communities. Activities could include one or more of the following:

- Arts and culture
- Citizenship, including civic participation
- Digital
- Education and skills development
- Environmental awareness and improvement
- Experience of the world of work
- Healthy lifestyles
- Mental wellbeing
- Mentoring
- Positive engagement with police and emergency services
- Science and technology
- Sports and physical activity
- Support for families who have children with complex needs
- Volunteering
- Other activities which make a positive difference to young people

Across the fund, we expect applicants to propose a wide range of activity. This will vary depending on who you're expecting to benefit from your project and your activity's focus. Projects may focus on a combination of *issue-based activities* and *broad-personal development activities*. Issue-based activities are those that aim to achieve a specific measurable change, for example learning a skill, getting a job. Broad-personal

development activities aim to improve social and emotional behaviour and are normally measured through distance travelled, for example boosting confidence, resilience, aspiration.

We want to see proposals that are based on evidence of what works, this evidence may have come from previous projects that you have run, or from elsewhere.

We welcome ideas and proposals from those closest to their communities. That is why applicants must prove how they will involve young people in their design and delivery of their project.

We want to see projects that work with other services and community groups that support young people. Larger grant funded projects should incorporate a multi-agency approach into their delivery.

Parents and carers are important too. We are interested in projects that support families who have children with complex needs.

We will fund:

- Operational delivery costs
- Core staff and volunteer costs
- Monitoring and evaluation costs
- Marketing and publicity costs
- Associated overhead costs (for example heating, lighting, stationery etc.)
- Low value equipment costs (up to £1,000) for audio-visual, sports etc.

We will not fund:

- Activities that directly replace cuts by statutory bodies (apart from where such funding was explicitly time-limited and for a discretionary purpose)
- Capital items
- Statutory Physical Education provision (i.e. sport in school time)
- Activity which is duplicating existing Young Londoners Fund activity (see paragraph 1.2 and appendix 1)

2.5. Outputs

We want to understand the impact of your project on the fund's aims and objective. You must show how your project activities will have a positive impact on the young people this fund aims to support.

Applicants will be asked to identify:

- who are the young people you intend to support?
- what are the needs or issues of the young people you are aiming to support?
- what activities will you deliver to meet those needs?
- how will you measure the success of your delivery (what are your outputs)?

Outputs must be recorded to prove delivery success, quality, value for money and the overall reach of the fund. As a minimum, we expect to ask all projects to report on the following outputs:

- the number of young people who start and complete activity

Applicants are also required to detail outputs specific to their project, these should include:

- details of the young people supported by the project
- how many hours of activity are offered and completed
- any qualifications, units or certifications achieved
- number of young people involved in project design and leadership

2.6. Outcomes

By project outcomes, we mean the result, or to what extent the project has led to the desired change. We expect projects to meet the overall aims of the Young Londoners Fund as stated in paragraph 2.1 above.

Applicants will be asked to identify:

- what will change for the young people you are supporting?
- how will you measure that change?
- what are the intended measurable outcomes for young people you are supporting?

Applicants should give as much information as possible on their project’s impact and outcomes. The table below suggests a range of outcomes which Young Londoners Fund projects may deliver. Applicants should consider what will change due to their activity and how it can be evidenced in their project’s lifetime. The [MOPAC Youth Outcomes framework](#) includes information on the tools recommended to measure most of these outcomes.

Successful applicants will be required to submit their Theory of Change and project evaluation plans for validation by Project Oracle <http://project-oracle.com/> by the end of their second delivery quarter.

3. Instructions for applicants

For details of who can apply for the Young Londoners Fund please see paragraph 1.3.

3.1. Application process

The **Young Londoners Fund** will be allocated via an open and competitive application process. It is a single application form, with only those applications passing the gateway criteria moving to full assessment. All shortlisted large grant applicants will be interviewed, and we reserve the right to interview shortlisted medium grant applicants. We are not planning to interview organisations that apply for small grants.

3.2. Submission requirements

The deadline for applications is 12-noon, Monday 9 July

You must complete the following documents in full:

- Online Application form. Applicants will be required to register on this portal <https://gla.flexigrant.com> before completing the application form.
- Supporting Documents to attach
 - A copy of your most recent audited accounts or copy of the most recent accounts signed by an independent and qualified accountant
 - Evidence of public and employer’s liability insurance
 - Organisation Chart

The online application is divided into two parts which are made up of 8 sections on the online application form. The online application form Declaration is in section 9.

- Part 1: Gateway questions – **if you do not meet these gateway criteria then you Should not continue with your application.** The gateway questions can be found in appendix 3.
 - Section 1: About your application – other funding available
 - Section 2: Gateway Questions – About Your Organisation
 - Section 3: Gateway Questions – About Your Project and Experience

- Part 2: Scored questions – assessed against the criteria set out above
 - Section 4: Project Need
 - Section 5: Project Activities
 - Section 6: Outputs and Outcomes
 - Section 7: Finance
 - Section 8: Capacity and Capability
- Section 9: Declaration

Each question has a defined word limit which includes text within tables. You cannot include diagrams in the application form (except for the organisation chart which you need to attach to your application).

We reserve the right to modify, amend or provide further clarification about the online application documents at any time before the deadline for completion. Please note that as part of the assessment process we will be sharing your application with other funders of youth activities and a panel of young people.

We will carry out financial due diligence checks before we offer funding – please see appendix 4 for full details. Successful applicants must provide the required documentation on notification. Please note, local authorities and local authority-maintained schools are exempt from this process.

3.5. Award criteria and evaluation process

The Young Londoners Fund will be allocated through an open and competitive application process. It is a single application form, with only those passing the gateway process moving to full assessment.

Part 1 comprises of gateway questions which ask for organisational information and confirmation of essential requirements for the Young Londoners Fund. Questions will be marked pass / fail or used for information only. Applicants will be notified at the end of this section if they can continue with their application.

Part 2 comprises scored questions which will be assessed using the scoring mechanism detailed below. We are not bound to accept any proposal and reserve the right to ask for clarification on bids through an interview process.

After proposals have been assessed and scored against the assessment criteria, we will take into consideration the overall spread of proposals to be funded. The factors listed below will also be considered when making final decisions about which suite of projects are awarded funding:

- specific target group demographics
- geographical spread of delivery
- scale and level of funding requested

4. General requirements

4.1. Project management

Successful applicants must produce an annual delivery plan with key milestones. You must keep City Hall updated with regular progress reports, linked to key milestones and submit quarterly claims to us.

You will also be expected to be available for an inception meeting. You may be asked to contribute to City Hall's future good practice activity and we'll be asking successful projects for case studies of what has worked well.

4.2. Monitoring and reporting

Delivery organisations must collect standard data on the young people taking part. This data is in addition to any measures your individual project will have to monitor and record progress. This is because we are funding lots of different activities for young people. That means we need to track participation and impact in a standard way across multiple programme streams and projects.

4.3. Evaluation

We are committed to promoting the highest standards of evidence and evaluation. All applicants will be expected to demonstrate how they will evaluate the impact of their project on the anticipated outcomes.

We will also commission an independent provider to evaluate the Young Londoners Fund. Successful applicants may be asked to participate in the overall evaluation.

4.4. Sustainability

We want to fund projects that will have a long-term and sustainable impact. Applicants will be asked to outline how they are planning to continue activities beyond the funding period.

4.5. Payment

Payment will be based on achievement of key milestones and outputs as set out in the applicant's grant funding agreement.

4.6. Support for applicants and fund-holders

4.6.1. Workshops

4.6.2. Development Grants

We have allocated budget for a small number of development grants of up to £5,000 for organisations who need further help to develop their project proposal and get their application ready to re-apply to the fund in 2019.

Applicants who score highly on the project need and project activity sections but who are not selected to deliver a round 1 Young Londoners Fund project will be considered for a development grant, subject to funding being available.

We plan to inform organisations eligible for a development grant at the same time as the application decision.

4.6.3. Impact for Youth

This programme is being developed to support organisations delivering activity funded through the Young Londoners Fund. We plan to provide a range of support for activities. These could include:

- support on how to evaluate impact by developing theories of change, evaluation frameworks and baseline assessments
- an offer of an organisational mentor from an experienced youth provider
- staff training for frontline workers and leaders of youth settings, and support to develop sustainable business models
- a toolkit on how to best engage young people in project design and delivery
- small grants to new or existing local networks of organisations, including those running Young Londoners Fund activities to:
 - help generate proposals for round two of the fund and support potential bidders
 - ensure that young people are effectively and appropriately engaged in developing proposals and delivering activities
 - promote Young Londoners Fund activities to young people in their locality
 - share best practice between Young Londoners Fund-holders
 - help develop sustainability.

We will have more information on the 'Impact for Youth' programme later this summer.

Culture Seeds

Culture Seeds is a new funding programme that encourages more arts, culture and heritage activities at grassroots level. It offers micro-grants of £1,000 to £5,000 to support community-led culture projects across London. The aim is to support people and organisations who often miss out on funding as they're too small or informal. European Social Fund

Over the coming year there will be opportunities to apply for funding from the GLA's European Social Fund Co-financing programme. This is expected to fund projects supporting young people who are at risk of falling out of education, or who are not in education or employment. We'll also build on the work of our ground-breaking ESF funded Careers Clusters. These have supported secondary schools and colleges to give their students more experiences of the world of work. Co-Commissioning Fund

Through the Co-Commissioning Fund (CCF), MOPAC is providing funding to groups to work together to deliver solutions to entrenched or emerging crime and community safety issues. The purpose of the fund is to drive innovative, new approaches and to extend the reach of existing effective services in London through the co-design, co-commissioning and co-delivery of services. The application process for at least £4.5 million for 2-year projects will open in early Autumn 2018. Funding priorities will be confirmed in summer 2018 but are likely to include persistent offending and sexual violence with specific focus on young people. Appendix 4: Due Diligence requirements

- We ('the GLA') will carry out financial due diligence checks prior to the offer of funding. This will ensure that any risks to either the programme's success and project objectives, or the funding itself, has been considered and deemed acceptable. The outcome of the due diligence checks will be given to the project board. They will consider this alongside the technical aspects of the funding application, when deciding which projects to fund.
- The due diligence will comprise of the following checks: liquidity, profitability, return on capital employed, debtors and creditors cycle, the review of Credit Safe reports, Charity Commission checks (where applicable), and the review of insurance documents, finance and procurement regulations to ensure that robust governance arrangements are in place to account for and manage our funding.
- We will only carry out due diligence checks on shortlisted organisations with project proposals that meet our funding criteria.
- Applicants applying for funding as either a (i) Sole Lead Applicant or (ii) a Sole Deliverer should supply Financial Due Diligence Documentation for the Sole Deliverer or Sole Lead Applicant only, and
- Applicants applying for funding as part of a Consortium should supply Financial Due Diligence Documentation for all members. The information will be collated in order to establish the strength of the consortium as a whole.

Financial due diligence documentation

- To support the due diligence process, applicants must provide the following documentation with their application:
 - Copy of the most recent audited accounts or copy of the most recent accounts signed by an independent and qualified accountant
 - Evidence of public and employer's liability insurance
- Applicants must provide the following documentation when they are notified that they are successful pending due diligence checks
 - Copy of the organisation's financial regulations
 - Statement of the organisation's cash flow forecast for the current year
 - The organisation's budget for the current year
 - Name and contact details of bank

And if relevant:

- Details of previous GLA contracts/grants and values over the last 12 months

- Where applicable, details of your organisation and / or any of your directors / partners / proprietors' bankruptcy, insolvency, compulsory winding up, receivership, composition with creditors, or subject to relevant proceedings
- Where applicable, details of any pending or actual investigation by a consultative committee of accounting bodies in relation to accountancy standards or professional conduct for which your organisation and / or any of its director(s) / partners/proprietor(s) is/has been subject to, including actions taken to put things right.

We reserve the right to require further information upon request.

Other important Information

- For applicants with a charitable status, we will check your details against those held on the Charity Commission's website. We do this to ensure that you have charity status, that all documents requested by the Charity Commission have been submitted on time and they have no concerns about your status.
- For small organisations or newly incorporated companies without full financial statements a guarantor will be required who will provide a full performance guarantee under-which the guarantor undertakes to fulfil the terms of the grant in the event that the applicant is unable to deliver.

Exemptions

- Local authorities, local authority-controlled schools, government bodies and departments are exempt from the financial due diligence process. This status should be clearly highlighted in the application form.
